The House Committee on Public Safety and Homeland Security offers the following substitute to HB 424:

## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

1 To amend Article 1 of Chapter 16 of Title 15 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, 2 relating to general provisions regarding sheriffs, so as to revise qualification requirements 3 for the office of sheriff; to require certification as a peace officer at the time of qualifying as a candidate for sheriff; to require such candidate to be in good standing with the Georgia 4 5 Peace Officer Standards and Training Council; to provide for an exception; to provide for a definition; to provide for a confirming affidavit; to provide for completion of basic training 6 and certification requirements by certain candidates for the office of sheriff; to provide for 7 reimbursement of certain expenses; to allow sheriffs to receive certain additional salaries; to 8 9 provide for related matters; to provide for effective dates; to repeal conflicting laws; and for 10 other purposes.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

SECTION 1.

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Article 1 of Chapter 16 of Title 15 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to general provisions regarding sheriffs, is amended in Code Section 15-16-1, relating to qualification requirements for sheriff and exemptions, by deleting "and" at the end of subparagraph (c)(1)(I), by revising subparagraph (c)(1)(J), by adding a new subparagraph

(c)(1)(K), by revising paragraphs (c)(2) and (c)(4), and by revising subsection (d) as follows:

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"(J)(i) At the time of qualifying as a candidate for the office of sheriff, Is a registered peace officer as provided in Code Section 35-8-10 or is a certified peace officer as defined in Chapter 8 of Title 35 and is in good standing with the Georgia Peace Officer Standards and Training Council. Any person who at the time of qualifying as a candidate for the office of sheriff is not a registered or certified peace officer at the time such person assumes the office of sheriff shall be required to complete satisfactorily but is receiving retirement benefits, other than disability retirement benefits, as a former agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation shall satisfactorily complete the requirements for certification as a peace officer as provided in Chapter 8 of Title 35 within six months after such person takes office; provided, however, that an extension of the time to complete such requirements may be granted by the Georgia Peace Officer Standards and Training Council upon the presentation of evidence by a sheriff that he or she was unable to complete the basic training course and certification requirements due to illness, injury, military service, or other reasons deemed sufficient by such council. The Georgia Peace Officer Standards and Training Council shall make every effort to ensure that space is available for newly elected sheriffs who are not certified or registered peace officers to attend the course as soon as possible after such persons take office. Such council shall notify the appropriate judge of the probate court whenever a newly elected sheriff who is not certified fails to become certified as a peace officer pursuant to the requirements of this subparagraph. (ii) As used in this subparagraph, the term 'in good standing with the Georgia Peace Officer Standards and Training Council' means that a peace officer has not had his or her peace officer certification revoked or suspended by the Georgia Peace Officer

Standards and Training Council in the previous five years and is not under any

43 sanction imposed by such council on the opening date of the qualifying period for 44 office; and 45 (K) At the time of qualifying as a candidate for the office of sheriff files with the officer before whom such person is qualifying a sworn statement attesting that he or she 46 47 is not receiving any medical disability retirement benefits from any local, state, or federal government retirement plan. 48 (2)(A) Upon request of a person seeking to qualify as a candidate for the office of 49 sheriff, the executive director of the Georgia Peace Officer Standards and Training 50 Council shall create and provide an affidavit attesting to such person's compliance with 51 52 the requirements of subparagraph (J) of paragraph (1) of this subsection. Such affidavit shall be signed by the executive director of the Georgia Peace Officer Standards and 53 Training Council, or his or her designee, and the person seeking to qualify as a 54 candidate for the office of sheriff. Such affidavit shall be presented to the officer before 55 56 whom such person is qualifying prior to the end of the qualifying period for such office 57 in order to qualify as a candidate. 58 (B) Each person offering his or her candidacy for the office of sheriff shall, at the time 59 such person qualifies, swear or affirm before the officer before whom such person has 60 qualified to seek the office of sheriff that he or she meets all of the qualifications 61 required by this subsection, except as otherwise provided in subparagraph (J) of 62 paragraph (1) of this subsection, and that he or she has complied or will comply with the requirements of subparagraph (G) of paragraph (1) of this subsection no later than 63 the close of business on the third business day following the close of such qualification 64 period." 65 "(4) Each person offering to run for the office of sheriff and who is otherwise qualified 66 67 shall be allowed, six months prior to qualifying and at his or her own expense, to attend the basic law enforcement mandate course for peace officers as a pre-service candidate. 68 69 The Georgia Peace Officer Standards and Training Council shall work to ensure that

space is available for such individuals to attend the course. Each such person attending the basic law enforcement mandate course for peace officers in accordance with this paragraph shall be entitled to reimbursement of his or her expenses if he or she is subsequently elected to the office of sheriff. Such reimbursement for expenses shall be limited to the cost of tuition, course uniforms, and course equipment and shall be paid by the office of sheriff to which he or she is elected. Any course uniforms or equipment for which reimbursement of expenses has been rendered shall become property of the office of sheriff to which the candidate was elected.

(d) **Exemption.** The requirements of subparagraphs (c)(1)(D), (c)(1)(E), through (c)(1)(F), and (c)(1)(H), (c)(1)(I), and (c)(1)(J) through (c)(1)(K) of this Code section shall be deemed to have been met by any person who is currently serving as a duly qualified and elected sheriff of one of the several counties of this state."

SECTION 2.

Said article is further amended by revising Code Section 15-16-20.1, relating to additional salary, as follows:

85 "15-16-20.1.

In addition to the minimum salary provided in Code Section 15-16-20, the sheriff of any county who performs the duties of a sheriff for a state court, probate court, magistrate court, juvenile court, or county recorder's court under any applicable general or local law of this state shall receive for his or her services in such court or courts a salary of not less than \$385.90 per month, to be paid from the funds of the county. A sheriff who serves in more than one such court shall receive only one such salary for up to two courts. Such salaries shall not be eligible for increase for any state cost-of-living or general performance based increases."

94 SECTION 3.

95 (a) Section 1 of this Act shall become effective upon its approval by the Governor or upon

- 96 its becoming law without such approval.
- 97 (b) Section 2 of this Act shall become effective on July 1, 2024.

98 SECTION 4.

99 All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.
