Re: Support for SB1421 – Relating to Medical Records

The Queen's Health Systems (Queen's) is a nonprofit corporation that provides expanded health care capabilities to the people of Hawai'i and the Pacific Basin. Since the founding of the first Queen's hospital in 1859 by Queen Emma and King Kamehameha IV, it has been our mission to provide quality health care services in perpetuity for Native Hawaiians and all of the people of Hawai'i. Over the years, the organization has grown to four hospitals, and more than 10,000 affiliated physicians, caregivers, and dedicated medical staff statewide. As the preeminent health care system in Hawai'i, Queen's strives to provide superior patient care that is constantly advancing through education and research.

Queen's supports of SB1421, which repeals the requirement for the Department of Health to approve a provider's arrangement for the retention and preservation of patients' medical records prior to ceasing operations; it also clarifies that retention and preservation of medical records must be consistent with federal and state regulations.

We appreciate the Department of Health's and the Legislature's commonsense approach to modernizing the state's approach to medical record retention. As noted in the preamble of the measure, providers must comply with a set of federal and state regulations (including those under HIPPA, CMS, etc.) that require medical records be retained for certain number of years. This bill would remove a redundant approval requirement that could allow greater flexibility and efficiency when a provider intends to close practice.
