13	A PROPOSED RESOLUTION

15	IN THE COUNCIL OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA
16	
17	To declare the sense of the Council that Black Lives Matter.
18 19	RESOLVED, BY THE COUNCIL OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA, That
20	this resolution may be cited as the "Sense of the Council that Black Lives Matter
21	Resolution of 2014".
22	Sec. 2. The Council finds that:

23	(1) On August 9, 2014, in Ferguson, Missouri, Michael Brown, an 18-year
24	old unarmed African-American teenager, was fatally shot by Darren Wilson, a white
25	Ferguson police officer. On November 24, 2014, the prosecutor publicly announced that
26	the grand jury decided not to indict Darren Wilson.
27	(2) On July 17, 2014, in Staten Island, New York, Eric Garner, a 43-year-
28	old African-American man, was fatally choked by Daniel Pantaleo, a white New York
29	City police officer who put him in an illegal chokehold. On December 3, 2014, a Staten
30	Island grand jury decided not indict Daniel Pantaleo.
31	(3) The deaths of Michael Brown, Eric Garner and the failure of grand
32	juries to indict have inspired several protests nation-wide as part of a national dialogue.
33	(4) Though violence often begets violence, the best response is the choice
34	to engage in non-violent problem solving.
35	(5) Peaceful protests and other speech protected by the First Amendment
36	to the Constitution of the United States must be protected and received with a listening
37	ear, an open mind, a willing heart, and other resources to effect change.
38	(6) A great measure of courage and resolve are necessary to correct unjust
39	laws, enhance fairness in our criminal justice system and create a more perfect Union.
40	(7) Our nation continues to struggle with issues of race, bias, racial
41	prejudice and racism.
42	(8) "Black Lives Matter" is a declaration and movement that has been
43	embraced by persons from various cities, cultures, socio-economic backgrounds and
44	races. It is spoken, typed, displayed, and otherwise communicated in recognition of the
45	historical and cultural context in which recent events have occurred, with the

- understanding that the lives of people of color in this nation have not been appropriately 46 valued, to the detriment of their lives and to the harm of this nation as a whole, and with 47 the hope that this will change. 48 Sec. 3. It is the sense of the Council that "Black Lives Matter," as do the lives of 49
- all residents of the District of Columbia. 50
- Sec. 4. The Council of the District of Columbia shall transmit a copy of this 51 resolution, upon its adoption, to the Mayor. 52
- Sec. 5. This resolution shall take effect immediately. 53
