AN ACT CONCERNING ISSUES RELATING TO THE PROVISION OF EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION AND SERVICES IN CONNECTICUT.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

- Section 1. Section 19a-87b of the general statutes is repealed and the following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective July 1, 2021*):
- 3 (a) No person, group of persons, association, organization, 4 corporation, institution or agency, public or private, shall maintain a
- 5 family child care home, as [defined] <u>described</u> in section 19a-77, without
- 6 a license issued by the Commissioner of Early Childhood. Licensure
- 7 forms shall be obtained from the Office of Early Childhood.
- 8 Applications for licensure shall be made to the commissioner on forms
- 9 provided by the office and shall contain the information required by
- 10 regulations adopted under this section. The licensure and application
- 11 forms shall contain a notice that false statements made therein are
- 12 punishable in accordance with section 53a-157b. Applicants shall state,
- in writing, that they are in compliance with the regulations adopted by
- 14 the commissioner pursuant to subsection (f) of this section. Before a
- 15 family child care home license is granted, the office shall make an

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inquiry and investigation which shall include a visit and inspection of the premises for which the license is requested. Any inspection conducted by the office shall include an inspection for evident sources of lead poisoning. The office shall provide for a chemical analysis of any paint chips found on such premises. Neither the commissioner nor the commissioner's designee shall require an annual inspection for homes seeking license renewal or for licensed homes, except that the commissioner or the commissioner's designee shall make an unannounced visit, inspection or investigation of each licensed family child care home at least once every year. A licensed family child care home shall not be subject to any conditions on the operation of such home by local officials, other than those imposed by the office pursuant to this subsection, if the home complies with all local codes and ordinances applicable to single and multifamily dwellings.

(b) No person shall act as an assistant or substitute staff member to a person or entity maintaining a family child care home, as defined in section 19a-77, without an approval issued by the commissioner. Any person seeking to act as an assistant or substitute staff member in a family child care home shall submit an application for such approval to the office. Applications for approval shall: (1) Be made to the commissioner on forms provided by the office, (2) contain the information required by regulations adopted under this section, and (3) be accompanied by a fee of fifteen dollars. The approval application forms shall contain a notice that false statements made in such form are punishable in accordance with section 53a-157b.

(c) The commissioner, within available appropriations, shall require each initial applicant or prospective employee of a family child care home in a position requiring the provision of care to a child, including an assistant or substitute staff member and each household member who is sixteen years of age or older, to submit to comprehensive background checks, including state and national criminal history records checks. The criminal history records checks required pursuant to this subsection shall be conducted in accordance with section 29-17a. The commissioner shall also request a check of the state child abuse

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registry established pursuant to section 17a-101k. The commissioner shall notify each licensee of the provisions of this subsection. For purposes of this subsection, "household member" means any person, other than the person who is licensed to conduct, operate or maintain a family child care home, who resides in the family child care home, such as the licensee's spouse or children, tenants and any other occupant.

- (d) An application for initial licensure pursuant to this section shall be accompanied by a fee of forty dollars and such license shall be issued for a term of four years. An application for renewal of a license issued pursuant to this section shall be accompanied by a fee of forty dollars and a certification from the licensee that any child enrolled in the family child care home has received age-appropriate immunizations in accordance with regulations adopted pursuant to subsection (f) of this section. A license issued pursuant to this section shall be renewed for a term of four years. In the case of an applicant submitting an application for renewal of a license that has expired, and who has ceased operations of a family child care home due to such expired license, the commissioner may renew such expired license within thirty days of the date of such expiration upon receipt of an application for renewal that is accompanied by such fee and such certification.
- (e) An application for initial staff approval or renewal of staff approval shall be accompanied by a fee of fifteen dollars. Such approvals shall be issued or renewed for a term of two years.
- (f) The commissioner shall adopt regulations, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 54, to [assure] ensure that family child care homes, as [defined] described in section 19a-77, meet the health, educational and social needs of children utilizing such homes. Such regulations shall ensure that the family child care home is treated as a residence, and not an institutional facility. Such regulations shall specify that each child be protected as age-appropriate by adequate immunization against diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus, poliomyelitis, measles, mumps, rubella, hemophilus influenzae type B and any other vaccine required by the schedule of active immunization adopted pursuant to section 19a-7f.

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Such regulations shall provide appropriate exemptions for children for whom such immunization is medically contraindicated and for children whose parents or guardian objects to such immunization on religious grounds and require that any such objection be accompanied by a statement from such parents or guardian that such immunization would be contrary to the religious beliefs of such child or the parents or guardian of such child, which statement shall be acknowledged, in accordance with the provisions of sections 1-32, 1-34 and 1-35, by (1) a judge of a court of record or a family support magistrate, (2) a clerk or deputy clerk of a court having a seal, (3) a town clerk, (4) a notary public, (5) a justice of the peace, or (6) an attorney admitted to the bar of this state. Such regulations shall also specify conditions under which family child care home providers may administer tests to monitor glucose levels in a child with diagnosed diabetes mellitus, and administer medicinal preparations, including controlled drugs specified in the regulations by the commissioner, to a child receiving child care services at a family child care home pursuant to a written order of a physician licensed to practice medicine in this or another state, an advanced practice registered nurse licensed to prescribe in accordance with section 20-94a or a physician assistant licensed to prescribe in accordance with section 20-12d, and the written authorization of a parent or guardian of such child. Such regulations shall specify appropriate standards for extended care and intermittent short-term overnight care. The commissioner shall inform each licensee, by way of a plain language summary provided not later than sixty days after the regulation's effective date, of any new or changed regulations adopted under this subsection with which a licensee must comply.

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(g) Upon the declaration by the Governor of a civil preparedness emergency pursuant to section 28-9 or a public health emergency pursuant to section 19a-131a, the commissioner may waive the provisions of any regulation adopted pursuant to this section if the commissioner determines that such waiver would not endanger the life, safety or health of any child. The commissioner shall prescribe the duration of such waiver, provided such waiver shall not extend beyond

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the duration of the declared emergency. The commissioner shall establish the criteria by which a waiver request shall be made and the conditions for which a waiver will be granted or denied. The provisions of section 19a-84 shall not apply to a denial of a waiver request under this subsection.

- (h) Any family child care home may provide child care services to homeless children and youths, as defined in 42 USC 11434a, as amended from time to time, for a period not to exceed ninety days without complying with any provision in regulations adopted pursuant to this section relating to immunization and physical examination requirements. Any family child care home that provides child care services to homeless children and youths at such home under this subsection shall maintain a record on file of all homeless children and youths who have attended such home for a period of two years after such homeless children or youths are no longer receiving child care services at such home.
- (i) Any family child care home may provide child care services to a foster child for a period not to exceed forty-five days without complying with any provision in regulations adopted pursuant to this section relating to immunization and physical examination requirements. Any family child care home that provides child care services to a foster child at such home under this subsection shall maintain a record on file of such foster child for a period of two years after such foster child is no longer receiving child care services at such home. For purposes of this subsection, "foster child" means a child who is in the care and custody of the Commissioner of Children and Families and placed in a foster home licensed pursuant to section 17a-114, foster home approved by a child-placing agency licensed pursuant to section 17a-149, facility licensed pursuant to section 17a-145 or with a relative or fictive kin caregiver pursuant to section 17a-114.
- (j) For the fiscal years ending June 30, 2022, to June 30, 2026, inclusive, the Commissioner of Early Childhood may issue a license to maintain a family child care home in the cities of New Britain, New Haven,

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Bridgeport, Stamford or Hartford in accordance with the provisions of 150 151 this chapter to a person or group of persons who have partnered with 152 an association, organization, corporation, institution or agency, public or private, to provide child care services in a space within a facility, 153 154 other than a private family home and that has been approved by the 155 commissioner, that has been provided by such association, 156 organization, corporation, institution or agency. The commissioner shall not approve more than one facility in each such city to be used for 157 licenses issued under this subsection. An application for a license under 158 this subsection shall include a copy of the current fire marshal certificate 159 160 of compliance with the Fire Safety Code, and written verification of 161 compliance with the State Building Code, local zoning and building requirements and local health ordinances. The commissioner may 162 163 require an applicant for a license under this subsection to comply with 164 additional conditions relating to the health and safety of the children who will be served in such facility. The commissioner may waive any 165 requirement that does not apply to such facility. Any license issued 166 167 under this subsection shall expire on June 30, 2026, except that the 168 commissioner may suspend or revoke any such license at any time in 169 accordance with the provisions of section 19a-87e.

Sec. 2. (NEW) (*Effective July 1, 2021*) (a) For the fiscal year ending June 30, 2022, and each fiscal year thereafter, the Office of Higher Education, in collaboration with the Office of Early Childhood, shall, within available appropriations, administer an early childhood educator loan forgiveness grant program to persons who meet the eligibility requirements described in subsection (c) of this section.

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(b) The program shall provide a student loan forgiveness grant to any person (1) who has been continuously employed by a licensed child care center, group child care home or family child care home, as described in section 19a-77 of the general statutes, for at least four years at the time of application, (2) whose annual salary at such licensed child care center is less than fifty thousand dollars per year, and (3) who holds (A) an associate degree with a concentration in early childhood education from a public institution of higher education in the state that is regionally

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accredited, provided such associate degree program is approved by (i) the Board of Regents for Higher Education or the Office of Higher Education, and (ii) the Office of Early Childhood, or (B) a bachelor's degree with a concentration in early childhood education from a public institution of higher education in the state that is regionally accredited, provided such bachelor's degree program is approved by (i) the Board of Regents for Higher Education or the Office of Higher Education, and (ii) the Office of Early Childhood. As used in this subsection, "concentration in early childhood education" has the same meaning as provided in section 10-16p of the general statutes.

(c) Any person who satisfies the eligibility requirements prescribed in subsection (b) of this section shall receive a grant in an amount equal to the remaining balance of such person's federal or state educational loans.

- (d) Persons may apply to the Office of Higher Education for grants under this section at such time and in such manner as the executive director of the Office of Higher Education prescribes.
- (e) Any unexpended funds appropriated for purposes of this section shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year but shall be available for expenditure during the next fiscal year.
- Sec. 3. (NEW) (Effective January 1, 2022, and applicable to taxable years commencing on or after January 1, 2022) (a) For taxable years commencing on or after January 1, 2022, there shall be allowed a credit against the tax imposed under chapter 229 of the general statutes, for any individual who (1) has been employed for at least six months during the taxable year by a child care center, group child care home or family child care home that provides child care services, as such terms are described in section 19a-77 of the general statutes, in this state with the primary responsibility for a classroom of children, and (2) has a Connecticut adjusted gross income of not more than fifty thousand dollars during each taxable year in which the credit is claimed.
 - (b) Such credit shall be in the amount of (1) five hundred dollars for

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216 an individual who has been issued an early childhood teacher 217 credential, pursuant to section 10-520b of the general statutes, (2) one 218 thousand dollars for an individual who holds an associate degree with 219 a concentration in early childhood education from an institution of 220 higher education that is regionally accredited, and (3) one thousand five 221 hundred dollars for an individual who holds at least a bachelor's degree 222 with a concentration in early childhood education from an institution of 223 higher education that is regionally accredited, provided the 224 requirements under subdivisions (1) and (2) of subsection (a) of this 225 section are met for each taxable year in which the credit is claimed.

(c) If the amount of the credit allowed pursuant to this section exceeds the individual's liability for the tax imposed under chapter 229 of the general statutes, the Commissioner of Revenue Services shall treat such excess as an overpayment and, except as provided under section 12-739 of the general statutes or 12-742 of the general statutes, shall refund the amount of such excess, without interest, to the individual.

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- 232 (d) Any individual claiming a credit under this section shall provide 233 any documentation required by the Commissioner of Revenue Services 234 in a form and manner prescribed by said commissioner.
- Sec. 4. Subsection (a) of section 17b-749 of the general statutes is repealed and the following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective July 1*, 2021):
 - (a) The Commissioner of Early Childhood shall establish and operate a child care subsidy program to increase the availability, affordability and quality of child care services for families with a parent or caretaker who (1) is (A) working, [or attending] (B) enrolled in (i) high school, (ii) a public or independent institution of higher education, (iii) a private occupational school authorized pursuant to sections 10a-22a to 10a-22o, inclusive, or (iv) an alternate route to certification program approved by the State Board of Education, or (C) participating in a local Even Start program or other adult education program approved by the Commissioner of Early Childhood; or (2) receives cash assistance under

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the temporary family assistance program from the Department of Social Services and is participating in an education, training or other job preparation activity approved pursuant to subsection (b) of section 17b-688i or subsection (b) of section 17b-689d. Services available under the child care subsidy program shall include the provision of child care subsidies for children under the age of thirteen or children under the age of nineteen with special needs. The Office of Early Childhood shall open and maintain enrollment for the child care subsidy program and shall administer such program within the existing budgetary resources available. The office shall issue a notice on the office's Internet web site any time the office closes the program to new applications, changes eligibility requirements, changes program benefits or makes any other change to the program's status or terms, except the office shall not be required to issue such notice when the office expands program eligibility. Any change in the office's acceptance of new applications, eligibility requirements, program benefits or any other change to the program's status or terms for which the office is required to give notice pursuant to this subsection, shall not be effective until thirty days after the office issues such notice.

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- Sec. 5. Subsection (d) of section 17b-749 of the general statutes is repealed and the following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective July 1*, 2021):
- (d) (1) Not later than July 1, 2015, an applicant determined to be eligible for program benefits by the Commissioner of Early Childhood shall remain eligible for such benefits for a period prescribed by federal law.
 - (2) For purposes of determining the eligibility of an applicant for program benefits under subparagraph (A) of subdivision (1) of subsection (a) of this section, the commissioner shall accept evidence of registration with a job search assistance program administered by the Labor Department. An applicant determined to be eligible for program benefits under this subdivision shall be considered employed half-time and eligible for such benefits for a period of ninety days while such

- Sec. 6. Section 8-210 of the general statutes is amended by adding subsection (g) as follows (*Effective July 1, 2021*):
- (NEW) (g) For the fiscal years ending June 30, 2022, and June 30, 2023, the Office of Early Childhood shall permit any family that meets the eligibility requirements described in subdivision (1) or (2) of subsection (a) of section 17b-749, as amended by this act, or subdivision (2) of subsection (d) of section 17b-749, as amended by this act, to participate in a program provided at a state-contracted child care center under this section.
 - Sec. 7. (*Effective July 1, 2021*) (a) There is established a task force to analyze and make recommendations on issues relating to early childhood workforce development needs in the state.
 - (b) The task force shall examine the following: (1) How to encourage equity-based practices in early childhood education preparation and professional development; (2) ways to address inequity in access to employment opportunities and compensation in the early childhood workforce; (3) the feasibility of creating a new co-authored license that would offer multiple levels of flexibly to address the range of ages, settings and roles in the early childhood field, including a professional continuum for assistants, lead teachers, generalists and specialists, such as early interventionist, mental health, integrated special education and rehabilitation therapies; and (4) workforce demands in the state related to the need for early childhood educators providing child care services for infants and toddlers to age six or age eight.
 - (c) The task force shall make recommendations concerning: (1) Legislation for educator preparation requirements in the early childhood field; (2) the creation of a new early childhood teacher license or credential jointly issued by the Office of Early Childhood and the Department of Education; (3) the development of a unifying framework for early childhood educator preparation, in accordance with the National Association for the Education of Young Children and the

- 315 (A) professional development and alternative routes for aides or

The task force shall terminate on the date that it 368 submits such report or January 1, 2023, whichever is later.

Statement of Purpose:

To (1) establish a pilot program that authorizes the Commissioner of Early Childhood to issue a license to a person or group of persons to operate a family child care home in a space that is not a private home and that has been provided by an association, organization, corporation, institution or agency, (2) establish a student loan forgiveness program for early childhood educators, (3) establish a personal income tax credit for certain employees of child care service providers, (4) expand eligibility in the Care4Kids program for certain parents and caretakers, (5) to permit families seeking employment or enrolled in certain education programs to participate in programs provided by state-contracted child care centers, and (6) to establish a task force to analyze and make recommendations concerning early childhood educator licensing and workforce development.
