# FOR AN ACT ENTITLED

- (3) develop procedures to produce the information needed for effective policy decision making, including procedures to provide for the dissemination of information about plans, programs, and budget requests to be included in the **biennial** [ANNUAL] budget and opportunity for public review and comment during the period of budget preparation;
