	A BILL FOR AN ACT
101	CONCERNING THE ABILITY OF A NURSING FACILITY TO BE AWARDED A
102	GRANT FROM THE NURSING HOME PENALTY CASH FUND FOR
103	PROJECTS RELATED TO INFECTION PREVENTION AND CONTROL.

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. Current law directs the departments of public health and environment and health care policy and financing to consider allocating money in the nursing home penalty cash fund for grants to be approved for measures that will benefit residents of nursing facilities by fostering innovation and improving the quality of life and care at the facilities. The bill adds to the list of possible measures eligible for grant funding projects aimed at infection prevention and control.

Awards for infection prevention and control are limited to education support, workforce support, and physical enhancements for infection control.

1 *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:* 2 **SECTION 1. Legislative declaration.** (1) The general assembly 3 hereby finds and declares that: 4 (a) As of January 9, 2022, there have been 1,849 deaths in nursing 5 facilities attributable to COVID-19, the disease caused by the novel 6 SARS-CoV-2 virus; 7 (b) Between January and November of 2020, Colorado had the 8 worst rate of death per occupied nursing facility bed in the United States. 9 During that time, Colorado nursing facilities reported 1,118 deaths from 10 COVID-19, twice the rate of death as the national average. Nursing facilities are subject to a variety of legal and 11 12 regulatory requirements at the state, federal, and local levels. During the 13 COVID-19 pandemic, these requirements were subject to frequent 14 changes, some of which were not necessarily beneficial to patient safety 15 and quality. 16 (d) This uncertain regulatory climate, coupled with the inability 17 of the state to effectively operate a system for testing and contact tracing, 18 presented nursing facilities with considerable operational challenges; 19 (e) The nursing home penalty cash fund holds the state's share of 20 civil money penalty funds. Pursuant to federal law, these funds may be 21 reinvested to support activities that benefit nursing facility residents and 22 that protect or improve their quality of care or quality of life, such as 23 efforts to enhance infection control and prevention programs.

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1 (f) The COVID-19 pandemic has underscored the importance of 2 high-quality infection control and prevention programs in nursing homes 3 in order to effectively manage the spread of an especially transmissible 4 and virulent virus such as SARS-CoV-2. 5 (2) The general assembly therefore determines that grants awarded from the nursing home penalty cash fund should include initiatives in the 6 7 nursing home industry that will enable facilities across the state to 8 enhance their infection control and prevention programs and support 9 compliance with various laws and regulations in the interest of keeping 10 residents safe from COVID-19 and any other future public health 11 emergency. 12 **SECTION 2.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 25-1-107.5, amend 13 (4)(c)(II)(D) and (4)(c)(II)(E); and **add** (4)(c)(II)(F) and (4)(c.5) as 14 follows: 15 25-1-107.5. Additional authority of department - rules -16 remedies against nursing facilities - criteria for recommending 17 assessments for civil penalties - cooperation with department of 18 health care policy and financing - nursing home penalty cash fund -19 nursing home innovations grant board - reports - transfer of 20 contracts to the department. (4) (c) The departments shall consider, as 21 a basis for distribution from the nursing home penalty cash fund, the 22 following: 23 (II) Grants to be approved for measures that will benefit residents 24 of nursing facilities by fostering innovation and improving the quality of 25 life and care at the facilities, including, but not limited to: 26

(D) Education and consultation for purposes of identifying and

implementing resident-centered care initiatives in nursing facilities; and

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1	(E) Projects that support or compliment statewide quality and
2	safety goals of the departments; AND

6	(c.5) (I) The departments shall create an abbreviated

8	FOR PROJECTS FUNDED PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION $(4)(c)(II)(F)$ OF THIS
9	SECTION.
10	(II) DISTRIBUTIONS MADE PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION $(4)(c)(II)(F)$
11	OF THIS SECTION ARE LIMITED TO DISTRIBUTIONS TO PROVIDE A NURSING
12	FACILITY WITH THE FOLLOWING:
13	(A) EDUCATIONAL SUPPORT, INCLUDING THE PROVISION OF
14	ADVANCED INFECTION PREVENTIONIST TRAINING OR CERTIFICATION TO
15	NURSING FACILITY STAFF; TRAINING OF RESIDENTS AND FAMILY MEMBERS
16	OF RESIDENTS IN INFECTION CONTROL PROCEDURES, INCLUDING THE
17	APPROPRIATE PARTICIPATION IN CORRECTING DEFICIENT PRACTICES; THE
18	DEPLOYMENT OF INFECTION CONTROL SPECIALISTS WHO CONDUCT
19	NURSING FACILITY VISITS TO PROVIDE ON-SITE TRAINING AND
20	CORRECTION;
21	(B) WORKFORCE SUPPORT, INCLUDING SUPPLEMENTAL STAFFING
22	DURING ENHANCED EDUCATION EFFORTS AND PROVIDING STAFFING
23	COVERAGE FOR MANAGERIAL AND FRONTLINE STAFF ATTENDING
24	SPECIALIZED TRAINING; AND
25	(C) PHYSICAL ENHANCEMENTS FOR INFECTION CONTROL,
26	INCLUDING THE PURCHASE OF AIR HANDLING SYSTEMS SHOWN TO REDUCE
27	AIRBORNE DISEASE TRANSMISSION FOR NURSING FACILITIES WITH

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1	APPROPRIATE HEATING, VENTILATION, AND AIR CONDITIONING SYSTEMS;
2	IMPROVEMENT OF OUTDOOR SPACE ACCESS, INCLUDING DOOR OPENERS,
3	CONCRETE, OR RAMP MODIFICATIONS; AND SIGN-IN AND TEMPERATURE
4	SCREENING KIOSKS AND TOOLS AT NURSING FACILITY ENTRANCES TO HELP
5	EASE THE BURDEN ON FACILITIES AND REDUCE THE BURDEN ON STAFF.
6	SECTION 3. Act subject to petition - effective date. This act
7	takes effect at 12:01 a.m. on the day following the expiration of the
8	ninety-day period after final adjournment of the general assembly; except
9	that, if a referendum petition is filed pursuant to section 1 (3) of article V
10	of the state constitution against this act or an item, section, or part of this
11	act within such period, then the act, item, section, or part will not take
12	effect unless approved by the people at the general election to be held in
13	November 2022 and, in such case, will take effect on the date of the
14	official declaration of the vote thereon by the governor.

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
