FACT SHEET FOR S.B. 1171

unlawful feeding; wildlife; exception

Purpose

Adds placing holiday-related decorations outside of a residence or property as an exception to unlawful feeding of wildlife.

Background

A person commits unlawful feeding of wildlife if the person: 1) intentionally, knowingly or recklessly feeds, attracts or otherwise entices wildlife into an area; and 2) is in a county with a population of more than 280,000 persons. Exceptions are granted for: 1) a person lawfully taking wildlife pursuant to statute and the Arizona Game and Fish Commission rules; 2) public employees acting within the scope of their authority for public safety or for wildlife management purposes; 3) normal agricultural or livestock operational practices; and 4) feeding tree squirrels or birds (A.R.S. § 13-2927). Unlawful feeding of wildlife is a petty offense. Statute requires a person charged with a petty offense to pay a fine of not more than \$300 fixed by the court (A.R.S. § 13-802).

There is no anticipated fiscal impact to the state General Fund associated with this legislation.

Provisions

- 1. Adds placing holiday-related decorations outside of a residence or property as an exception to unlawful feeding of wildlife, if the decorations are not intended to feed, attract or otherwise entice wildlife.
- 2. Becomes effective on the general effective date.
