7	HOUSE RESOLUTION
8	ENCOURAGING LANDOWNERS, CONSERVATION ORGANIZATIONS,
9	AND THE STATE OF ARKANSAS TO TAKE FULL ADVANTAGE OF
10	FEDERALLY-APPROVED AND STATE-APPROVED POLICIES TO
11	SUSTAIN THE STRENGTH OF ARKANSAS'S AGRICULTURAL AND
12	RURAL LEGACY FOR FUTURE GENERATIONS; AND ENCOURAGING
13	PARTICIPATION IN THE ENHANCED EASEMENT INCENTIVE.

17	ENCOURAGING THE USE OF EXISTING
18	GOVERNMENTAL POLICIES TO SUSTAIN THE
19	STRENGTH OF ARKANSAS'S AGRICULTURAL AND
20	RURAL LEGACY.

23	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE EIGHTY-EIGHTH GENERAL
24	ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:
25	
26	WHEREAS, The Enhanced Easement Incentive:
27	(1) Raises the deduction a donor can take for donating a
28	conservation easement from thirty percent (30%) of his or her adjusted gross
29	income in any year to fifty percent (50%);
30	(2) Allows qualifying farmers and ranchers to deduct up to one
31	hundred percent (100%) of their income; and
32	(3) Extends the carry-forward period for a donor to take tax
33	deductions for voluntary conservation agreements from five (5) to fifteen
34	(15) years in addition to the year of donation; and
35	
36	WHEREAS, Without the enhanced easement incentive, a landowner earning



1 fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) a year who donated a one million dollar 2 (\$1,000,000) conservation easement could take a fifteen thousand dollar 3 (\$15,000) deduction for the year of the donation and for an additional five 4 (5) years, a total of ninety thousand dollars (\$90,000) in tax deductions; 5 and 6 7 WHEREAS, The enhanced easement deduction allows that landowner to 8 deduct twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) for the year of the donation 9 and then for an additional fifteen (15) years. That is four hundred thousand 10 dollars (\$400,000) in deductions. If the landowner qualifies as a farmer or 11 rancher, he or she can zero out his or her taxes. In that case, he or she 12 could take a maximum of eight hundred thousand dollars (\$800,000) in deductions for his or her million dollar (\$1,000,000) gift; and 13 14 15 WHEREAS, While a person may never deduct more than the fair market 16 value of the gift, this change simply allows landowners who previously could 17 not deduct the full value of their gift to deduct more of that value; and 18 19 WHEREAS, The enhanced easement incentive defines a farmer or rancher as 20 someone who receives more than fifty percent (50%) of his or her income from 21 "the trade or business of farming", and the law references an estate tax 22 provision Internal Revenue Code § 2032A(e)(5) to define activities that count 23 as farming. Specifically, those activities include: 24 (1) Cultivating the soil or raising or harvesting any 25 agricultural or horticultural commodity, including the raising, shearing, 26 feeding, caring for, training, and management of animals on a farm; 27 (2) Handling, drying, packing, grading, or storing on a farm any 28 agricultural or horticultural commodity in its unmanufactured state, but only 29 if the owner, tenant, or operator of the farm regularly produces more than 30 one-half (1/2) of the commodity so treated; and 31 (3) The planting, cultivating, caring for, or cutting of trees, 32 or the preparation, other than milling of trees for market; and 33 34 WHEREAS, The qualified farmer or rancher provision also applies to 35 farmers who are organized as C corporations and for an easement to qualify

for the special treatment, it must contain a restriction requiring that the

3	NOW THEREFORE,
4	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE EIGHTY-EIGHTH GENERAL
5	ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:
6	
7	THAT the House of Representatives encourages the use of existing
8	governmental policies to sustain the strength of Arkansas's agricultural and
9	rural legacy.
10	
11	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the House of Representatives seeks to
12	preserve the state's rural heritage and economic strength through
13	conservation of its greatest assets: agricultural land, forests, unspoiled
14	natural area, wildlife habitat, and water resources.
15	
16	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that upon adoption of this resolution, a copy of
17	this resolution shall be transmitted to each member of the Arkansas
18	Congressional Delegation.
