11	WHEREAS, it is with a profound sense of loss that
12	the death of James Arness is recorded; Mr. Arness died at his
13	home in Los Angeles, California, on June 3, 2011, at the age
14	of 88 years, while mourning his death, we take time to
15	celebrate his remarkable life and say goodbye to our beloved
16	television western hero, Marshal Matt Dillon, who presided
17	over the frontier town of Dodge City; and
18	WHEREAS, Mr. Arness was born in Minneapolis and was
19	the older brother of actor Peter Graves, who died in 2010;
20	after high school, Mr. Arness enlisted in the US Army and
21	served in WWII, where he was severely wounded during Operation
22	Shingle at Anzio, Italy, in 1944; his decorations include: The
23	Bronze Star Medal, the Purple Heart, the
24	European-African-Middle Eastern Campaign Medal with three
25	bronze battle stars, the World War II Victory Medal, and the
26	Combat Infantryman Badge; and

WHEREAS, following his military service, Mr. Arness hitchhiked to Hollywood and began his acting career in 1947 as Loretta Young's brother in the movie, The Farmer's Daughter; upon the recommendation of his friend, actor John Wayne, Mr. Arness began his role of Marshal Dillon in 1955 in the series, Gunsmoke, which aired on CBS for 20 years; and

WHEREAS, after Gunsmoke, Mr. Arness, appeared in many other western-themed movies and television series; for his contribution to the television industry, Mr. Arness has a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame, was inducted into the Western Performers Hall of Fame at the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum in Oklahoma City, was inducted into the Santa Clarita Walk of Western Stars in 2006, was nominated for three Emmy Awards, and on the 50th Anniversary of television in 1989, was chosen by People magazine as the 6th top television star of all time; and

WHEREAS, a shy and sensitive man who enjoyed poetry, sail boat racing, and surfing, Mr. Arness' autobiography was released in 2001; while his height barred him from becoming the naval fighter pilot of his dreams, he cast a tall shadow as Marshal Matt Dillon, an enduring and endearing western hero; James Arness was genuinely loved as well as respected by those who knew him; now therefore,
