A RESOLUTION

1 Commending community health workers; and for other purposes.

WHEREAS, a community health worker is a front line public health worker who is a trusted
member or has an unusually close understanding of the community served; and

WHEREAS, this trusting relationship enables the worker to serve as a liaison, link, or intermediary between health and social services and the community, facilitating access to services, improving the quality and cultural competence of service delivery, building individual and community capacity, and increasing health knowledge and self-sufficiency through activities such as outreach, community education, informal counseling, social support, and advocacy; and

WHEREAS, community health workers are a unique workforce recognized in 25 states with
a professional certification; and

WHEREAS, community health workers are a community-based workforce that buildsrelationships and capacity for health and well-being in underserved areas; and

WHEREAS, community health workers are a cross-sector workforce that connects
community members to health care and other social services, reducing barriers to health and
well-being; and

WHEREAS, community health workers are a proven workforce with decades of research
documenting effectiveness in maternal and child health, chronic disease interventions,
immunization, oral health, HIV, primary care, and many other disciplines, with a
documented return on investment for numerous programs; and

21 WHEREAS, community health workers fulfill a wide range of roles, including providing 22 cultural mediation among individuals, communities, and health and social service systems; 23 offering culturally appropriate health education and information; offering care coordination, 24 case management, and system navigation; providing coaching and social support; advocating 25 for individuals and communities; building individual and community capacity; providing 26 direct service, including basic screening tests such as weight and blood pressure screening, 27 basic services such as diabetic foot checks, and meeting basic needs; implementing 28 individual and community assessments; conducting outreach; and participating in evaluation 29 and research; and

30 WHEREAS, community health worker networks are statewide, regional, or local 31 community-based organizations, including community health worker associations and 32 coalitions with leadership or membership comprised of 50 percent or more of community 33 health workers, promoters, or community health representatives, whose mission and 34 activities focus on workforce development, mentoring, member mobilization, and advocacy.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES that
 the members of this body commend the significant contributions made by community health

workers on behalf of the citizens of this state; encourage collaboration at the local and state
level to raise awareness of the importance of community health workers; and express support
