A RESOLUTION

1 Honoring the life of First Lieutenant Clyde Vernon Moore and dedicating a bridge in his
2 memory; and for other purposes.

3 WHEREAS, our nation's security continues to rely on patriotic men and women who put
4 their personal lives on hold in order to place themselves in harm's way to protect the
5 freedoms that all United States citizens cherish; and

6 WHEREAS, First Lieutenant Clyde Vernon Moore served as a guardian of this nation's
7 freedom and liberty with the United States Army and made the ultimate sacrifice on August
8 16, 1967, when he was killed during an enemy firefight in Vietnam while protecting his
9 fellow platoon members from an ambush; and

10 WHEREAS, a native of Irwinville, Georgia, First Lieutenant Moore demonstrated a deep
11 personal commitment to protecting democracy and a willingness to sacrifice his own
12 personal safety and comfort to ensure the well-being of his fellow man; and

13 WHEREAS, his selfless service to this nation and unyielding commitment to protecting the
14 people and ideals of the United States will long be remembered and appreciated; and

15 WHEREAS, First Lieutenant Moore embodied the spirit of service and the will to find
16 meaning in something greater than himself, and it is abundantly fitting and proper that this
17 remarkable and distinguished Georgian be recognized appropriately by dedicating a bridge
18 in his memory.

19 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ENACTED BY THE GENERAL
20 ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA that the bridge on State Route 32 over the Alapaha River in
21 Irwin County is dedicated as the Clyde Vernon Moore Memorial Bridge.

22 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Transportation is authorized and
23 directed to erect and maintain appropriate signs dedicating the Clyde Vernon Moore
24 Memorial Bridge.

25 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Clerk of the House of Representatives is authorized
26 and directed to make appropriate copies of this resolution available for distribution to the
27 family of First Lieutenant Clyde Vernon Moore and to the Department of Transportation.
