## **HOUSE BILL No. 1014**

## DIGEST OF INTRODUCED BILL

Citations Affected: IC 13-21-3-12.

**Synopsis:** Lake County solid waste management district. Provides that the Lake County solid waste management district may not exercise the power to construct and operate facilities for solid waste management, enter into certain contracts concerning the management of solid waste, enter into agreements for the leasing of certain solid waste facilities, purchase or lease real or personal property for the management or disposal of solid waste, sell or lease certain solid waste facilities, accept gifts, grants, loans of money, other property, or services from any source and comply with the terms of the gift, grant, or loan, or borrow in anticipation of taxes, unless: (1) the district has submitted a recommendation to the county executive of Lake County concerning the exercise of the power; and (2) the county executive has adopted an ordinance approving the recommendation and authorizing the district to exercise the power.

Effective: July 1, 2015.

## **HOUSE BILL No. 1014**

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning environmental law.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

1	SECTION 1. IC 13-21-3-12, AS AMENDED BY P.L.37-2012
2	SECTION 51, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
3	JULY 1, 2015]: Sec. 12. (a) Except as provided in section 14.5 of this
4	chapter and subject to subsection (b), the powers of a district include
5	the following:
6	(1) The power to develop and implement a district solid waste
7	management plan under IC 13-21-5.
8	(2) The power to impose district fees on the final disposal of solid
9	waste within the district under IC 13-21-13.
10	(3) The power to receive and disburse money, if the primary
11	purpose of activities undertaken under this subdivision is to carry
12	out the provisions of this article.
13	(4) The power to sue and be sued.
14	(5) The power to plan, design, construct, finance, manage, own
15	lease, operate, and maintain facilities for solid waste



1	management.
2	(6) The power to enter with any person into a contract or an
3	agreement that is necessary or incidental to the management of
4	solid waste. Contracts or agreements that may be entered into
5	under this subdivision include those for the following:
6	(A) The design, construction, operation, financing, ownership,
7	or maintenance of facilities by the district or any other person.
8	(B) The managing or disposal of solid waste.
9	(C) The sale or other disposition of materials or products
10	generated by a facility.
11	Notwithstanding any other statute, the maximum term of a
12	contract or an agreement described in this subdivision may not
13	exceed forty (40) years.
14	(7) The power to enter into agreements for the leasing of facilities
15	in accordance with IC 36-1-10 or IC 36-9-30.
16	(8) The power to purchase, lease, or otherwise acquire real or
17	personal property for the management or disposal of solid waste.
18	(9) The power to sell or lease any facility or part of a facility to
19	any person.
20	(10) The power to make and contract for plans, surveys, studies,
21	and investigations necessary for the management or disposal of
22	solid waste.
23	(11) The power to enter upon property to make surveys.
24	soundings, borings, and examinations.
25	(12) The power to:
26	(A) accept gifts, grants, loans of money, other property, or
27	services from any source, public or private; and
28	(B) comply with the terms of the gift, grant, or loan.
29	(13) The power to levy a tax within the district to pay costs of
30	operation in connection with solid waste management, subject to
31	the following:
32	(A) Regular budget and tax levy procedures.
33	(B) Section 16 of this chapter.
34	However, except as provided in sections 15 and 15.5 of this
35	chapter, a property tax rate imposed under this article may not
36	exceed eight and thirty-three hundredths cents (\$0.0833) on each
37	one hundred dollars (\$100) of assessed valuation of property in
38	the district.
39	(14) The power to borrow in anticipation of taxes.
40	(15) The power to hire the personnel necessary for the
41	management or disposal of solid waste in accordance with an
42	approved budget and to contract for professional services.
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1	(16) The power to otherwise do all things necessary for the:
2	(A) reduction, management, and disposal of solid waste; and
2 3 4 5	(B) recovery of waste products from the solid waste stream;
4	if the primary purpose of activities undertaken under this
5	subdivision is to carry out the provisions of this article.
6	(17) The power to adopt resolutions that have the force of law.
7	However, a resolution is not effective in a municipality unless the
8	municipality adopts the language of the resolution by ordinance
9	or resolution.
10	(18) The power to do the following:
11	(A) Implement a household hazardous waste and conditionally
12	exempt small quantity generator (as described in 40 CFR
13	261.5(a)) collection and disposal project.
14	(B) Apply for a household hazardous waste collection and
15	disposal project grant under IC 13-20-20 and carry out all
16	commitments contained in a grant application.
17	(C) Establish and maintain a program of self-insurance for a
18	household hazardous waste and conditionally exempt small
19	quantity generator (as described in 40 CFR 261.5(a))
20	collection and disposal project, so that at the end of the
21	district's fiscal year the unused and unencumbered balance of
22	appropriated money reverts to the district's general fund only
23	if the district's board specifically provides by resolution to
24	discontinue the self-insurance fund.
25	(D) Apply for a household hazardous waste project grant as
26	described in IC 13-20-22-2 and carry out all commitments
27	contained in a grant application.
28	(19) The power to enter into an interlocal cooperation agreement
29	under IC 36-1-7 to obtain:
30	(A) fiscal;
31	(A) fiscal; (B) administrative;

	(C) managerial; or
33	(D) operational;
34	services from a county or municipality.
35	(20) The power to compensate advisory committee members for
36	attending meetings at a rate determined by the board.
37	(21) The power to reimburse board and advisory committee
38	members for travel and related expenses at a rate determined by
39	the board.
40	(22) The power to pay a fee from district money to:
41	(A) in a joint district, the county or counties in which a final
42	disposal facility is located; or



1	(B) a county that:
2	(i) was part of a joint district;
3 4 5	(ii) has withdrawn from the joint district as of January 1,
4	2008; and
5	(iii) has established its own district in which a final disposal
6	facility is located.
7	(23) The power to make grants or loans of:
8	(A) money;
9	(B) property; or
10	(C) services;
11	to public or private recycling programs, composting programs, or
12	any other programs that reuse any component of the waste stream
13	as a material component of another product, if the primary
14	purpose of activities undertaken under this subdivision is to carry
15	out the provisions of this article.
16	(24) The power to establish by resolution a nonreverting capital
17	fund. A district's board may appropriate money in the fund for:
18	(A) equipping;
19	(B) expanding;
20	(C) modifying; or
21	(D) remodeling;
22	an existing facility. Expenditures from a capital fund established
23	under this subdivision must further the goals and objectives
24	contained in a district's solid waste management plan. Not more
25	than five percent (5%) of the district's total annual budget for the
26	year may be transferred to the capital fund that year. The balance
27	in the capital fund may not exceed twenty-five percent (25%) of
28	the district's total annual budget. If a district's board determines
29	by resolution that a part of a capital fund will not be needed to
30	further the goals and objectives contained in the district's solid
31	waste management plan, that part of the capital fund may be
32	transferred to the district's general fund, to be used to offset
33	tipping fees, property tax revenues, or both tipping fees and
34	property tax revenues.
35	(25) The power to conduct promotional or educational programs
36	that include giving awards and incentives that further:
37	(A) the district's solid waste management plan; and
38	(B) the objectives of minimum educational standards
39	established by the department of environmental management.
40	(26) The power to conduct educational programs under
41	IC 13-20-17.5 to provide information to the public concerning:
42	(A) the reuse and recycling of mercury in:
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1	(i) mercury commodities; and
2	(ii) mercury-added products; and
3	(B) collection programs available to the public for:
4	(i) mercury commodities; and
5	(ii) mercury-added products.
6	(27) The power to implement mercury collection programs under
7	IC 13-20-17.5 for the public and small businesses.
8	(28) The power to conduct educational programs under
9	IC 13-20.5 to provide information to the public concerning:
10	(A) reuse and recycling of electronic waste;
11	(B) collection programs available to the public for the disposal
12	of electronic waste; and
13	(C) proper disposal of electronic waste.
14	(b) Before the county district of a county that has a population
15	of more than four hundred thousand (400,000) but less than seven
16	hundred thousand (700,000) may exercise a power set forth in
17	subsection (a)(5), (a)(6), (a)(7), (a)(8), (a)(9), (a)(12), or (a)(14):
18	(1) the county district must submit a recommendation to the
19	county executive of the county concerning the county district's
20	proposed exercise of the power; and
21	(2) the county executive must adopt an ordinance that:
22	(A) approves the recommendation; and
23	(B) authorizes the county district to exercise the power.
