A RESOLUTION

1 Dedicating certain portions of the state highway system; and for other purposes.

19 for his fellow citizens, and the devotion, patience, and understanding he demonstrated to his
20 family and friends were admired by others; and

21 WHEREAS, he was a person of magnanimous strengths with an unimpeachable reputation
22 for integrity, intelligence, fairness, and kindness, and by the example he made of his life, he
23 made this world a better place in which to live; and

24 WHEREAS, it is abundantly fitting and proper that this remarkable and distinguished
25 Georgian be recognized appropriately by dedicating a bridge in his memory.

119 now known as the Hartwell Dam, a project that was unrealized at the time of his death on
120 May 10, 1955; and

121 WHEREAS, on October 11, 1940, the Highway Departments of South Carolina and Georgia,
122 in cooperation with the United States Bureau of Public Roads, erected a monument
123 dedicating the bridge over the Savannah River in honor of his unyielding commitment; and

124 WHEREAS, the stone monument dedicating the Louie Morris Bridge was relocated in 1958
125 after the river flooded the bridge and caused damage that necessitated the building of a new
126 bridge; and

127 WHEREAS, an official Georgia dedication sign does not exist at what is known as the Louie
128 Morris Bridge, and it is abundantly fitting and proper that this body recognizes this

129 remarkable and distinguished Georgian by erecting an official Georgia bridge dedication
130 marker.

165 and Lanier counties as a person who would assist them with any of their needs; and

166 WHEREAS, it is abundantly fitting and proper that this remarkable and distinguished couple
167 be recognized appropriately by dedicating an intersection in their memory.

281 was recognized with numerous medals, including the Purple Heart, Distinguished Flying
282 Cross, Air Medal, and the POW Medal; and

283 WHEREAS, it is abundantly fitting and proper that the extraordinary accomplishments of
284 this distinguished Georgian be appropriately recognized by dedicating an intersection in his
285 honor.

287 WHEREAS, Reverend Joe E. Edwards has demonstrated his commitment to teaching the

386 WHEREAS, Mr. Morey's bravery and sacrifice were recognized with a Purple Heart, Combat
387 Infantryman Badge, American Campaign Medal, and World War II Victory Medal; and

388 WHEREAS, Mr. Morey embodied the spirit of service, willing to find meaning in something
389 greater than himself, and it is abundantly fitting and proper that this remarkable and
390 distinguished American be recognized appropriately by dedicating a road in his memory.

392 WHEREAS, Mayor Eva Cohn Galambos is remembered by the citizens of this state for the
393 vital role she played in leadership and her deep personal commitment to the welfare of the
394 citizens of Georgia; and

395 WHEREAS, born in Berlin, Germany, Mayor Galambos graduated *summa cum laude* with
396 a bachelor's degree in business administration from the University of Georgia, earned a
397 master's degree in labor and industrial relations also from the University of Georgia, and
398 obtained a doctorate in economics from Georgia State University; and

399 WHEREAS, her first professional job was as an associate editor for the *Atlanta Journal of*
400 *Labor* and she went on to work with the Georgia State Merit System and the International
401 Association of Machinists and taught at Clark College and Georgia State University; and

402 WHEREAS, she was elected to serve as the first mayor of Sandy Springs after the city's
403 incorporation in 2005, a position she maintained until 2014; and

404 WHEREAS, prior to Mayor Galambos' service as mayor she served as president for the
405 Committee for Sandy Springs, co-founder and secretary of Sandy Springs Revitalization,

406 founder of Sandy Springs Clean and Beautiful, chairperson of services committee for the
407 Sandy Springs Council of Neighborhoods, chairperson of the Fulton County Housing
408 Authority, and founder of the Sandy Springs Civic Roundtable; and

409 WHEREAS, it is abundantly fitting and proper that this remarkable and distinguished
410 Georgian be recognized appropriately by dedicating an interchange in her memory.

412 WHEREAS, the State of Georgia lost one of its finest citizens and most dedicated law
413 enforcement officers with the passing of Sergeant First Class Ray F. Lents on December 16,
414 1993; and

415 WHEREAS, a native of Murray County, Georgia, Sergeant First Class Lents joined the
416 Georgia State Patrol in 1963 and was assigned to Post 27 in Blue Ridge upon graduating
417 from the 25th trooper school in Atlanta in 1964; and

418 WHEREAS, he was promoted to corporal in 1968 and sergeant in 1971 and served as
419 commander of Post 27 from 1971 until his retirement in 1993, diligently protecting and
420 serving the citizens of Fannin, Gilmer, Union, and Towns counties; and

421 WHEREAS, this dedicated law enforcement officer served as a guardian of this nation's
422 freedom and liberty with the United States Armed Forces and was a member of Lebanon
423 Baptist Church and Blue Ridge Masonic Lodge Number 67 F&AM; and

425 three remarkable children, Jeff, Tim, and Mandy; and

426 WHEREAS, Sergeant First Class Lents exhibited extraordinary devotion to duty, outstanding
427 loyalty, fine leadership, and meticulous attention to detail in all his duties, and it is
428 abundantly fitting and proper that an intersection be dedicated in his memory.

444 WHEREAS, during her term as mayor, Fire Station 11 was opened, allowing life-saving
445 services to be provided to the people of Morganton faster and more efficiently; and

446 WHEREAS, a woman of deep and abiding faith, Mayor Stephens taught Sunday school for
447 many years at Temple Baptist Church; and

448 WHEREAS, it is abundantly fitting and proper that this remarkable and distinguished
449 Georgian be recognized appropriately by dedicating a road in her memory.
