HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 19-1014

101 CONCERNING THE DECLARATION OF APRIL 28, 2019, THROUGH MAY 5,

102 **2019**, AS "HOLOCAUST AWARENESS WEEK".

1 WHEREAS, Prejudice, bigotry, bias, and racism have been the 2 cause of conflict, war, and mass atrocities throughout human history; and

WHEREAS, The Holocaust was the systematic, bureaucratic,
state-sponsored persecution and murder of Jews by the Nazi regime and
its collaborators; and

6 WHEREAS, The Nazis, who came to power in Germany in 7 January 1933, asserted that Germans were racially superior and that Jews 8 and others were inferior and an alien threat to the so-called German racial 9 community; and





1 WHEREAS, Hitler used anti-Semitism as a political weapon to 2 gain popular support, blaming Jews for all of Germany's problems, 3 including the country's defeat in World War I, the economic depression, 4 and the Bolshevik threat of communism; it made little difference that 5 Hitler's accusations were blatantly contradictory and his so-called facts 6 were fabricated; and

WHEREAS, Between 1933 and 1945, Nazi Germany and its
collaborators murdered 6 million Jews (2 out of every 3 Jews who lived
throughout Europe), 1.5 million of whom were children, as well as 5
million other civilians, including Sinti, Roma, people with intellectual or
developmental disabilities, gay men, Jehovah's Witnesses, Soviet
prisoners of war, and political dissidents; and

WHEREAS, We recall that in the aftermath of war, Israel, a
thriving democracy and close ally and friend of the United States, became
a refuge for many survivors who endured the ravages of the Holocaust;
and

WHEREAS, We gratefully acknowledge the more than 26,500
non-Jews who, at great risk to themselves, saved Jews during the
Holocaust from extermination and have been designated Righteous
Among the Nations by Yad Vashem - the World Holocaust Remembrance
Center; and

22 WHEREAS, Today, as we mourn the loss of those who were killed 23 and consider the terrible experiences of those who suffered and lived 24 through the Holocaust, we note that anti-Semitic acts are not a thing of 25 the past: According to the Anti-Defamation League, in Colorado, the 26 number of reported anti-Semitic incidents more than tripled between 2015 27 and 2017, when they rose from 18 to 57 incidents; and in 2018, there 28 were 39 anti-Semitic incidents reported in Colorado, which is still more 29 than twice the number of incidents in 2015; and

WHEREAS, We must also acknowledge that ethnic cleansing,
 genocide, terrorism, crimes against humanity, and wars on civilian
 populations are not relics of the past; and

WHEREAS, Regretfully, the phrase "Never Again" has become
"Yet Again", as we see today and in the recent past so much brutality in
places like Myanmar, Syria, Iraq, Nigeria, Bosnia, Cambodia, Rwanda,
the Sudan, and the world's newest country, South Sudan; and

1	WHEREAS, Today, while we remember the Holocaust, we focus
2	our attention on the passing of Holocaust survivors who provided
3	firsthand accounts of the terrors they endured, leaving their children and
4	grandchildren as the last generations to know the stories of the Holocaust
5	directly from those who lived through it; and
6	WHEREAS, While we are fortunate that several organizations in
7	Colorado are dedicated to retelling the stories of the Holocaust and other
8	genocides, it is not enough; far too many people, including most students,
9	need more opportunities to learn about these atrocities; and
10	WHEREAS, It is our responsibility to bear witness to the truth of
11	the horrors of the Holocaust and its many lessons; now, therefore,
12 13 14 15	Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Seventy-second General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the Senate concurring herein:
16	That we, the members of the General Assembly:
17 18	(1) Declare the week of April 28, 2019, through May 5, 2019, as "Holocaust Awareness Week"; and
19	(2) Declare that the people of Colorado should use these days to
20	teach and remember the great injustices of the past and to commit to
21	preventing such atrocities in the future.
22	<i>Be It Further Resolved</i> , That copies of this Joint Resolution be sent
23	to the Jewish Community Relations Council of JEWISHcolorado; the
24	Mountain States Regional Office of the Anti-Defamation League; the
25	Colorado Coalition for Genocide Awareness & Action; the Holocaust
26	Awareness Institute at the University of Denver's Center for Judaic
27	Studies; the Interfaith Alliance of Colorado; the Mizel Museum; the
28	Denver Parks & Recreation Department's Babi Yar Park; the Mountain
29	States Regional Office of the Jewish National Fund; the United States
30 21	Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, D.C.; and the University of

31 Colorado Program in Jewish Studies.
