ENGROSSED HOUSE BILL No. 1072

DIGEST OF HB 1072 (Updated March 9, 2021 11:08 am - DI 133)

Citations Affected: IC 9-21.

Synopsis: Personal delivery devices. Provides that a person delivery device may operate in Indiana under certain circumstances, but may not operate on portions of any state route, U.S. route, or interstate highway comprising the state highway system located in a municipality. Requires a personal delivery device operator to maintain certain levels of insurance coverage. Provides that a personal delivery device is exempt from motor vehicle licensing and registration requirements. Provides that a political subdivision may participate in the regulation of personal delivery devices. Provides that local governments shall not be required to make or pay for infrastructure improvements for the purpose of better accommodating personal delivery devices. Provides that a political subdivision may not enact or enforce an ordinance or resolution relating to: (1) the design, manufacture, maintenance, certification, licensing, registration, taxation, assessment, or insurance of a personal delivery device; or (2) the types of property that may be transported by a personal delivery device.

Effective: July 1, 2021.

ENGROSSED HOUSE BILL No. 1072

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning motor vehicles.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

1	SECTION 1. IC 9-21-11.5 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE
2	AS A NEW CHAPTER TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
3	JULY 1, 2021]:
4	Chapter 11.5. Personal Delivery Devices
5	Sec. 0.5. This chapter does not apply to portions of state routes,
6	U.S. routes, and interstate highways comprising the state highway
7	system located in a municipality.
8	Sec. 1. As used in this chapter, "agent" refers to a person who
9	is charged with the responsibility of navigating and operating a
10	personal delivery device. The term does not include:
11	(1) A person who requests or receives the services of a
12	personal delivery device for the purpose of transporting
13	property.
14	(2) A person who only arranges for and dispatches the
15	requested services of a personal delivery device.
16	Sec. 2. As used in this chapter, "personal delivery device" means
17	a powered device that satisfies the following:

1	(1) The device is operated primarily on sidewalks and
2	crosswalks.
3	(2) The device is intended primarily for the transport of
4	property on public rights-of-way.
5	(3) The weight of the device is not greater than five hundred
6	(500) pounds, excluding cargo.
7	(4) The device is capable of navigating with or without the
8	active control or monitoring of an individual.
9	Sec. 3. As used in this chapter, "personal delivery device
10	operator" means a person or the person's agent who exercises
11	physical control or monitoring over the navigation system and
12	operation of a personal delivery device.
13	Sec. 4. A personal delivery device may operate in Indiana on any
14	sidewalk, crosswalk, road, or street of any county or municipality
15	in Indiana.
16	Sec. 5. A personal delivery device must satisfy all of the
17	following:
18	(1) The personal delivery device must include a unique
19	identifying device number.
20	(2) The personal delivery device must include a means of
21	identifying the personal delivery device operator.
22	(3) The personal delivery device must not unreasonably
23	interfere with motor vehicles or traffic.
24	(4) The personal delivery device must not block public rights-
25	of-way.
26	(5) The personal delivery device must obey all traffic and
27	pedestrian control signals and devices.
28	(6) The personal delivery device may not operate on a
29	sidewalk or crosswalk at a speed that is greater than ten (10)
30	miles per hour.
31	(7) The personal delivery device must be equipped with a
32	system that enables the personal delivery device to come to a
33	controlled stop.
34	(8) If the personal delivery device is being operated between
35	sunset and sunrise, it must be equipped with lighting on both
36	its front and rear that is visible in clear weather from a
37	distance of at least five hundred (500) feet to its front and
38	rear.
39	(9) The personal delivery device shall not be used for the
40	transportation of hazardous material regulated under the
41	Hazardous Materials Transportation Act (49 U.S.C. 5103) and
42	is required to be placarded under 49 CFR Part 172, Subpart

2	Sec. 6. A personal delivery device operating on a sidewalk or
3	crosswalk shall have all the rights and responsibilities applicable
4	to a pedestrian under the same circumstances.
5	Sec. 7. A personal delivery device is exempt from motor vehicle
6	licensing and registration requirements under Indiana law.
7	Sec. 8. A personal delivery device operator shall maintain an
8	insurance policy that provides general liability coverage of at least
9	one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) for damages arising from
10	the combined operations of personal delivery devices under a
11	personal delivery device operator's control.
12	Sec. 9. A political subdivision may adopt by ordinance or
13	resolution restrictions on personal delivery devices. A political
14	subdivision shall:
15	(1) hold a public meeting before enacting an ordinance or
16	resolution to restrict personal delivery devices; and
17	(2) notify all companies determined to be affected by the
18	ordinance or resolution restricting personal delivery devices.
19	Sec. 10. A political subdivision may not be required to:
20	(1) install additional traffic signs or signals;
21	(2) make improvements or extensions to infrastructure; or
22	(3) pay for improvements to infrastructure;
23	for the purpose of accommodating or providing increased access
24	for personal delivery devices.
25	Sec. 11. A political subdivision may not enact or enforce an
26	ordinance or resolution relating to any of the following:
27	(1) The design, manufacture, maintenance, certification,
28	licensing, registration, taxation, assessment, or insurance of
29 30	a personal delivery device.
	(2) The types of property that may be transported by a
31	personal delivery device.

Page 1, between lines 4 and 5, begin a new paragraph and insert:

"Sec. 0.5. This chapter does not apply to portions of state routes, U.S. routes, and interstate highways comprising the state highway system located in a municipality.".

Page 3, between lines 15 and 16, begin a new paragraph and insert:

"Sec. 10. A political subdivision may not be required to:

(1) install additional traffic signs or signals;

(2) make improvements or extensions to infrastructure; or(3) pay for improvements to infrastructure;

for the purpose of accommodating or providing increased access for personal delivery devices.".

Page 3, line 16, delete "10." and insert "11.".

and when so amended that said bill do pass.
