AN ACT CONCERNING WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

1 Section 1. (NEW) (Effective July 1, 2023) (a) Any local and regional 2 board of education may partner with one or more local employers that 3 are in the aviation or aerospace industry to develop and provide an 4 apprenticeship training program for students in the school district 5 governed by such board. Such apprenticeship training program shall 6 include, but need not be limited to, (1) on-site training in which students 7 may learn immediate job skills and earn course credit, and (2) the 8 provision of information to students concerning the programs of study 9 offered at the CT Aero Tech School for Aviation Maintenance 10 Technicians and assistance with the application for admission to said 11 school.

(b) Not later than sixty days after the first student cohort completes
an apprenticeship training program provided pursuant to subsection (a)
of this section, and annually thereafter, the local or regional board of
education that provides such program shall submit a report, in
accordance with the provisions of section 11-4a of the general statutes,

to the joint standing committee of the General Assembly having
cognizance of matters relating to education. Such report shall include,
but need not be limited to, the number of students who (1) participated
in and completed such program, and (2) enrolled in the CT Aero Tech
School for Aviation Maintenance Technicians after completing such
program.

23 Sec. 2. (NEW) (Effective July 1, 2023) (a) Any local and regional board 24 of education may, in partnership with an institution of higher education, 25 develop and establish a dual enrollment or early college program to 26 provide students with a series of courses and training that are required 27 to pursue occupations in health care. Such dual enrollment or early 28 college program shall allow students to earn upon completion (1) an 29 occupational certificate or license for a health care occupation that is in 30 high demand, such as licensed practical nurse, radiation technologist, 31 ultrasound technologist, nursing aide or occupational therapist, or (2) 32 college credit that may be applied toward a degree program related to 33 health care, such as biotechnology. Any local or regional board of 34 education considering the development of a new dual enrollment or 35 early college program shall prioritize the development of a program 36 related to health care in accordance with this section.

37 (b) Not later than one year after establishing a dual enrollment or 38 early college program pursuant to subsection (a) of this section, and 39 annually thereafter, any local or regional board of education that 40 establishes such program shall submit a report, in accordance with the 41 provisions of section 11-4a of the general statutes, to the joint standing 42 committee of the General Assembly having cognizance of matters 43 relating to education. Such report shall include, but need not be limited 44 to, (1) the health care occupations or degree programs served by the 45 dual enrollment or early college program, and (2) the number of 46 students who (A) participated in and completed such program, and (B) 47 who completed such program with an occupational certificate or 48 license.

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Sec. 3. (NEW) (Effective July 1, 2023) (a) Not later than January 1, 2024,

50 the Commissioner of Education shall (1) in consultation with the School 51 Paraeducator Advisory Council, established pursuant to section 10-155k 52 of the general statutes, develop a model program for paraeducator 53 training for students in grades nine to twelve, inclusive, in which such 54 students may be qualified to work as paraeducators upon graduation 55 from high school, and (2) distribute such model program to each local 56 and regional board of education.

57 (b) A local or regional board of education may adopt the model 58 program for paraeducator training developed pursuant to subsection (a) 59 of this section for students in grades nine to twelve, inclusive. Not later 60 than one year after adopting such program, and annually thereafter, 61 such board of education shall submit a report, in accordance with the 62 provisions of section 11-4a of the general statutes, to the joint standing 63 committee of the General Assembly having cognizance of matters 64 relating to education. Such report shall include, but not be limited to, 65 the number of students who (1) participated and completed such 66 program by grade, and (2) found employment as a paraeducator after 67 graduation from high school.

68 Sec. 4. Section 10-220d of the general statutes is repealed and the 69 following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective July 1, 2023*):

70 Each local and regional board of education shall provide full access 71 to technical education and career schools, regional agricultural science 72 and technology education centers, interdistrict magnet schools, charter 73 schools and interdistrict student attendance programs for the 74 recruitment of students attending the schools under the board's 75 jurisdiction, provided such recruitment is not for the purpose of 76 interscholastic athletic competition. Each local and regional board of 77 education shall provide information relating to technical education and 78 career schools, regional agricultural science and technology education 79 centers, interdistrict magnet schools, charter schools, alternative high 80 schools and interdistrict student attendance programs on the board's 81 Internet web site. Each local and regional board of education shall 82 annually distribute to students in middle school and require school

83 counselors to provide [information] to students and parents of students 84 in middle and high schools within such board's jurisdiction [of] 85 information concerning the availability of (1) vocational, technical, technological and postsecondary education and training at technical 86 87 education and career schools, and (2) agricultural science and 88 technology education at regional agricultural science and technology 89 education centers, and publish such information on the Internet web site 90 of such board.

91 Sec. 5. (NEW) (*Effective July 1, 2023*) (a) As used in this section:

92 (1) "Workforce development program" means a training program for 93 individuals to develop skills that will enable such individuals to qualify 94 for employment. A workforce development program includes (A) an 95 apprenticeship program registered with the Labor Department or a 96 federally recognized state apprenticeship agency that complies with the 97 requirements under 29 CFR 29 and 29 CFR 30, as each may be amended 98 from time to time, and (B) a preapprenticeship program that enables 99 students to qualify for a registered apprenticeship program; and

(2) "State funds" means any bond revenues, money appropriated orallocated by the General Assembly or grant funds awarded by a stateagency.

(b) Each workforce development program that receives state funds
shall (1) keep an accurate account of all its activities and of all its receipts
and expenditures, and (2) not later than January 1, 2024, and annually
thereafter, submit such account to the Auditors of Public Accounts. Such
account shall be in a form and include such components as prescribed
by said auditors. The financial accounts of such workforce development
program shall be subject to biennial audits by said auditors.

Sec. 6. (NEW) (*Effective July 1, 2023*) (a) Not later than January 1, 2024, the Department of Education shall establish a preapprenticeship grant program. The department shall award grants to any local or regional board of education that incorporates a preapprenticeship program in the curriculum for grades nine to twelve, inclusive, provided such preapprenticeship program (1) is registered with the Labor Department, and (2) meets any criteria established by the department. The department shall award a grant to such board of education in an amount not less than one thousand dollars for each student that completes the preapprenticeship program.

120 (b) Not later than January 1, 2025, and annually thereafter, the 121 Department of Education shall submit a report, in accordance with the 122 provisions of section 11-4a of the general statutes, to the joint standing 123 committee of the General Assembly having cognizance of matters 124 relating to education. Such report shall include, but need not be limited 125 to, (1) the amount of grants awarded during the prior year, and (2) the 126 types of preapprenticeship programs completed by students during the 127 prior year.

128 Sec. 7. (Effective July 1, 2023) Not later than January 1, 2024, the 129 Department of Education, in partnership with local and regional boards 130 of education, public institutions of higher education and independent 131 institutions of higher education, as defined in section 10a-173 of the 132 general statutes, shall, within the limits of available funding, expand 133 opportunities for dual credit and dual enrollment for students in grades 134 nine to twelve, inclusive, in the state. The work to expand such 135 opportunities shall include, but need not be limited to, (1) the creation 136 of resources, such as an online inventory of dual credit and dual 137 enrollment programs and model agreements to promote information 138 sharing between boards of education and institutions of higher 139 education, (2) support for curriculum development and professional 140 development for teachers and faculty to create new career pathways for 141 in-demand industries, and (3) tuition assistance for students who enroll 142 in dual credit and dual enrollment programs. Not later than January 1, 143 2024, the Department of Education shall submit a report, in accordance 144 with the provisions of section 11-4a of the general statutes, to the joint 145 standing committee of the General Assembly having cognizance of 146 matters relating to education on the department's efforts to expand 147 opportunities for dual credit and dual enrollment pursuant to this 148 section.

149 Sec. 8. (Effective from passage) The executive director of the Technical Education and Career System shall convene a working group to 150 151 determine the feasibility, cost and plan to develop an aerospace advanced manufacturing high school. The members of the working 152 153 group shall include, but need not be limited to, representatives of the 154 Governor's Workforce Council and the Department of Economic and 155 Community Development and business and community organizations 156 related to the aerospace industry. The executive director shall appoint 157 the members of the working group and shall serve as the chairperson. 158 Not later than January 1, 2024, the executive director shall submit, in 159 accordance with the provisions of section 11-4a of the general statutes, 160 to the joint standing committee of the General Assembly having 161 cognizance of matters relating to education a report detailing the 162 conclusions and recommendations of the working group.

This act shall take effect as follows and shall amend the following

Statement of Purpose:

To (1) allow boards of education to provide aerospace and aviation training to students through partnerships with local businesses, (2) allow the establishment of a dual enrollment or early college program related to health care, (3) allow students to be trained as paraeducators while in high school, (4) distribute information concerning vocational agriculture and technical education and career programs to students in middle school, (5) require the Auditors of Public Accounts to audit workforce development programs, (6) establish a grant program for boards of education that includes registered preapprenticeship programs in the high school curriculum, (7) require the expansion of dual credit and dual enrollment programs, and (8) require the

establishment of a working group to determine the feasibility of developing an aerospace advanced manufacturing high school.
