A BILL FOR AN ACT

101 CONCERNING PERSONAL BELIEF EXEMPTIONS TO IMMUNIZATION 102 REQUIREMENTS FOR CHILDREN PRIOR TO ATTENDING SCHOOL.

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. When a parent, guardian, emancipated student, or student 18 years of age or older has a personal belief that is opposed to immunizations, the bill requires the person to submit to the student's school a statement of exemption that includes:

! The signature of a health care provider or an authorized

representative of the department of public health and environment (department) or of a county, district, or municipal public health agency who is permitted and qualified to administer vaccines stating that the parent, guardian, or student received information disclosing the benefits and risks of immunizations to the student and the community; or

! A certificate of completion of an on-line education module developed by the infant immunization program at the department that discloses the benefits and risks of immunization to the student and the community.

The bill also requires the department to promulgate rules concerning student immunizations.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

SECTION 1. Legislative declaration. (1) The general assembly hereby finds and declares:

- (a) Vaccines are considered one of the greatest public health achievements of the twentieth century, and save an estimated three million children's lives every year;
- (b) Vaccines are cost-effective, and for every dollar we spend immunizing a child up to six years of age, more than \$10 is saved in direct and indirect costs;
- (c) High rates of immunization coverage are necessary to prevent the spread of vaccine-preventable diseases;
- (d) Children who are not vaccinated are twenty-two to twenty-eight times more likely to get pertussis (whooping cough) than their immunized peers, and with Colorado pertussis cases at epidemic levels, high exemption rates can increase the risk of pertussis and other vaccine-preventable diseases within Colorado schools and communities;
- (e) Personal belief exemptions are the primary reason for exemption from recommended vaccines and account for over ninety

1 percent of all exemptions for Colorado kindergartners from 2003-2012; 2 (f) Colorado has one of the highest rates of personal belief 3 exemption for immunizations in the United States, which translates to 4 nearly three thousand kindergartners entering school unvaccinated against 5 one or more vaccine-preventable diseases each year; 6 States with permissive or easy procedures for claiming 7 personal belief exemptions have higher rates of vaccine-preventable 8 diseases; states with policies that make it easy to exempt children from 9 immunization were associated with a ninety percent higher incidence of 10 whooping cough in 2011; and 11 (h) A parent's decision to refuse vaccination for their child carries 12 risk for their child and the community at large and, therefore, it is critical 13 that Colorado develop a policy that ensures careful consideration of the 14 research about vaccine benefits and risks. 15 16 **SECTION 2.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 25-4-903, amend (2) 17 introductory portion and (2) (b); and **add** (2) (c), (2.5), and (5) as follows: 18 **25-4-903.** Exemptions from immunization - rules. (2) It is the 19 responsibility of the parent or legal guardian to have his or her child 20 immunized unless the child is exempted pursuant to this section. A 21 student shall be IS exempted from receiving the required immunizations 22 in the following manner: 23 (b) By submitting to the student's school a statement of exemption 24 signed by one parent or guardian, or the emancipated student, or student 25 eighteen years of age or older that the parent, guardian, or student is an 26 adherent to a religious belief whose teachings are opposed to

immunizations; or that the parent or guardian, or the emancipated student,

3	(c) BY SUBMITTING TO THE STUDENT'S SCHOOL A STATEMENT OF
4	EXEMPTION SIGNED BY ONE PARENT OR GUARDIAN, EMANCIPATED
5	STUDENT, OR STUDENT EIGHTEEN YEARS OF AGE OR OLDER THAT THE
6	PARENT, GUARDIAN, OR STUDENT HAS A PERSONAL BELIEF THAT IS

8	INCLUDE OR BE ACCOMPANIED BY:

12	DISTRICT, OR MUNICIPAL PUBLIC HEALTH AGENCY WHO IS PERMITTED AND
13	QUALIFIED TO ADMINISTER VACCINES ON A WRITTEN DISCLOSURE STATING
14	THAT THE PARENT, GUARDIAN, OR STUDENT RECEIVED INFORMATION
15	DISCLOSING THE BENEFITS AND RISKS OF IMMUNIZATIONS TO THE STUDENT
16	AND THE COMMUNITY; OR
17	(II) A CERTIFICATE OF COMPLETION OF AN ON-LINE EDUCATION
18	MODULE DEVELOPED BY THE INFANT IMMUNIZATION PROGRAM AT THE
19	DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT THAT DISCLOSES THE
20	BENEFITS AND RISKS OF IMMUNIZATION TO THE STUDENT AND THE
21	COMMUNITY.
22	(2.5) THE STATE BOARD OF HEALTH SHALL PROMULGATE RULES
23	REGARDING:
24	(a) THE CONTENT OF THE REQUIRED DISCLOSURES, INCLUDING
25	EVIDENCE-BASED RESEARCH, RESOURCES AND INFORMATION FROM
26	CREDIBLE SCIENTIFIC AND PUBLIC HEALTH ORGANIZATIONS, AND
27	PEER-REVIEWED STUDIES; AND

1	(b) The frequency of receiving disclosures and the
2	SUBMISSION OF EXEMPTION FORMS.
3	(5) EACH SCHOOL SHALL MAKE THE IMMUNIZATION AND
4	EXEMPTION RATES OF THEIR ENROLLED STUDENT POPULATION PUBLICLY
5	AVAILABLE UPON REQUEST.
6	SECTION 3. In Colorado Revised Statutes, add 25-4-910 as
7	follows:
8	25-4-910. Immunization data collection. (1) The DEPARTMENT
9	OF PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT, IN CONSULTATION WITH OTHER
10	STATE DEPARTMENTS, SHALL ESTABLISH A JOINT POLICY ON
11	IMMUNIZATION DATA COLLECTION AND SHARING.
12	(2) THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT
13	SHALL PROVIDE ASSISTANCE TO THE SCHOOL DISTRICTS WITH THE
14	ANALYSIS AND INTERPRETATION OF THE IMMUNIZATION DATA.
15	SECTION 4. Effective date. This act takes effect July 1, 2015.
16	SECTION 5. Safety clause. The general assembly hereby finds,
17	determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate
18	preservation of the public peace, health, and safety.
