## A RESOLUTION

1 Honoring Mr. Eugene Patterson for his contributions to the Civil Rights Movement; and for

2 other purposes.

3 WHEREAS, Mr. Eugene Patterson was born on October 15, 1923, in Valdosta, Georgia; and

WHEREAS, he served as executive editor of both the *Atlanta Journal* and *Atlanta Constitution* from 1956 to 1960, and as editor of the *Atlanta Constitution* from 1960 to 1968,

6 and was considered a beacon of progressive reform in the segregationist South; and

WHEREAS, known for his integrity, intelligence, and fairness, he stalwartly refused to
publish FBI reports about the private life of the Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr., deeming
it "not our kind of journalism"; and

WHEREAS, when approached by the FBI to discredit Reverend King by publishing information received through tapping and bugging operations, Mr. Patterson referred to the story as "back-alley gossip" and rebuffed numerous attempts to have the story printed; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Patterson won a Pulitzer Prize in 1967 for his editorials supporting civil
rights for African Americans and combating white demagogues in Georgia and throughout
the South; and

WHEREAS, he gave inspiration to many through his high ideals, morals, and optimism about
the goodness of humanity, and the deep concern he demonstrated for his fellow citizens,
regardless of race, was admired by others.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES that
the members of this body join in honoring Mr. Eugene Patterson for his contributions to
equality and civil rights.
