### A BILL FOR AN ACT

CONCERNING AN EXEMPTION FROM DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME.

## **Bill Summary**

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. Currently, "United States Mountain Standard Time" (MST) is the standard time within Colorado, except during the period of daylight saving time (i.e., the second Sunday in March to the first Sunday in November) when time is advanced one hour. The bill exempts the state from observing daylight saving time, making MST the standard time year-round.

1	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:
2	SECTION 1. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 2-4-109, amend (1)
3	and (2) as follows:
4	2-4-109. Standard time - exemption from daylight saving time.
5	(1) The standard time within the state except as provided in subsection
6	(2) of this section, is that which is now known and designated by act of
7	congress as "United States Mountain Standard Time".
8	(2) From two o'clock antemeridian on the second Sunday of
9	March, until two o'clock antemeridian on the first Sunday of November,
10	or such other times and days as may, from time to time, be designated by
11	act of congress, the standard time in this state so established shall be one
12	hour in advance of the standard time now known as "United States
13	Mountain Standard Time" PURSUANT TO THE "UNIFORM TIME ACT OF
14	1966", 15 U.S.C. SEC. 260 ET SEQ., THE ENTIRETY OF THE STATE OF
15	COLORADO, INCLUDING ALL POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS THEREOF, IS EXEMPT
16	FROM SECTION 260a (a)(1) OF THAT ACT PROVIDING FOR THE ANNUAL
17	ADVANCEMENT OF TIME, COMMONLY REFERRED TO AS "DAYLIGHT SAVING
18	TIME".
19	SECTION 2. Act subject to petition - effective date. This act
20	takes effect November 5, 2017; except that, if a referendum petition is
21	filed pursuant to section 1 (3) of article V of the state constitution against
22	this act or an item, section, or part of this act within the ninety-day period
23	after final adjournment of the general assembly, then the act, item,
24	section, or part will not take effect unless approved by the people at the
25	general election to be held in November 2018 and, in such case, will take
