## A BILL FOR AN ACT

101 CONCERNING THE AUTHORITY OF LICENSED HEALTH CARE FACILITIES

102 TO REDISPENSE UNUSED MEDICATIONS.

#### **Bill Summary**

The bill deletes the requirement that medications be donated by a patient, resident, or the patient's or resident's next of kin before allowing a licensed health care facility to donate the unused medications to another patient in the facility or to a nonprofit entity. Currently, medications in the possession of a facility are destroyed when the patient dies or is

1 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

2 **SECTION 1. Legislative declaration.** The general assembly 3 finds and determines that the devastating earthquake that hit Haiti on 4 January 12, 2010, has left the country in dire need of medications to help 5 those injured in the earthquake and, no matter how much the United 6 States gives, there cannot be enough relief for the desperately needy 7 victims. Therefore, it is the intent of the general assembly to make it 8 easier for health care facilities to donate unused medications to nonprofit 9 entities that are giving their efforts to the relief effort in Haiti by allowing 10 the facilities to make the decision whether unused medications may be 11 donated to help the nonprofit entities with medical relief efforts.

SECTION 2. 12-22-133 (2), Colorado Revised Statutes, is
amended to read:

14 12-22-133. Unused medication - licensed facilities - reuse -15 rules. (2) (a) (I) If donated by the patient, resident, or the patient's or 16 resident's next of kin UPON THE DEATH OR DISCHARGE OF A PATIENT OR 17 A RESIDENT OR IF A PATIENT'S OR RESIDENT'S MEDICATION IS 18 DISCONTINUED, a licensed facility may return unused medication to a 19 pharmacist within the licensed facility in order for the medication to be 20 redispensed to another patient or resident of that licensed facility. A 21 pharmacist may redispense a returned medication that is prescribed to a 22 patient or resident of a licensed facility if the medication was originally 23 dispensed to another patient or resident of the licensed facility or may 24 donate a returned medication to a nonprofit entity that has the legal 25 authority to possess the medication.

(II) A LICENSED FACILITY MAY DONATE UNUSED MEDICATIONS TO
 A NONPROFIT ENTITY THAT HAS THE EXPRESS PURPOSE OF PROVIDING
 MEDICAL SUPPLIES FOR THE RELIEF OF VICTIMS WHO ARE IN URGENT NEED
 AS A RESULT OF NATURAL OR OTHER TYPES OF DISASTERS. THE PROCESS
 OF DONATING THE UNUSED MEDICATIONS TO THE NONPROFIT ENTITY
 SHALL BE REVIEWED BY A LICENSED PHARMACIST.

7 (b) Medications shall only be available to be dispensed to another
8 person or donated to a nonprofit entity under this section if the
9 medications are:

10 (a) (I) Liquid and the vial is still sealed and properly stored;

(b) (II) Individually packaged and the packaging has not been
damaged; or

13 (c) (III) In the original, unopened, sealed, and tamper-evident unit
 14 dose packaging.

SECTION 3. Safety clause. The general assembly hereby finds,
determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate
preservation of the public peace, health, and safety.
