SUMMARY ANALYSIS

State law authorizes legislative designations of transportation facilities for honorary or memorial purposes or to distinguish a particular facility. The legislative designations do not officially change the current names of the facilities, nor does the law require local governments and private entities to change street signs, mailing addresses, or 911 emergency telephone system listings. State law also requires the appropriate city or county commission to pass a resolution supporting the designation prior to the erection of markers indicating the designation.

The bill creates 17 honorary designations for various transportation facilities across the state and directs the Department of Transportation (DOT) to erect suitable markers for each designation.

The bill will have an insignificant negative fiscal impact to the State Transportation Trust Fund associated with erecting suitable markers for the above designations. These costs can be absorbed within DOT's existing resources.

The bill has an effective date of July 1, 2021.

FULL ANALYSIS

I. SUBSTANTIVE ANALYSIS

A. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

Present Situation

Designations

Section 267.062, F.S., provides for the naming of state buildings and other facilities. The statute provides that except as specifically provided by law, state buildings, roads, bridges, parks, recreational complexes, and other similar facilities may not be named for a living person.

Section 334.071, F.S., authorizes legislative designations of transportation facilities for honorary or memorial purposes or to distinguish a particular facility. The legislative designations do not officially change the current names of the facilities nor does the statute require local governments and private entities to change street signs, mailing addresses, or 911 emergency telephone-number system listings.

Road Markers

The Department of Transportation (DOT) must place a marker at each terminus or intersection of an identified road or bridge and erect other markers it deems appropriate for a designated transportation facility. The appropriate city or county commission must pass a resolution in support of a particular designation before road markers are erected. Additionally, if the designated road segment extends through multiple cities or counties, a resolution must be passed by each affected local government.

Effect of the Bill

The bill requires DOT to erect suitable markers for each of the following designations.

Subsection 1 designates that portion of S.R. 87 between East Bay Boulevard and U.S. 98 in Santa Rosa County as "Ira Mae Wells-Bruce Memorial Highway."

Ira Mae Wells-Bruce was Santa Rosa County's first female commissioner and presided over numerous business and civic organizations. She was also co-broker/owner of Century 21 Island View Realty. Ms. Bruce passed away on November 30, 2020.¹

Subsection 2 designates that portion of S.R. 968/S.W. 1st Street between S.W. 12th Avenue and S.W. 17th Avenue in Miami-Dade County as "Gustavo Barreiro Way."

Gustavo Barreiro served in the Florida House of Representatives from 1998-2006 and made a career crusading for at-risk youth. Representative Barreiro passed away on August 16, 2019.²

Subsection 3 designates that portion of Davie Boulevard between S.W. 34th Avenue and S.W. 36th Avenue in Broward County as "Rubin Stacy Memorial Boulevard."

Rubin Stacy, a black man, died by hanging on July 19, 1935, in Fort Lauderdale, after an unconfirmed accusation by a white woman.³

Subsection 4 designates Bridge Number 100850 on S.R. 60/Courtney Campbell Causeway over Old Tampa Bay in Hillsborough County as "Virginia Creighton Bridge."

Virginia (Ginger) Creighton worked in the field of wetland science and was key to developing the Courtney Campbell Causeway – Old Tampa Bay Water Quality Improvement Project that provided environmental credit for other DOT projects in the Tampa Bay Area.⁴ Ms. Creighton passed away on May 29, 2020.

Subsection 5 designates the interchange at the Florida Turnpike and U.S. 192 in Osceola County as "Representative Frank Attkisson Interchange."

Representative Frank Attkisson served on the Kissimmee City Commission from 1990-1992, as the Mayor of Kissimmee from 1996-2000, and in the Florida House of Representatives from 2000-2008. Representative Attkisson passed away on April 6, 2017.⁵

Subsection 6 designates that portion of U.S. 19/S.R. 55 between U.S. 41/S.R. 45/Tamiami Trail and Palm View Road in Manatee County as "Tiffany Marie Olson Memorial Highway."

On December 7, 2005, Tiffany Marie Olson was killed in a traffic crash on U.S. 19 in Manatee County. Following her mother not being notified of her death for several hours, her mother was instrumental in getting emergency contact information added to a person's driver license or identification card record.⁶

Subsection 7 designates that portion of the S.R. A1A between Oakland Park Boulevard and Palm Avenue in Broward County as "Pio R. Ieraci Memorial Highway."

Pio R. Ieraci was a civic leader active in the Broward County Community. He served as the President of the Galt Ocean Club Condominium Association for over 20 years. Mr. Ieraci passed away on December 20, 2020.⁷

Subsection 8 designates that portion of S.R. 520/W. King Street between S.R. 501/Clearlake Road and S.R. 519/Fiske Boulevard in Brevard County as "Sgt. George Lee Taylor, Sr., Memorial Highway."

Sgt. George Lee Taylor, Sr., served in the United States Army from 1967 to 1971. After returning from war, Sgt. Taylor founded the National Veterans Homeless Support, which is estimated to have helped reduce the homeless veteran population in Brevard County by 90 percent. Sgt. Taylor passed away on May 17, 2020.⁸

Subsection 9 designates that portion of S.R. 519/Fiske Boulevard between Rosa L. Jones Drive and I-95 in Brevard County as "Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Memorial Highway."

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., was a civil rights leader and the youngest man to have received the Nobel Peace Prize. Dr. King was assassinated on April 4, 1968.⁹

Subsection 10 designates that portion of U.S. 23/Kings Road between Spires Avenue and Tyler Street in Duval County as "Professor Dock Jackson Jordan and Mrs. Carrie Thomas Jordan Memorial Highway."

Professor Dock Jackson Jordan served as President of Edward Waters College in Jacksonville from 1895-1897. He later trained black teachers, developed workshops for black educators, and worked for the advancement of black education. Professor Jordan passed away on October 20, 1943.¹⁰

Mrs. Carrie Thomas Jordan was born in Jacksonville in 1870 and was instrumental in rewriting school curriculum for black students, placing an emphasis on spelling, geography, and nature study. Mrs. Jordan passed away on August 11, 1968.¹¹

Subsection 11 The bill designates that portion of S.R. 715/Bacom Point Road between W. Morgan Road and S.W. 14th Street in Palm Beach County as “Deputy Sheriff Donta Manuel and Deputy Sheriff Jonathan Wallace Highway.”

On November 28, 2007, Deputy Sheriff Donta Manuel and Deputy Sheriff Jonathan Wallace were struck and killed by a patrol car while attempting to remove stop sticks on State Road 715 in Palm Beach County.¹²

Subsection 12 designates, upon completion of construction, the interchange at First Coast Expressway/S.R. 23 and Henley Road in Clay County as “Sergeant Eric John Twisdale Memorial Interchange.”

Sergeant Eric John Twisdale served as a Deputy, Detective, Dive Team Member, and Sergeant throughout his 22 years with the Clay County Sheriff’s Office. He received numerous awards, including the Sheriff’s Office Lifesaving Award and Deputy of the Year.¹³ Sergeant Twisdale passed away on September 16, 2020, after contracting Covid-19 during a presumed exposure at the Clay County Sheriff’s Office.¹⁴

Subsection 13 designates that portion of E. Main Street/Bayfront Parkway/E. Gregory Street between S. Tarragona Street and the Pensacola Bay Bridge in Escambia County as “Pensacola Police Fallen Heroes Highway.”

Pensacola Police Fallen Heroes Highway honors the 16 men who lost their lives in service to the City of Pensacola and will serve as a reminder that their sacrifice has not been forgotten.¹⁵

Subsection 14 designates Bridge No. 380097 on U.S. 27 over the Fenholloway River in Taylor County as “Private Tillman R. Clark Memorial Bridge.”

Private Tillman R. Clark served in the United States Army from February 27, 1941 to September 7, 1945. During his service in Normandy he was captured as a prisoner of war. He was awarded the Purple Heart, American Defense Service Medal, and European and Middle East Theatre of Operations Medal.¹⁶ Private Clark passed away in 1999.¹⁷

Subsection 15 designates that portion of U.S. 90 between Canal Street and Stewart Street in Santa Rosa County as “Reverend Murray Hamilton, Sr., Highway.”

Reverend Murray Hamilton, Sr., served in the United States Navy and worked for Monsanto/Solutia for 37 years. His life’s work revolved around building the community and he was influential in developing many programs and organizations in Milton. Reverend Hamilton passed away on January 25, 2021.¹⁸

Subsection 16 designates that portion of S.R. 408/Holland East Expressway between the Mills Avenue Exit and the Rosalind Avenue Exit in Orange County as “Austin D. Gayne Memorial Highway.”

Austin D. Gayne, a tow truck driver, passed away on February 26, 2021, from injuries sustained while working on an Orlando Highway, due to a driver who failed to slow down and move over.¹⁹

Subsection 17 designates that portion of S.R. 826/Sunny Isles Boulevard between N.E. 35th Avenue and S.R. A1A in Miami-Dade County as "Anthony Reznik Boulevard."

Anthony Reznik, age 11, was struck by a car and seriously injured while crossing the street in Sunny Isles on February 10, 2021. He later died of his injuries.²⁰

The bill has an effective date of July 1, 2021.

B. SECTION DIRECTORY:

Section 1 Creates honorary transportation facility designations; directs DOT to erect suitable markers.

Section 2 Provides an effective date of July 1, 2021.

II. FISCAL ANALYSIS & ECONOMIC IMPACT STATEMENT

DOT estimates a cost of \$1,000 per designation for the appropriate markers, which provides for two signs per designation at \$500 per sign.²¹ Therefore, the bill has an estimated negative fiscal impact of \$17,000 to the State Transportation Trust Fund. This cost can be absorbed within existing DOT resources.

IV. AMENDMENTS/ COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE CHANGES

On March 22, 2021, the Tourism, Infrastructure & Energy Subcommittee adopted a proposed committee substitute for the bill along with three amendments. The bill, as originally filed, designated the Ira Mae Bruce Memorial Highway in Santa Rosa County. The committee substitute:

- Amends the location of the Ira Mae Bruce Memorial Highway; and
- Creates the following additional honorary designations:
 - Rubin Stacy Memorial Boulevard in Broward County;
 - Virginia Creighton Bridge in Hillsborough County;
 - Representative Frank Attkisson Interchange in Osceola County;
 - Tiffany Marie Olson Memorial Highway in Manatee County;
 - Pio R. Ieraci Memorial Highway in Broward County;
 - Sgt. George Lee Taylor, Sr., Memorial Highway in Brevard County;
 - Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Boulevard in Brevard County;
 - Professor Dock Jackson Jordan and Mrs. Cassie Thomas Jordan Memorial Highway in Duval County;
 - Deputy Sheriff Donta Manuel and Deputy Sheriff Jonathan Wallace Highway in Palm Beach County;
 - Sergeant Eric John Twisdale Memorial Interchange in Clay County;
 - Pensacola Police Fallen Heroes Highway in Escambia County;
 - Private Tillman R. Clark Memorial Bridge in Taylor County; and
 - Reverend Murray Hamilton, Sr., Highway in Santa Rosa County.
- Directs DOT to erect suitable markers for each of the above designations.

On April 14, 2021, the Commerce Committee adopted two amendments and reported the bill favorably as a committee substitute. The committee substitute designates Austin D. Gayne Memorial Highway in Orange County, designates Anthony Reznik Boulevard in Miami-Dade County, designates Gustavo Barreiro Way in Miami-Dade County, and corrects drafting errors in the Ira Mae Wells-Bruce and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., designations.

This analysis is drafted to the committee substitute as approved by the Commerce Committee.
