House Bill 297

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## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

- 1 To amend Title 20 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to education, so as to
- 2 provide requirements for safety plans in early care and education programs; to revise the
- 3 requirements for school safety plans at public elementary and secondary schools; to provide
- 4 a short title; to provide for related matters; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

## 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

6 SECTION 1.

- 7 This Act shall be known and may be cited as the "Child Safety and Emergency Preparedness
- 8 Act."
- 9 SECTION 2.
- 10 Title 20 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to education, is amended in
- 11 Article 1 of Chapter 1A, relating to general provisions pertaining to early care and learning,
- 12 by adding a new Code section to read as follows:
- 13 "<u>20-1A-19.</u>
- 14 (a) By January 1, 2018, early care and education programs shall prepare a safety plan to
- provide a safe care and learning environment for Georgia's children by addressing
- preparedness for emergencies, including but not limited to preparedness for fire, floods,
- tornadoes, snow and ice storms, earthquakes, chemical spills, and acts of violence. Such
- plan shall be prepared in consultation with parents and legal guardians of children enrolled
- in such early care and education programs and teachers and staff of such early care and
- 20 <u>education programs</u>. Such plan may be prepared in consultation with community leaders
- 21 <u>and local law enforcement, fire service, public safety, and emergency management</u>
- 22 <u>agencies. Such plan shall be submitted to the local emergency management agency. The</u>
- 23 requirements for such plan as provided for by this Code section shall be evaluated as a part
- of any licensing or regulatory reviews conducted by the department.
- 25 (b) The safety plan provided for by subsection (a) of this Code section shall include:

26 (1) Procedures for personnel to notify parents and legal guardians in cases of emergency;

- 27 (2) The development of designated relocation sites and evacuation routes to such sites;
- 28 (3) Reunification plans for children with parents and legal guardians in cases where such
- 29 <u>children require sheltering in place or relocation in cases of emergency; and</u>
- 30 (4) Written individualized plans for accommodating special needs of children in early
- 31 <u>care and education programs in cases of emergency.</u>
- 32 (c) The safety plan provided for by subsection (a) of this Code section shall be reviewed
- and, if necessary, updated monthly by early care and education programs. Early care and
- 34 <u>education programs shall maintain documentation that the safety plan is reviewed monthly.</u>
- 35 (d) Early care and education programs shall train teachers, staff, and other personnel on
- 36 <u>the prepared safety plan as provided for by this Code section at least once each calendar</u>
- 37 <u>year.</u>
- 38 (e) Early care and education programs shall implement the emergency procedures
- 39 provided for in the prepared safety plan as provided for by this Code section through
- 40 practice drills. Early care and education programs shall maintain documentation of such
- 41 <u>drills for one year after the completion of each such drill. Such drills shall be as provided</u>
- for by local and state law and shall also include:
- 43 (1) The conducting of at least one fire drill each calendar month, which shall be
- 44 <u>alternated to cover each shift and time of day that children are present at the location of</u>
- 45 the early care and education program, including extended care hours; and
- 46 (2) The conducting of at least one drill other than a fire drill every six months.
- 47 All drills required under this subsection shall be conducted in such a way as to simulate,
- 48 <u>as closely as is practical, conditions of a real emergency with alarms to be utilized and</u>
- 49 <u>evacuation plans to be practiced.</u>
- 50 (f)(1) Emergency telephone numbers for local and state emergency entities shall be
- 51 posted immediately next to all landline telephones located within early care and education
- 52 programs and be readily available to all staff of early care and education programs. Such
- 53 <u>local and state emergency entities that shall have telephone numbers posted shall include</u>
- 54 <u>the:</u>
- 55 (A) Local fire department;
- 56 (B) Local police and sheriff's departments;
- 57 (C) Nearest hospital emergency room;
- 58 (D) Abuse hotline of the Department of Human Services;
- 59 (E) Local emergency management agency;
- (F) Local ambulance or rescue squad;
- 61 (G) Poison control center; and
- 62 (H) Child care complaint hotline of the Department of Human Services.

63 (2) If a generic emergency number, including but not limited to 9-1-1, is operable for the

- 64 <u>location of the early care and education program, then such number shall be posted</u>
- 65 <u>immediately next to all landline telephones located within each such early care and</u>
- 66 <u>education program.</u>
- 67 (g) All contact information for parents and legal guardians of children enrolled in an early
- 68 care and education program shall be readily available to all staff of such early care and
- 69 <u>education program.</u>"
- 70 SECTION 3.
- 71 Said title is further amended by revising Code Section 20-2-1185, relating to school safety
- 72 plans, as follows:
- 73 "20-2-1185.
- 74 (a) Every public school shall prepare a school safety plan to help curb the growing
- 75 incidence of violence in schools, to respond effectively to such incidents, and to provide
- a safe learning environment for Georgia's children, teachers, and other school personnel.
- 77 Such plan shall also address preparedness for <u>tornadoes</u>, <u>snow and ice storms</u>, <u>earthquakes</u>,
- 78 <u>floods, other</u> natural disasters, <u>fires,</u> hazardous materials or radiological accidents, acts of
- violence, and acts of terrorism. School safety plans of public schools shall be prepared
- 80 with input from students enrolled in that school, parents or legal guardians of such students,
- 81 teachers in that school, community leaders, other school employees and school district
- 82 employees, and local law enforcement, fire service, public safety, and emergency
- management agencies. School safety plans of private schools may be prepared with input
- from students enrolled in that school, parents or legal guardians of such students, teachers
- in that school, other school employees, and local law enforcement, fire service, public
- safety, and emergency management agencies. Such plans shall be reviewed and, if
- 87 necessary, updated annually. Such plans of public schools shall be submitted to the local
- 88 emergency management agency.
- 89 (b) A public school may request funding assistance from the state for the installation of
- safety equipment, including, but not limited to, video surveillance cameras, metal detectors,
- and other similar security devices. Funding may be provided to a public school in
- accordance with a school safety plan prepared by the school and approved by the local
- board of education, the Department of Education, and the Georgia Emergency Management
- and Homeland Security Agency.
- 95 (c) School safety plans prepared by public schools shall address security issues in school
- safety zones as defined in Code Section 16-11-127.1. School safety plans should shall also
- address security issues involving the transportation of pupils to and from school and school

functions when such transportation is furnished by the school or school system and school

- 99 functions held during noninstructional hours.
- 100 (c.1) By January 1, 2018, school safety plans prepared by public schools shall address:
- (1) Evacuating and safely moving and transporting students to an alternate site. Such
- alternate site shall be at a location as centralized to the public school as possible and
- sufficiently large enough to house the enrollment of such public school in case such
- alternate site becomes the location for sheltering students;
- 105 (2) The training of staff on evacuation routes and procedures and the responsibilities of
- staff and students during an evacuation;
- 107 (3) Procedures for notifying parents and legal guardians of students in cases of
- 108 <u>emergency;</u>
- (4) Reunification of students with parents and legal guardians in cases where such
- students require sheltering in place or relocation in cases of emergency;
- 111 (5) Maintaining a list of telephone numbers and next of kin for each student obtained
- from the parent or legal guardian of each student for use in cases of emergency where
- contact cannot be made with the parent or legal guardian; and
- 114 (6) Accommodation of students and staff with disabilities who may require special
- access and needs.
- 116 (d) The Georgia Emergency Management and Homeland Security Agency shall provide
- training and technical assistance to public school systems, and may provide this same
- training and technical assistance to private school systems, and independent private schools
- throughout this state in the area of emergency management and safe school operations.
- This training and technical assistance shall include, but not be limited to, crisis response
- team development, site surveys and safety audits, crisis management planning, exercise
- design, safe school planning, emergency operations planning, search and seizure, bomb
- threat management, and model school safety plans.
- (e) On January 15 of each year, the director of emergency management and homeland
- security shall make an annual report to the General Assembly on school safety plans and
- the overall preparedness of schools in Georgia for emergencies as provided for by this
- 127 <u>Code section. Such report shall evaluate the preparedness of schools in Georgia as</u>
- informed by the presidential policy directive, PPD-8, on national preparedness as signed
- by the President on March 30, 2011, and the Guide for Developing High-Quality School
- Emergency Operations Plans as issued by the United States Department of Education in
- 131 <u>June</u>, 2013."

SECTION 4.

All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.
