AN ACT CONCERNING THE PRESCRIPTIVE AUTHORITY OF PSYCHOLOGISTS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

- Section 1. (NEW) (*Effective October 1, 2019*) (a) As used in this section:
- 3 (1) "Clinical preceptorship" means a mentored experience in which a 4 primary care provider gives personal instruction, training and 5 supervision;
- 6 (2) "Primary care provider" means a physician licensed pursuant to 7 chapter 370 of the general statutes, advanced practice registered nurse 8 licensed pursuant to chapter 378 of the general statutes or physician 9 assistant licensed pursuant to chapter 370 of the general statutes who 10 provides primary care services.
- 11 (b) A psychologist licensed under chapter 383 of the general statutes 12 may apply to the Department of Public Health for certification to 13 prescribe, administer and dispense, without charge, drugs and 14 controlled substances in schedule II, III, IV or V. Each psychologist

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seeking certification to prescribe shall submit to the department proof of (1) a license to practice under chapter 383 of the general statutes, (2) successful completion of a master's degree program in clinical psychopharmacology approved by the department and with an appropriate number of hours in didactic instruction as determined by the department, (3) successful completion of an examination in psychopharmacology approved by the department, and (4) completion of not less than eighty hours of clinical preceptorship with a primary care provider.

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(c) Upon receiving certification to prescribe, administer and dispense drugs and controlled substances pursuant to subsection (b) of this section, a psychologist shall engage in a supervised clinical practice, for at least one year and not less than one thousand hours, under the direct supervision of a physician licensed pursuant to chapter 370 of the general statutes who is certified in psychiatry by the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology, or an advanced practice registered nurse licensed pursuant to chapter 378 of the general statutes who is certified as a psychiatric and mental health clinical nurse specialist or nurse practitioner by the American Nurses Credentialing Center. Prior to engaging in the supervised clinical practice, the psychologist and the supervising physician or advanced practice registered nurse shall establish (1) the frequency at which the psychologist's practice and performance will be reviewed, (2) a plan for patient care coverage in the psychologist's absence, and (3) methods to review patient outcomes and disclose the supervisory relationship to the patient. Such supervised clinical practice by the psychologist shall include (A) experience with direct prescription drug treatment or management services for at least one hundred patients and not less than four hundred hours, (B) documentation of all cases, (C) evaluations by the supervising physician or advanced practice registered nurse of the psychologist's competency in his or her practice and of his or her clinical performance, and (D) experience with a broad spectrum of psychiatric, psychological, mental health, cognitive, nervous, emotional, substance use and behavioral disorders and

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diagnoses.

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- (d) A psychologist who (1) is certified to prescribe, administer and dispense drugs and controlled substances pursuant to subsection (b) of this section, (2) has maintained such certification for at least one year, and (3) has engaged in a supervised clinical practice in accordance with the provisions of subsection (c) of this section, may (A) prescribe, administer and dispense, without charge, drugs and controlled substances in schedule II, III, IV or V relevant to the practice of psychology and customarily used in the diagnosis, treatment and management of persons with psychiatric, psychological, mental health, cognitive, nervous, emotional, substance use or behavioral disorders, and (B) order laboratory, physical and diagnostic tests for the purposes of diagnosing a patient and providing the appropriate pharmacologic management of the patient's disorder. Such psychologist shall maintain a record of all prescriptions issued to a patient in the patient's medical record and coordinate care of a patient with the patient's primary care provider. No such psychologist may delegate the authority to prescribe drugs and controlled substances to any other person. Each prescription issued by a psychologist under this subsection shall contain the signature, name, address and license number of the psychologist and comply with all state and federal laws.
- (e) A psychologist certified to prescribe, administer and dispense drugs and controlled substances pursuant to subsection (b) of this section and applying to the department for a renewal of such certification shall, in addition to satisfying the continuing education requirements set forth in section 20-191c of the general statutes, complete a minimum of forty hours of continuing education in clinical pharmacology, neuropharmacology, clinical psychopharmacology and medically assisted substance use disorder treatment.
- (f) The Department of Public Health may adopt regulations in accordance with the provisions of chapter 54 of the general statutes to carry out the provisions of this section.

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Sec. 2. Subdivision (3) of section 20-14c of the general statutes is repealed and the following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective* October 1, 2019):

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- (3) "Prescribing practitioner" means a physician, dentist, podiatrist, optometrist, physician assistant, advanced practice registered nurse, nurse-midwife, [or] veterinarian or psychologist licensed by the state [of Connecticut] and authorized to prescribe medication within the scope of such person's practice.
- Sec. 3. Section 21a-252 of the general statutes is repealed and the following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective October 1, 2019*):
 - (a) A physician licensed pursuant to chapter 370, in good faith and in the course of the physician's professional practice only, may prescribe, administer and dispense controlled substances, or may cause the same to be administered by a physician assistant, nurse or intern under the physician's direction and supervision, demonstrable physical or mental disorders but not for drug dependence except in accordance with state and federal laws and regulations adopted thereunder. Notwithstanding the provisions of this subsection the Department of Consumer Protection may approve protocols allowing the dispensing of take-home doses of methadone, by a registered nurse or licensed practical nurse, to outpatients in duly licensed substance abuse treatment facilities. Such dispensing shall be done pursuant to the order of a licensed prescribing practitioner and using computerized dispensing equipment into which bulk supplies of methadone are dispensed by a pharmacist. The quantity of methadone dispensed by such nurse shall not exceed at any one time that amount allowed under federal or state statutes or regulations governing the treatment of drug dependent patients. The Department of Consumer Protection shall conduct inspections of such treatment facilities to ensure that the computerized dispensing equipment and related dispensing procedures documented in the approved protocols are adhered to.

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(b) A dentist <u>licensed pursuant to chapter 379</u>, in good faith and in the course of the dentist's professional practice only, may prescribe, administer or dispense controlled substances, or may cause the same to be administered by a nurse under the dentist's direction and supervision, to the extent permitted by the federal Controlled Substances Act, federal food and drug laws and state laws and regulations relating to dentistry.

- (c) A podiatrist <u>licensed pursuant to chapter 375</u>, in good faith and in the course of the podiatrist's professional practice only, may prescribe, administer and dispense controlled substances in schedules II, III, IV or V, or may cause the same to be administered by a nurse under the podiatrist's direction and supervision, to the extent permitted by the federal Controlled Substances Act, the federal food and drug laws and state laws and regulations relating to podiatry.
- (d) A veterinarian <u>licensed pursuant to chapter 384</u>, in good faith in the course of the veterinarian's professional practice only, and not for use by a human being, may prescribe, administer and dispense controlled substances, and may cause them to be administered by an assistant or orderly under the veterinarian's direction and supervision, to the extent permitted by the federal Controlled Substances Act, the federal food and drug laws and state laws and regulations relating to veterinary medicine.
- (e) An advanced practice registered nurse licensed pursuant to [section 20-94a] <u>chapter 378</u>, in good faith and in the course of such nurse's professional practice only, may prescribe, dispense, and administer controlled substances in schedule II, III, IV or V, or may cause the same to be administered by a registered nurse or licensed practical nurse under the advanced practice registered nurse's direction and supervision, to the extent permitted by the federal Controlled Substances Act, the federal food and drug laws and state laws and regulations relating to advanced nursing practice.
 - (f) A nurse-midwife licensed [under] pursuant to chapter 377, in

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good faith and in the course of the nurse-midwife's professional practice only, may prescribe, dispense, and administer controlled substances in schedules II, III, IV and V, or may cause the same to be administered by a registered nurse or licensed practical nurse under the nurse-midwife's direction and supervision, to the extent permitted by the federal Controlled Substances Act, the federal food and drug laws and state laws.

- (g) A physician assistant licensed pursuant to [section 20-12b] chapter 370, in good faith and in the course of the physician assistant's professional practice only, may prescribe, dispense, and administer controlled substances in schedule II, III, IV or V, or may cause the same to be administered by a registered nurse or licensed practical nurse who is acting under a physician's direction, to the extent permitted by the federal Controlled Substances Act, the federal food and drug laws and state laws and regulations relating to physician assistant practice.
- (h) An optometrist <u>licensed pursuant to chapter 380 and</u> authorized to practice advanced optometrical care, in good faith and in the course of the optometrist's professional practice only and who is duly authorized by section 20-127, may prescribe, administer or dispense controlled substances in schedule II, III, IV or V to the extent permitted by the federal Controlled Substances Act, the federal food and drug laws and state laws and regulations relating to optometry.
- (i) A psychologist licensed pursuant to chapter 383 and certified to prescribe, administer and dispense controlled substances pursuant to section 1 of this act, in good faith and in the course of the psychologist's professional practice only, may prescribe, dispense and administer controlled substances in schedule II, III, IV or V, to the extent permitted by the federal Controlled Substances Act, the federal food and drug laws and state laws and regulations relating to psychology.
- (j) Any person who has obtained directly from a physician, dentist, podiatrist, optometrist, veterinarian, physician assistant, advanced

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practice registered nurse, [or] nurse-midwife or psychologist any controlled substance for self-administration or administration to a patient during the absence of such physician, dentist, podiatrist, optometrist, veterinarian, physician assistant, advanced practice registered nurse, [or] nurse-midwife or psychologist shall return to such physician, dentist, podiatrist, optometrist, veterinarian, physician assistant, advanced practice registered nurse, [or] nurse-midwife or psychologist any unused portion of such controlled substance, when it is no longer required by the person or the patient, or may surrender such controlled substance to the Commissioner of Consumer Protection for proper disposition.

[(j)] (k) (1) A prescribing practitioner, as defined in section 20-14c, as amended by this act, shall not, except in an emergency, prescribe, dispense or administer controlled substances in schedules II to IV, inclusive, to a member of his or her immediate family. For purposes of this section, "immediate family member" means a spouse, parent, child, sibling, parent-in-law, son or daughter-in-law, brother or sister-in-law, step-parent, step-child, step-sibling or other relative residing in the same residence as the prescribing practitioner and shall not include an animal in the residence. In an emergency, a prescribing practitioner may prescribe, dispense or administer not more than a seventy-two-hour supply of such controlled substances to an immediate family member only when there is no other qualified prescribing practitioner available.

(2) A prescribing practitioner who prescribes, dispenses or administers any controlled substance to a member of his or her immediate family pursuant to subdivision (1) of this subsection shall perform an assessment for the care and treatment of the patient, medically evaluate the patient's need for such controlled substance and document such assessment and need in the normal course of his or her business. The prescribing practitioner shall document the emergency that gave rise to the prescription, dispensing or administering of such controlled substance to the immediate family member.

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210 [(k)] (1) A prescribing practitioner, as defined in section 20-14c, as 211 amended by this act, shall not, except in an emergency, prescribe, 212 dispense or administer controlled substances in schedules II to IV, 213 inclusive, for his or her own use. In an emergency, a prescribing 214 practitioner may prescribe, dispense or administer not more than a 215 seventy-two-hour emergency supply of such controlled substances for 216 self-use only when there is no other qualified prescribing practitioner 217 available.
