A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

- 1 To amend Chapter 2A of Title 31 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to the
- 2 Department of Public Health, so as to create the Temporary Youth Behavioral Health
- 3 Services Program; to provide for definitions; to provide for duties and responsibilities of the
- 4 department; to provide for program requirements; to provide for behavioral health care
- 5 provider reimbursement requirements; to provide for funding contingency; to provide for
- 6 automatic repeal; to provide for related matters; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other
- 7 purposes.

8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

- 9 SECTION 1.
- 10 Chapter 2A of Title 31 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to the Department
- of Public Health, is amended by adding a new Code section to read as follows:
- 12 "31-2A-20.
- 13 (a) As used in this Code section, the term:
- (1) 'Behavioral health care provider' or 'provider' means an individual who specializes
- in providing treatment to clients and holds a license or a license by reciprocity in this

state as a psychiatrist, psychologist, professional counselor, social worker, or marriage

- and family therapist.
- 18 (2) 'Client' means a youth who obtains treatment through a provider under the program.
- 19 (3) 'Portal' means the public website or web based application developed to facilitate the
- 20 <u>program.</u>
- 21 (4) 'Telehealth' has the same meaning as provided in Code Section 33-24-56.4.
- 22 (5) 'Temporary Youth Behavioral Health Services Program' or 'program' means the
- 23 program established pursuant to this Code section.
- 24 (6) 'Treatment' means the broad range of services and care, including diagnostic
- 25 evaluation, medical, psychiatric, and psychological care available to clients through
- 26 providers pursuant to this Code section.
- 27 <u>(7) 'Youth' means:</u>
- 28 (A) An individual under the age of 18 years; and
- 29 (B) An individual 22 years of age or younger, but older than 18 years of age, receiving
- 30 special education services pursuant to Code Section 20-2-152.
- 31 (b) There is established within the department the Temporary Youth Behavioral Health
- 32 Services Program. The purpose of the program shall be to facilitate access to behavioral
- 33 <u>health care providers for the youth of this state. To implement the program, the department</u>
- 34 shall:
- 35 (1) Develop a process for providers to apply for, and demonstrate eligibility to receive,
- 36 <u>reimbursement from the program;</u>
- 37 (2) Determine a reasonable rate of reimbursement for each session with a client under
- 38 the program, which rate shall be the same for telehealth and in-person sessions;
- 39 (3) Create and maintain a state-wide public awareness and outreach campaign about the
- 40 program targeted at community based organizations that interact with youth on the local
- 41 <u>level, such as schools, neighborhood youth organizations, healthcare providers, and faith</u>
- 42 <u>based organizations; and</u>

43 (4) Report to the Governor and the General Assembly no later than January 1 and June 30 of each year, regarding information in aggregate about the services provided to clients 44 45 under the program, the number of clients who received services under the program, and any other relevant information regarding the program. Such report shall exclude all 46 personally identifiable information of each client. 47 (c) The department shall enter into an agreement with a vendor to create, or use an 48 49 existing, public website or web based application as a portal available to youth and providers to facilitate the program. The portal shall: 50 (1) Serve as a platform for an initial, age-appropriate behavioral health screening by a 51 provider to determine if a youth may benefit from treatment; 52 (2) Allow providers to register and share telehealth and in-person session availability; 53 (3) When possible, connect clients with providers who accept the client's insurance or 54 payment source that may cover the costs of ongoing treatment, if the client has insurance 55 56 or a payment source; and 57 (4) Without regard to insurance coverage status or the availability of any other payment source, provide access to the youth of this state to telehealth and, as available, in-person 58 59 sessions with a provider. 60 61

- (d) The department shall reimburse providers for each session conducted pursuant to the
- program, whether in-person or by telehealth, up to a maximum of three sessions per youth
- client. Subject to available funding, the department may reimburse a provider for 62
- 63 additional sessions. To be eligible for reimbursement, a provider must be available to
- 64 provide three behavioral health sessions to each client accepted by the provider.
- 65 (e) This Code section shall stand repealed on June 30, 2027, unless reauthorized by the
- General Assembly prior to that date." 66

68 All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.
