A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

1	To amend Chapter	11 of Title	5 and Code Se	ction 49-5-8 of the	Official Code of	Georgia
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- 2 Annotated, relating to the Juvenile Code and powers and duties of the Department of Human
- 3 Services, respectively, so as to allow the Division of Family and Children Services of the
- 4 Department of Human Services to offer extended care youth services to youths between 18
- 5 and 21 years of age under certain circumstances; to change a definition; to clarify juvenile
- 6 court jurisdiction and the termination of dependency orders; to provide for voluntary
- 7 agreements for services and court oversight; to change provisions relating to the Department
- 8 of Human Services' powers and duties; to provide for effective dates; to provide for related
- 9 matters; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

11 PART I
12 SECTION 1-1.

- 13 Chapter 11 of Title 15 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to the Juvenile
- 14 Code, is amended by revising paragraph (10) of Code Section 15-11-2, relating to definitions,
- 15 as follows:

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- 16 "(10) 'Child' means any individual who is:
- 17 (A) Under the age of 18 years;
- 18 (B) Under the age of 17 years when alleged to have committed a delinquent act;
- 19 (C) Under the age of 22 years and in the care of DFCS as a result of being adjudicated
- 20 dependent before reaching 18 years of age; Between 18 and 21 years of age and
- 21 receiving extended care youth services from DFCS; or
- 22 (D) Under the age of 23 years and eligible for and receiving independent living
- 23 services through DFCS as a result of being adjudicated dependent before reaching 18
- 24 years of age; or

(E) Under the age of 21 years who committed an act of delinquency before reaching the age of 17 years and who has been placed under the supervision of the court or on probation to the court for the purpose of enforcing orders of the court."

SECTION 1-2.

Said chapter is further amended by revising subparagraph (F) of paragraph (1) of Code Section 15-11-10, relating to exclusive original jurisdiction, as follows:

"(F) Has remained in foster care after such child's eighteenth birthday or who is receiving independent living services from DFCS after such child's eighteenth birthday; provided, however, that such jurisdiction shall be for the purpose of reviewing the status of such child and the services being provided to such child as a result of such child's independent living plan or status as a child in foster care Is receiving extended care youth services; provided, however, that such jurisdiction shall be for the purpose of reviewing the status of the case, determining that extended care youth services are in the best interests of such child, adopting a transition plan for such child, ensuring the provision of developmentally appropriate services and supports consistent with such plans, and determining whether reasonable efforts are being made to transition such child to independent living or another planned permanent adult living arrangement; or"

SECTION 1-3.

Said chapter is further amended by revising paragraph (16) of subsection (b) of Code Section
 15-11-201, relating to DFCS case plan contents, as follows:

"(16) A requirement that the DFCS case manager and staff and, as appropriate, other representatives of such child provide him or her with assistance and support in developing a transition plan that is personalized at the direction of such child, including specific options on housing, health insurance, education, local opportunities for mentors and continuing support services, and work force workforce supports and employment services, and is as detailed as such child may elect. The transition plan shall be completed in the 90 day period:

(A) Immediately immediately prior to the date on which such child will attain 18 years of age; or

(B) If such child remains in the care of DFCS past his or her eighteenth birthday, before his or her planned exit from DFCS care."

SECTION 1-4.

- 57 Said chapter is further amended by revising subsection (c) of Code Section 15-11-214,
- relating to duration of disposition orders, as follows:

"(c) Unless a child remains in DFCS care or continues to receive services from DFCS,
 when When a child adjudicated as a dependent child reaches 18 years of age, all orders in
 connection with dependency proceedings affecting him or her then in force terminate and
 he or she shall be discharged from further obligation or control."

63 **SECTION 1-5.**

64 Said chapter is further amended by adding a new article to read as follows:

65 "ARTICLE 4A

- 66 <u>15-11-340.</u>
- 67 (a) A child may receive extended care youth services from DFCS. In order to receive such
- 68 services, he or she must be between 18 and 21 years of age, sign a voluntary placement
- agreement with DFCS, and meet objective eligibility criteria established by DFCS, which
- shall include one or more of the following requirements:
- 71 (1) Be completing secondary education or a program leading to an equivalent credential;
- 72 (2) Be enrolled in an institution which provides postsecondary or vocational education;
- 73 (3) Be a participant in a program or activity designed to promote or remove barriers to
- 74 <u>employment;</u>
- 75 (4) Be employed for at least 120 hours per month;
- 76 (5) Be employed for 80 hours per month, provided that he or she is also engaged in one

- 81 (b) When a child is receiving extended care youth services from DFCS, a DFCS case

- 83 <u>develop a transition plan that is personalized at the direction of such child, including an</u>
- 84 option to execute a durable power of attorney for health care, health care proxy, or other
- 85 <u>similar document recognized by law with respect to health care and specific options on</u>
- 86 <u>housing, health insurance, education, local opportunities for mentors and continuing</u>
- 87 <u>support services, and workforce supports and employment services, and is as detailed as</u>
- 88 such child may elect. Such transition plan shall be completed within 30 days of the child
- agreeing to such services and shall be updated as required by this article.
- 90 (c) A child may terminate a voluntary placement agreement and stop receiving extended
- 91 <u>care youth services at any time.</u>

92 (d) Every 60 days, a DFCS case manager shall determine if a child is still eligible for

- 93 extended care youth services. If DFCS determines that a child is no longer eligible for
- 94 <u>extended care youth services, DFCS may terminate the voluntary placement agreement</u>
- 95 with such child and stop providing extended care youth services. DFCS shall provide
- 96 written or electronic notice to such child regarding such termination and to the court that
- 97 <u>approved such services.</u>
- 98 (e) A child who is within 12 months of becoming 21 years of age shall not be permitted
- 99 to sign a voluntary placement agreement with DFCS for extended care youth services.

- 101 (a) No later than 120 days after a voluntary placement agreement is signed by a child,
- DFCS shall file with the court a written report which shall contain the following:
- 103 (1) The child's name, date of birth, race, gender, and current address;
- 104 (2) Facts to support a finding that the child meets the eligibility criteria for extended care
- youth services and an explanation as to why it is in the child's best interests to receive
- extended care youth services;

- appropriate, approve or reject the plan for transition to independent living or another
- planned permanent adult living arrangement submitted by DFCS.

- (a) When a child is receiving services under this article, the date such child is considered
- to have entered foster care shall be 60 days after such child signed the voluntary placement
- 123 <u>agreement.</u>
- (b)(1) No later than 12 months after a child is considered to have entered foster care, the
- court shall hold a hearing and make findings of fact for the purpose of determining
- 126 <u>whether:</u>

(A) The services and supports provided by DFCS under the child's voluntary placement

129	(B) DFCS has made reasonable efforts to finalize the child's plan for transition to

136	with subsection (b) of this Code section no later than 12 months following the previous			
137	hearing. Such periodic review hearings shall continue so long as such child is eligible for			
138	and remains in extended care youth services.			
139	(d) Five days prior to any hearing conducted under this Code section, DFCS shall submit			
140	a report for the court's consideration, on a form adopted by DFCS, recommending a plan			
141	for transition to independent living or another permanent planned adult living arrangement			
142	and include the child's name, address, and telephone number, the date he or she entered			
143	extended care youth services, and the placement and services being provided for such child.			
144	(e) Within the 90 day period prior to a child no longer receiving extended care youth			
145	services from DFCS, a DFCS case manager and staff, and other representatives of such			
146	child and, as appropriate, such child shall develop a final transition plan that is personalized			
147	at the direction of such child, including an option to execute a durable power of attorney			
148	for health care, health care proxy, or other similar document recognized by law with			
149	respect to health care and specific options on housing, health insurance, education, local			
150	opportunities for mentors and continuing support services, and workforce supports and			
151	employment services, and is as detailed as such child may elect."

153	SECTION 2-1.			
154	Code Section 49-5-8 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to the powers and			
155	duties of the Department of Human Services, is amended in subsection (a) by deleting "and"			
156	at the end of paragraph (10), by replacing the period with "; and" at the end of paragraph			

"(12) Extended care youth services for youths between 18 and 21 years of age as set forth

in Article 4A of Chapter 11 of Title 15 and to receive federal reimbursement for providing

such services in accordance with 42 U.S.C. Section 675, as it existed on February 1, 2018."

(11), and by adding a new paragraph to read as follows:
