## A RESOLUTION

- 1 Encouraging local law enforcement agencies, psychiatric facilities, doctors, and therapists
- 2 to purchase and freely distribute Mental Health Alert Wristbands to those suffering from
- 3 mental illness; commending Ms. Dottie Bailey for developing the Mental Health Alert
- 4 Wristband; and for other purposes.
- 5 WHEREAS, administrated by the Georgia Public Safety Training Center in partnership with
- 6 the Georgia Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Disabilities, the Georgia
- 7 Association of Community Service Boards, the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI)
- 8 Georgia, and other community partners, the Georgia Crisis Intervention Team works to
- 9 ensure that first responders are trained to properly identify and assist mentally ill citizens in
- 10 crisis; and
- 11 WHEREAS, since only 4,103 officers throughout Georgia have been trained in the Crisis
- 12 Intervention Team Program as of August 2019, it is essential that this program continues so
- 13 that all Georgia officers and first responders can be instructed on how to safely assist those
- 14 in crisis regardless of their mental health diagnosis; and
- 15 WHEREAS, on December 10, 2015, USA Today reported that Americans with mental
- 16 illnesses are 16 times more likely to be killed by law enforcement, stating that almost one in
- 17 four fatal police encounters involved someone with a mental illness; and
- 18 WHEREAS, the National Alliance on Mental Illness has reported that two million people
- 19 with mental illnesses are booked into jails each year, which accounts for nearly 15 percent
- 20 of incarcerated men and 30 percent of incarcerated women, most of whom are not violent
- 21 criminals and lack needed treatment, which often leads to repeated arrests; and
- WHEREAS, a simple and effective aid to law enforcement officers and other first responders
- 23 is the Mental Health Alert Wristband, an inexpensive silicon band with a blue and silver

24 design developed by Glynn County's Dottie Bailey, a Crisis Intervention Team community

- 25 presenter and certified peer specialist; and
- 26 WHEREAS, as of September 2019, 6,200 wristbands have been purchased or donated; and
- 27 WHEREAS, the NAMI Golden Isles Chapter and NAMI's headquarters in Georgia strongly
- 28 support Ms. Bailey's efforts toward making the Mental Health Alert Wristbands more widely
- 29 available; the wristbands are already in use at many locations throughout Georgia and other
- 30 states, such as Maine, Montana, Oregon, South Carolina, Texas, and Virginia; and
- 31 WHEREAS, the wristbands are a symbol of the bond between Crisis Intervention Team law
- 32 enforcement officers and the mental health communities they serve, and Crisis Intervention
- 33 Team officers are encouraged to wear the bands as a way for those with mental illnesses to
- asily identify safe people to ask for assistance; and
- 35 WHEREAS, the Savannah Police Department is implementing a full-time Behavioral Health
- 36 Unit and has recognized the value of Mental Health Alert Wristbands as an immediate way
- 37 for citizens in need and officers to visually identify each other; and
- 38 WHEREAS, the mayor of Brunswick, Georgia, and the city's police and fire departments
- 39 have expressed how beneficial these wristbands are in emergency situations, allowing first
- 40 responders to quickly recognize someone who is in need of medical assistance rather than
- 41 a jail cell; and
- 42 WHEREAS, healthcare organizations that serve the mental health community are also
- 43 recognizing the tangible benefits the wristbands grant to patients.
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE that the members of this body
- 45 encourage local law enforcement agencies, psychiatric facilities, doctors, and therapists to
- 46 purchase and freely distribute Mental Health Alert Wristbands to citizens who have mental
- 47 health disabilities to ensure their continued safety within their communities.
- 48 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the members of this body commend Ms. Dottie Bailey
- 49 for developing a simple, creative, and effective tool for helping those with mental illnesses
- 50 interact more positively with law enforcement officers and first responders.
