Serve as the Chief Executive Officer for the District Department of Transportation (DDOT), the

agency responsible for capital infrastructure delivery, local transit services, roadway asset management, customer service, bicycle and pedestrian programs, and parking operations. DDOT has 1,000 employees and a combined annual operating and capital budget of \$1 billion.

- Reformed DDOT through the adoption of the Transportation Reorganization Act of 2016.
 The law eliminated the agency's confusing and ineffective structure and replaced it with
 streamlined and empowered business groups, focused on integrated project delivery,
 operational excellence, administrative coordination and performance management.
- Launched the DC Streetcar service, a fixed guideway rail system. After a complete reboot, the project was turned around in 12 months. Ridership is exceeding forecast and proper safety oversight and management has been established. The new team substantially completed an environmental study for a major extension and is preparing to enter design.
- Developed the Vision Zero DC Action Plan. The plan includes strategies to eliminate trafficrelated fatalities by 2024. This inter-agency effort was recognized by USDOT as an Overall Success award winner in the Mayors' Challenge for Safer People, Safer Streets.
- Act as the project executive for the South Capitol Bridge Replacement project. The project
 was behind schedule and at risk of cancellation. A newly constituted project team has
 achieved a Record of Decision, won financial plan approval, acquired critical rights of way,
 completed a design-build process and received three competitive proposals.

- Member of the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA) Board of Directors. Serve as the Vice-Chair of the Safety Committee and sit on the Finance and Capital Program Committees.
- Represent the Mayor of the District of Columbia on the Union Station Redevelopment Corporation (USRC) Board of Directors. USRC owns and operates the Union Station complex, which supports Amtrak, commuter rail, subway, and intercity bus transportation.
- Chair of the DC Presidential Inauguration Transportation Subcommittee, the task force responsible for planning and implementing the operations plan for the 2017 event.

Serve as the Chief Operating Officer for the Maryland Department of Transportation (MDOT) and the Maryland Transportation Authority (MDTA). MDOT has over 10,000 employees and a six-year capital budget of \$15.4 billion. The agency's portfolio includes the BWI Marshall Airport (BWI), the Port of Baltimore, the Maryland Motor Vehicle Administration, two large metropolitan transit systems, and a highway inventory with 17,800 lane miles and 2,584 bridges. MDTA is a self-funded toll authority, operating four bridges, two tunnels, and two turnpikes.

- Chaired the MDOT Security Council, consisting of the chiefs of the Maryland Transit Administration (MTA) Police and the MDTA Police, the BWI fire chief, the Secretary's Homeland Security Director and the other senior security officials. The Security Council develops federal compliance plans, operational procedures, emergency preparedness protocols, employee training standards and technology applications.
- Acted as the Secretary's representative at the Maryland Emergency Management Agency and the State Highway Operations Center during snow and ice events, floods, hurricanes, and large public events.
- Directed the 10-person government affairs unit responsible for the passage of the Maryland Transportation Infrastructure Investment Act of 2013, raising \$4.4 billion in new revenues over six years for major capital and system preservation projects. Organized support from key legislative districts, transit advocates, industry associations, chambers of commerce, environmental organizations, labor unions and safety groups. Represented the administration before the legislative budget committees and handled bill negotiations with legislative leadership.
- Developed the statutory framework for HB 560 (Public-Private Partnerships P3) and oversaw the adoption of the relevant agency regulations. Enacted in 2013, the new state law streamlined the legislative oversight of P3 projects, created enhanced legal authority for project sponsors and established predictable rules for solicitations.
- Co-led the 20-member senior management team responsible for the New Starts transit projects: Baltimore's Red Line light rail (\$2.9 billion) and the DC Region's Purple Line light rail (\$2.5 billion). Direct the work of in-house project managers, engineers, financial professionals and policy staff as well as outside technical consultants, business transaction advisors, legal counsel and economists. The Purple Line is being delivered as a Design-Build-Finance-Operate-Maintain project with an availability payment mechanism. MDOT pursued a \$800 million TIFIA loan on behalf of bidders..
- Led the project development, site selection and financial negotiations associated with a
 proposed \$100 million intermodal container transfer facility, funded by MDOT and CSX.
 Represented the state during community association meetings and workshops and
 handled major press matters. This facility will allow double-stack container freight
 efficiency from a near-dock location, fostering better access to Midwest consumer and

manufacturing markets and export opportunities for the Port of Baltimore.

- Established partnerships across jurisdictional, political and organizational lines to advance regional and national interests. Participated in the bipartisan House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee's Special Panel on Freight Transportation. Formed consensus on cost-sharing with the Amtrak Northeast Corridor (NEC) commissioners and safety.
- Managed the implementation of major federal grants, namely the three Passenger Rail
 Investment and Improvement Act (PRIIA) projects (Baltimore & Potomac Tunnels, BWI
 Amtrak Station and Northeast Maryland Bridge Crossings) and the \$10 million U.S. DOT
 TIGER award to the Maryland Port Administration for access channel dredging, rail
 connections and terminal improvements.

Senior Advisor to the Secretary

Responsible for public-private partnerships and infrastructure investment. Focused on real estate, port-related and transit-oriented development (TOD) projects. Engaged with investors to develop sound financial and operating plans, leveraging public and private sources of capital.

- Directed the solicitation, evaluation and approval of a 35-year lease and concession agreement to redevelop the MDTA's two travel plazas on Interstate 95. A trial court judge upheld the state's contract award during a protest challenge by a losing proposal team. The project was completed early and within budget. In addition to obtaining \$56 million in upfront private investment, the Design-Build-Finance-Operate-Maintain project will generate over \$400 million in state revenue.
- Represented the Secretary during commercial negotiation, contract approval and
 implementation of a 50-year revenue concession agreement for the Seagirt Marine
 Terminal. The project was enabled by a \$245 million Private Activity Bond (PABs)
 issuance for berth construction, container cranes and highway projects. Fostered the
 hiring of 30 displaced crane mechanics and preserved their collective bargaining rights.
 With the facility commissioned, Baltimore is now one of only two East Coast ports with
 the capacity to receive larger, post-Panamax vessels.
- Co-led the contract approval for the State Center master developer agreement, establishing the blueprint to convert a government-owned office complex into a \$1.5 billion privately-delivered, transit-oriented development, totaling over 2 million square feet of mixed uses. This joint development project involved extensive community engagement across nine neighborhoods and will adhere to an Economic Inclusion Plan, aimed at maximizing opportunity for minority, women-owned and local businesses.
- Created the MDOT Office of Project Delivery, hiring staff and consultants to support the screening, solicitation and implementation of public-private partnerships. Researched best practices in innovative finance and privatization and tailored the office design to the department's needs.

Chief of Staff

January 2007- December 2010

Managed the department's interaction with the Governor's Office, federal, state and local partners, businesses, stakeholder groups and labor unions. Prepared all transportation-related briefing memoranda and presentations for the Governor and senior staff. Coordinated the Secretary's calendar of internal briefings, external meetings and public events. Directed the press and communications personnel. Recruited executives for senior-level agency positions.

Co-led the agency's selection, implementation and oversight of projects funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA), representing over \$650 million in highway, transit and airport investment. Chaired bi-weekly meetings with representatives of the highway, transit and airport agencies to fast track the deployment of stimulus funds. MDOT was recognized by the national policy resource center Good Jobs First for the most transparent reporting program in the country.

- Led the department's contract negotiations with Amalgamated Transit Union Local 1300, the bargaining unit representing 2,400 transit operators and maintenance technicians.
 This contract allowed management to pursue modest outsourcing plans, yielded service quality improvements for transit riders and established the framework for pension reforms which were adopted in the next round of contract negotiations.
- Coordinated participation in the Governor's StateStat Initiative, a performance management program. Worked with the senior leadership in the state's highway, transit, airport and motor vehicle agencies to assign key personnel, incorporate better technology and apply data-driven reforms. Since the start of StateStat, there has been a 40 percent reduction in the number of structurally deficient bridges in Maryland. Transit ridership has grown 14 percent. BWI has achieved all-time record levels of passenger enplanements. The Motor Vehicle Administration reduced average customer wait times by 43 percent since 2007.
- Administered the selection of more than 40 appointees to six state and regional transportation governing boards, including WMATA, the State Roads Commission, the Maryland Aviation Commission and the Metropolitan Washington Airports Authority (MWAA). Interviewed candidates for vacant board and commission positions.
- Negotiated major land acquisitions for the \$2.6 billion Inter-County Connector (ICC) toll road facility, funded in part by a \$500 million TIFIA loan. Led the team responsible for settling a \$75 million condemnation case and acquiring critical parcels needed for ICC access to Interstate 95.

Directed and supervised the financial management, information technology, contract administration, human resource and capital planning functions for the Baltimore Department of Transportation, the agency responsible for roadway maintenance and construction, street lighting, traffic control, parking enforcement, snow removal and towing operations. The agency has over 1,200 employees and a combined operating and capital budget of \$250 million.

- Led the retooling of the department's Division of Engineering and Construction by
 establishing new project management principles, milestone tracking systems and training
 requirements. As a result, the capital program accelerated the delivery of nearly \$100
 million in unspent federal aid for major highway reconstruction and bridge projects.
- Enhanced the city's intelligent transportation system (ITS) by introducing traffic signal upgrades, pay-and-display on-street parking, handheld ticket-writing devices, license plate recognition, red-light camera technology and automated vehicle locators.
- Negotiated a multi-year agreement with Trigen Energy to invest \$6.6 million into steam
 pipe replacements in the central business district. Prior to this deal, the utility's deferred
 maintenance and poor insulation practices caused major damage to a series of highvolume roadways.
- Overhauled the Division of Transportation Planning to improve multi-modalism and community planning. Created new planning staff positions focused on generating public engagement and bottom-up input during project scoping. Met with cycling advocates during workshops and monitored implementation of the Bike Master Plan recommendations.

Responsible for delivering recommendations to the Mayor and senior staff for bi-weekly performance management meetings. Portfolio covered transportation, general services (fleet and facilities), water and wastewater utilities, and sanitation departments. CitiStat achieved an aggregate citywide savings of \$100 million over the program's first four years of existence through personnel cost reductions, new revenue streams and competitive outsourcing. In 2004, CitiStat won the Harvard Kennedy School Innovations in American Government Award.

- Chaired ProjectStat, a program designed to track schedule milestones and funding decisions during the capital delivery process. Supported by a small consulting staff, this program pushed project teams to shorten task durations, perform concurrent reviews and heighten quality control.
- Developed customer service questions and business protocols for the city's call center, handling over 1.5 million annual requests. Worked with operations units to design performance standards for key municipal services such as pothole patching, water and sewer maintenance, grass mowing, sanitation pick-ups and vehicle repairs.
- Designed and implemented an energy conservation plan focused on the overhaul of HVAC systems in the largest public buildings and the LED conversion of traffic signals.

Mr. Dormsjo oversaw an annual budget over \$500 million and more than 900 people. Mr. Dormsjo represented the District of Columbia

on the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA) Board of Directors and also served on the Board of the Union Station Redevelopment Corporation. Previously Mr. Dormsjo served as Deputy Secretary of the Maryland Department of Transportation.
