To make appropriations for the support, maintenance and development of public education in Alabama, for debt service, and for capital outlay for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2012.

7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

8 Section 1. There is hereby appropriated for the 9 support of public education in Alabama for the fiscal year 10 ending September 30, 2012, for debt service, and for capital 11 outlay to be paid out of funds specified in subsection (a) of Section 2 of this act, the amounts specified in subsections 12 13 (a), (b), (c), (d), (e), and (f) of Section 3 and Sections 4, 14 5, 11, 15 and 18 of this act. For the purpose specified in 15 subsection (b) of Section 2 of this act, amounts are shown by 16 programmatic area and the total for all programs is shown so 17 as to include estimated sources of funds other than those listed in subsection (a) of Section 2 of this act. For the 18 19 purpose of this act, "ETF" shall mean the Education Trust Fund and "Federal and Local Funds" shall mean all gifts, grants, 20 21 contributions, or entitlements, including grants by the 22 Congress of the United States, municipalities or counties.

23 Section 2. (a) The appropriations provided for in 24 this act shall be paid from funds in the State Treasury to the 25 credit of the Education Trust Fund, Alabama Peace Officers'

Standards and Training Fund, Impaired Drivers Trust Fund, 1 Driver Education and Training Fund, Special Education 2 3 Catastrophic Fund, and Public School Fund and are hereby made for the support of public education in Alabama for the fiscal 4 5 year ending September 30, 2012, and the appropriations herein made shall be subject to the provisions, terms, conditions and 6 limitations of the Budget and Financial Control Act (Code of 7 8 Alabama 1975, Sections 41-4-80 et seq.), the provisions of the Budget Management Act of 1976 (Code of Alabama 1975, Sections 9 10 41-19-1 et seq.), and shall be in the amounts hereinafter 11 specified.

(b) Amounts shown hereinunder the columns "Earmarked 12 13 Funds" and "Appropriation Total" are as set forth for the 14 purpose of establishing amounts estimated to be available by 15 programmatic area from sources other than those listed in 16 subsection (a) of this Section 2, in order, upon consideration 17 of such other funds so estimated to be available, to promote the accountability for an efficient use of funds available, 18 19 and the same are hereby appropriated by the Legislature. Provided, however, that regardless of the ending date of any 20 21 pay period which has been or may be established by the 22 Legislature for the payment of salaries of state employees, 23 the entire payment due shall be made from the fiscal year's 24 appropriation in which the pay date falls.

Notwithstanding Section 16-13-231.1(d) of the Code of Alabama 1975, there shall not be an appropriation for the 1% over the total cost of instructional salaries for the Foundation Program as calculated by the State Minimum Salary Schedule for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2011. For "Fringe Benefits" the rate per day for two personal days and five sick days (for units earned in the Foundation Program) shall be \$60. The Teachers' Retirement System rate shall be 10.00% of salaries. The Public Education Employees' Health Insurance Program (PEEHIP) rate shall be \$714 per month for each full-time employee. As funds are appropriated the appropriation herein shall include funds to pay for substitute support employees for each day a support employee is absent.

35 For "Classroom Instructional Support" the uniform amounts used in determining the 36 Foundation Program allowance for classroom instructional support shall be: (1) text-37 books at \$15.88 per pupil in average daily membership during the first 20 scholastic 38 days after Labor Day of the preceding school year and (2) classroom materials and 39 supplies at \$134.78 per unit earned in the Foundation Program. Funds allocated for 40 instructional support units to meet SACS standards may be used for principals, as-41 sistant principals, counselors, and librarians and library aides, as calculated by 42 the State Department of Education and assigned to the schools where such units are 43 earned. An instructional support unit earned for a principal shall be increased by

.31 for elementary schools, .35 for middle schools, and .45 for secondary schools and unit schools. The budgeting and expenditure of funds in the Foundation Program at the local level shall be determined and made by the local board of education in accordance with rules and regulations of the State Board of Education and all laws governing such school budgets and expenditures. It is the intent of the Legislature that funds allocated for textbooks shall be expended to purchase textbooks within the first two weeks of the school year.

Of the above appropriation for Operations and Maintenance, in addition to their regular O & M distribution, \$150,000 shall be distributed to Gadsden State Community College for economic development, allied health sciences and nursing programs; \$100,000 shall be distributed to Enterprise/Ozark Community College Aeronautics School in Albertville; \$80,000 shall be distributed to Bishop State Community College for the welding program at the Carver Campus; and \$75,000 shall be distributed to Calhoun Community College for the Arts Center.

(3) The allocation of Adult Education funds appropriated herein is restricted to the provision of services as defined under the stipulations of the Adult Education and Family Literacy Act, Title II of the federal Workforce Investment Act of 1998. 7 Section 6. In addition to the appropriations herein 8 made, all gifts, grants, contributions, insurance proceeds or 9 entitlements, in excess of the amount carried in this act, 10 including grants by the Congress of the United States, municipalities or counties, to any department, division, 11 12 board, bureau, commission, agency, institution, office or 13 officer of the State of Alabama are hereby appropriated and, 14 in the event the same are recurring, are reappropriated to 15 such department, division, board, bureau, commission, agency, 16 institution, office or officer to be used only for the purpose or purposes for which the grant or contribution was or shall 17 be made. Further, all state, county, municipal and educational 18

entities are authorized to disburse such sums as deemed 1 2 necessary by mutual agreement between said entities and the 3 State of Alabama, Department of Examiners of Public Accounts to partially defray the cost of auditing services performed by 4 5 said agency. All such sums are hereby appropriated and 6 reappropriated if necessary to the Department of Examiners of Public Accounts for audit services, to be expended through the 7 fund established by Section 41-5-24, Code of Alabama 1975. 8

Section 7. The State Superintendent of Education 9 10 shall make requisitions to the State Comptroller in favor of the proper beneficiary in accordance with the law and rules 11 12 and regulations governing the expenditure or disbursement of 13 any and all funds appropriated to the State Department of Education and/or the State Board of Education in this act, 14 15 whereupon the Comptroller shall issue his warrant therefor. 16 All other appropriations in this act shall be paid after 17 proper requisitions are made to the State Comptroller in the 18 manner now provided by law.

19 Section 8. Nothing in this act shall be construed to 20 affect or repeal any law authorizing or permitting any 21 college, school or other education or eleemosynary institution 22 of the State to receive, collect or disburse any fees, 23 tuitions, charges, sales, endowments, trusts or income 24 therefrom, which are now or may hereafter be authorized to 25 receive, collect or disburse. The receiving college, school or

institution shall further maintain separate accounts for such
 receipts or shall maintain a system of accounting which will
 show a cash flow of such receipts received under the provision
 of this appropriation.

5 Section 9. The appropriations made herein to the departments, boards, offices, commissions, and agencies 6 include the amount necessary and said departments, boards, 7 8 offices, commissions, and agencies are hereby directed to make 9 the transfer of funds to the State Personnel Department in the 10 amounts enumerated in the general appropriations act for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2012. All agencies and 11 institutions enumerated in this act that receive services from 12 13 other governmental agencies enumerated in this act or the 14 general appropriations act shall make full payment in a timely 15 manner (as determined by the Department of Finance) for such 16 services.

Section 10. All encumbered balances of a previous 17 fiscal year appropriation other than the exclusions authorized 18 19 by the Code of Alabama 1975, Section 41-4-93, shall lapse no 20 later than September 30 of the fiscal year immediately 21 following the fiscal year for which the appropriation was made 22 and shall revert to the credit of the Education Trust Fund or 23 earmarked fund from which the appropriation or appropriations 24 were made.

Section 11. Upon certification to the Director of 1 2 Finance by the State Attorney General that a federal court has 3 ordered the State of Alabama to pay claims, attorney fees, or other costs relating to said court order, funds are hereby 4 5 appropriated to the affected department, board, bureau, or commission in the amount necessary to satisfy that court 6 order. Such appropriations are in addition to any other 7 8 appropriation heretofore or hereafter made in this 9 appropriation act. Such appropriations are conditioned upon 10 the availability of funds and a determination by the Director 11 of Finance that other current appropriations are not available for court-ordered payments. 12

13 Section 12. For FY 2012, local boards of education 14 may exercise flexibility among line item expenditures, not to 15 create a reduction of earned teacher units and/or local board 16 of education support personnel.

17 Section 13. The State Superintendent of Education 18 may approve a request by a local board of education for 19 redirecting Other Current Expense funds designated for pass-through calculations to their local Child Nutrition 20 21 Program if the redirected funds do not prevent the Child 22 Nutrition Program of that local board of education from 23 maintaining a fund balance equal to or greater than a 24 two-month operating reserve.

Section 14. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this act or any other act, any amount from appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2011 to the various state agencies and institutions in this act which are unexpended and reverted on September 30, 2011 are hereby reappropriated to the respective offices for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2011.

8 Section 15. If merit pay increases are reinstated 9 after December 31, 2011, current anniversary dates will be 10 maintained for all employees. Agencies are prohibited from 11 adjusting employee anniversary dates to obtain merit pay 12 increases at an earlier date.

13 Section 16. The appropriations made herein to the 14 departments, boards, offices, commissions and agencies include 15 the amounts necessary to pay the State Employee Health 16 Insurance Board (SEIB). The SEIB rate shall be \$765 per month 17 for each full-time employee for the fiscal year ending 18 September 30, 2012. The SEIB shall adjust the insurance 19 program wherever appropriate to maintain the aforementioned fixed rate. 20

21 Section 17. This Act anticipates \$0 in an 22 unappropriated or unanticipated ending balance in the 23 Education Trust Fund. Notwithstanding any other law, if FY 24 2012 ends with a balance in the ETF, 50% of any ending balance 25 must be transferred by the Director of Finance toward

repayment of the Rainy Day Account as provided for in
 Amendment 803 to the Alabama Constitution.

Section 18. If any section, paragraph, sentence,
clause, provision or portion of this act or all or any portion
of the appropriations herein made is held unconstitutional or
invalid, it shall not affect any other section, paragraph,
sentence, clause, provision or portion of this act or any
other appropriation or appropriations or portion thereof
hereby made not in and of itself unconstitutional or invalid.

Section 19. All laws or parts of laws, general,
 special, private or local in conflict with or inconsistent
 with the provisions of this act are hereby expressly repealed.

Section 20. This act shall become effective onOctober 1, 2011.
