# A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

To amend Title 2 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to agriculture, so as
 enact the "Food Insecurity Eradication Act"; to provide a short title; to provide for
 definitions; to create the Georgia Food Security Advisory Council; to provide for duties; to
 provide for appointments and terms; to provide for reporting requirements; to provide for
 related matters; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

### 6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

# 7 SECTION 1. 8 Title 2 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to agriculture, is amended by 9 adding a new chapter to read as follows:

10 "<u>CHAPTER 24</u>

### 11 2-24-1.

12 This chapter shall be known and may be cited as the 'Georgia Food Insecurity Eradication
 13 <u>Act.'</u>

- 15 As used in this chapter, the term:
- 16 (1) 'Council' means the Georgia Food Security Advisory Council.
- 17 (2) 'Food bank' means an established nonprofit charitable organization which is qualified
- 18 <u>exempt from taxation under the provisions of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue</u>
- 19 Code of 1986 and which, as part of an existing food bank network, maintains a food
- 20 <u>distribution operation providing food to nonprofit food pantries and feeding centers that</u>
- 21 offer groceries or meals to persons in need of food assistance.
- 22 (3) 'Food insecurity' means a household-level economic and social condition of limited
- 23 <u>or uncertain access to adequate food.</u>
- 24 (4) 'Food pantry' means a public or private nonprofit organization which distributes food
- 25 <u>directly to persons in need of services.</u>
- 26 (5) 'SNAP' means the federally and state funded Georgia State Nutrition Assistance
- 27 <u>Program and the Georgia Grown Farm to Food Bank Program.</u>
- 28 (6) 'WIC' means the federally funded health and nutrition program for Infants and
- 29 Children age one to five years (including foster children), Pregnant Women,
- 30 Breastfeeding Mothers (up to one year), Postpartum Women (up to six months), and a
- 31 <u>low-income parent or guardian who is the sole provider of children under age five who</u>
- 32 <u>are at nutritional risk and who are at or below 185 percent of the federal poverty level.</u>
- 33 <u>2-24-3.</u>
- 34 (a) There is established the Georgia Food Security Advisory Council created within the
- 35 Department of Agriculture, and the council shall:
- 36 (1) Recommend regulatory solutions to the WIC Program. The solutions should include
- 37 <u>but are not necessarily limited to adding grocery store owners and other food providers</u>
- 38 who obtain and maintain their WIC license;

39	(2) Recommend ways the State of Georgia can use tax credits including the New Market
40	Tax Credit as an economic incentive to create and maintain grocery stores in food
41	insecure areas;
42	(3) Recommend ways to maximize current educational programs which educate the
43	public on purchasing and consuming healthy foods;
44	(4) Recommend ways to maximize current funding efforts to assist food banks and food
45	pantries;
46	(5) Recommend policies which expand the number of farmers markets which may accept
47	SNAP benefits;
48	(6) Recommend policies that encourage the use of food co-ops and community gardens
49	located in Georgia;
50	(7) Recommend policies that increase collaboration between the State of Georgia and
51	nonprofits which seek to eradicate food insecurity;
52	(8) Recommend policies that increase collaboration between the State of Georgia and
53	private entities which seek to end food insecurity; and
54	(9) Create bylaws, not in conflict with this Code section.
55	(b) The Georgia Food Security Advisory Council shall consist of at least 23 members
56	appointed by the Governor who have training, experience, or special knowledge concerning
57	agriculture and community food resources as follows:
58	(1) The Commissioner of Agriculture or his or her designee;
59	(2) The Commissioner of Labor or his or her designee;
60	(3) The commissioner of human services or his or her designee;
61	(4) The State School Superintendent or his or her designee;
62	(5) The director of the Division of Family and Children Services or his or her designee;
63	(6) The commissioner of public health or his or her designee;
64	(7) The commissioner of community affairs or his or her designee;

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65	(8) A representative from the University of Georgia Extension appointed by the
66	Governor;
67	(9) A representative from the University of Georgia Food Systems Initiative appointed
68	by the Lieutenant Governor;
69	(10) A representative from Emory University or a similar institution of higher learning
70	which is dedicated to ending food insecurity, appointed by the Speaker of the House of
71	Representatives;
72	(11) A representative from Grady Health Systems or a comparable hospital dedicated to
73	ending Food Insecurity appointed by the Speaker Pro Tempore of the House of
74	Representatives;
75	(12) A representative from a certified community development entity that seeks to foster
76	economic development in the State of Georgia with consultation by Atlanta emerging
77	markets appointed by the Majority Leader of the Senate;
78	(13) A representative who is or is an agent of an owner or operator of a Georgia farmers
79	market with consultation provided by the Georgia Farmers Market Association appointed
80	by the Majority Leader of the House of Representatives;
81	(14) A representative from an organization dedicated to solving food insecurity by using
82	scientific methods and research based principles with consultation from Science of
83	Georgia appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate;
84	(15) A representative from a food policy council with consultation from the Georgia
85	Food Security Advisory Council appointed by the Minority Leader of the House of
86	Representatives;
87	(16) A representative from a Georgia Chamber of Commerce with consultation by the
88	Georgia Chamber of Commerce appointed by the Governor;
89	(17) A representative from Georgia State University appointed by the Lieutenant
90	<u>Governor:</u>

91	(18) A grocery store owner or operator with consultation by the Georgia Food Industry
92	Association appointed by the Senate President Pro Tempore;
93	(19) A county commissioner appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives
94	with consultation with the Association County Commissioners of Georgia;
95	(20) A Georgia mayor appointed by the Speaker Pro Tempore of the House of
96	Representatives with consultation with the Georgia Municipal Association;
97	(21) A Georgia farmer appointed by the Majority Leader of the Senate in consultation
98	with the Georgia Fruit and Vegetable Growers Association;
99	(22) An owner or operator of a food bank with consultation from the Georgia Food Bank
100	Association appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate; and
101	(23) An owner or operator of a food pantry with consultation from the Georgia Food
102	Bank Association appointed by the Minority Leader of the House of Representatives.
103	(c)(1) Except for the appointment terms of council members listed in paragraphs (1)
104	through (7) of subsection (b) of this Code section, appointments to the council shall be
105	for a term of three years. The initial terms shall commence no later than October 1, 2022,
106	and shall expire on June 30 of the members' respective term limits. Except those
107	members of the council whose terms will not expire, each member shall serve until their
108	successors are appointed and duly qualified. Any appointed member shall be eligible for
109	reappointment.
110	(2) The members appointed in paragraphs (1) through (7) of subsection (b) of this Code
111	section do not have term limits and their terms are not staggered.
112	(3) The terms of members appointed in paragraphs (8) through (13) of subsection (b) of
113	this Code section shall end on June 30, 2025.
114	(4) The terms of members appointed in paragraphs (14) through (19) of subsection (b)
115	of this Code section shall end on June 30, 2026.
116	(5) The terms of members appointed in paragraphs (20) through (23) of subsection (b)
117	of this Code section shall end on June 30, 2027.

118	(d)(1) The Food Security Advisory Council shall have one chairperson. The council
119	shall, by a majority vote of the members, select the chairperson every other year from
120	among current members of the council.
121	(2) The chairperson shall call the meetings and shall notify the members of each meeting
122	being called at least seven days before the date on which the meeting is to occur.
123	Meetings shall be held as often as the chairperson deems necessary but not less than four
124	times each calendar year. The chairperson shall arrange for the location and staffing of
125	the meetings, and the cost shall be borne by the council from funds duly appropriated by
126	the General Assembly or other funding sources agreed upon by a majority vote of the
127	<u>council.</u>
128	(e) Any vacancy on the Food Security Advisory Council resulting from the resignation of
129	a member or otherwise shall be filled in the same manner in which the original appointment
130	was made and the term shall be for the balance of the unexpired term of the member who
131	created the vacancy.
132	(f) The council members shall receive no salary, but may be allowed a per diem and travel
133	expenses as allowed by law and available appropriations.
134	(g) The Department of Agriculture shall provide a space in Atlanta, Georgia, or other
135	designated space as agreed upon by the majority of the council.
136	(h) No later than October 1 of each year the council shall report its findings and
137	recommendations, including any legislative proposals, (if applicable) to the Governor, the
138	Lieutenant Governor, the Commissioner of Agriculture, the Senate President Pro Tempore,
139	the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Majority and Minority Leaders of the
140	Senate, and the Speaker Pro Tempore. The first report due under this subsection is due no
141	later than December 1, 2022."

## **SECTION 2.**

- 143 This Act shall become effective upon its approval by the Governor or upon its becoming law
- 144 without such approval.

## 145 **SECTION 3.**

146 All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.
