## A RESOLUTION

- 1 Honoring the life and memory of Charles Wittenstein; and for other purposes.
- 2 WHEREAS, the State of Georgia mourns the loss of one of its most distinguished citizens  
3 with the passing of Charles Wittenstein on February 4, 2013, at the age of 85; and
- 4 WHEREAS, he spent more than 20 years working for the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai  
5 B'rith southern regional office in Atlanta, Georgia, making significant contributions to the  
6 organization in order to end discrimination; and
- 7 WHEREAS, a native of Brooklyn, New York, he earned his undergraduate degree from  
8 Columbia University and graduate degree from Columbia Law School; and
- 9 WHEREAS, in 1952, he married Elinor Heyman and moved to Atlanta, Georgia, to work for  
10 his father-in-law's law firm; and
- 11 WHEREAS, later, he went to work for the American Jewish Committee and the ADL, from  
12 which he retired in 1994; and
- 13 WHEREAS, there was a number of civil rights issues on which he worked, but one of his  
14 biggest was successfully obtaining a pardon for Leo Frank, a man wrongly accused and  
15 convicted of raping and murdering a 13 year-old girl; and
- 16 WHEREAS, this distinguish gentleman also served on the Atlanta Charter Commission in  
17 the 1970s and changed the face of Atlanta's government; and
- 18 WHEREAS, he is survived by his wife, three beloved children, and six loving grandchildren;

20 WHEREAS, Charles Wittenstein left the world with a philosophy that it is every person's  
21 responsibility to stand up when they see injustice, and this compassionate, jovial, and  
22 dedicated crusader for human rights will be missed by all who had the great fortune of  
23 knowing him.

24 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES that  
25 the members of this body join in honoring the life and memory of Charles Wittenstein and  
26 express their deepest and most sincere regret at his passing.

27 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Clerk of the House of Representatives is authorized  
28 and directed to transmit an appropriate copy of this resolution to the family of Charles  
29 Wittenstein.
