### **Summary of Legislation**

Effective July 1, 2025, the bill modifies the definition of "state trooper" for Public Employees' Retirement Association (PERA) purposes to include certain employees of the Department of Public Safety's (CDPS) Division of Fire Prevention and Control.

### **Background**

State troopers, or safety officers, are a unique classification in PERA; both employers and employees pay an increased contribution rate, enabling state troopers to qualify for retirement benefits sooner. The state trooper category currently includes peace officers with the Colorado State Patrol and Colorado Bureau of Investigation; corrections officers with the Department of Corrections and Human Services; firefighters with the Division of Fire Prevention and Control in the CDPS; wildlife officers and recreation officers with Colorado Parks and Wildlife; and county sheriffs, undersheriffs, deputy sheriffs, noncertified deputy sheriffs, and detention officers in the Local Government division.

While some classes of firefighters are already considered state troopers under current law, the bill broadens the definition to include fire management personnel and additional classes of firefighting personnel that are expected to take effect in the future.

Under the bill, the CDPS employer contribution rate for applicable staff will increase from 11.61 percent to 14.31 percent, and employee contribution rates will increase from 11.0 percent to 13.0 percent.

## **State Expenditures**

The bill increases state expenditures in CDPS by \$15,195 per year beginning in FY 2025-26, paid from a mix of General Fund and cash funds. Employer contributions will increase by three percentage points annually for four existing employees in CDPS. Costs may increase in future years if the department hires new classes of firefighters that would otherwise not be considered state troopers.

## **Other Budget Impacts**

**General Fund reserve.** Under current law, an amount equal to 15 percent of General Fund appropriations must be set aside in the General Fund statutory reserve. Based on this fiscal note, the bill is expected to increase the amount of General Fund held in reserve by the amounts shown in Table 1, decreasing the amount of General Fund available for other purposes.

## **Statutory Public Entity**

PERA will receive additional funding from CDPS and its employees. Because the change in benefit classification is applicable to prospective service credit, not service credit already accrued, benefits will be adjusted proportionally for existing CDPS staff. Because state troopers are eligible for disability benefits regardless of years of service, PERA may have increased expenditures to cover any disability benefits for CDPS staff.

#### **Effective Date**

The bill was signed into law by the Governor on May 24, 2024, and takes effect on August 7, 2024, assuming no referendum petition is filed.
