

HOUSE BILL No. 1223

DIGEST OF INTRODUCED BILL

Citations Affected: IC 16-36-2-3; IC 23-14; IC 25-15-9-18; IC 29-2-16.1; IC 31-17-2-17; IC 36-2-14-6.

Synopsis: Issues relating to the death of a minor. Provides that if a minor child dies, the parent awarded: (1) sole legal custody; or (2) primary physical custody (if joint legal custody was awarded to the parents); is the parent who may decide issues regarding the disposition of the child's body, including autopsy, cremation, funeral arrangements, or anatomical gifts.

Effective: July 1, 2016.

HOUSE BILL No. 1223

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning probate.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

- 1 SECTION 1. IC 16-36-2-3 IS AMENDED TO READ AS
2 FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2016]: Sec. 3. (a) For the purpose
3 of this chapter, consent for a licensed physician to conduct an autopsy
4 of the body of a deceased person is sufficient when given by the
5 following persons if the persons survive the deceased:
6 (1) By the surviving spouse. However, if the deceased and the
7 surviving spouse were legally separated at the date of death, the
8 survivor is not considered a surviving spouse.
9 (2) If there is no surviving spouse, then by any one (1) adult child
10 of the deceased.
11 (3) **Subject to subdivision (5)**, if there is no surviving spouse or
12 adult child of the deceased, then by one (1) parent of the
13 deceased.
14 (4) If there is no surviving spouse, adult child, or parent and there
15 is an adult who is next of kin of the deceased residing in the
16 county in which the deceased died a resident, then by any one (1)
17 next of kin.



1 **(5) If the decedent is a minor child and the subject of a**
 2 **custody order, the parent who was awarded:**

3 **(A) sole legal custody of the minor child; or**

8 donor's body or part if the donor made an anatomical gift of the donor's
9 body or part under section 4 of this chapter or an amendment to an
10 anatomical gift of the donor's body or part under section 5 of this
11 chapter.

12 (b) A donor's revocation of an anatomical gift of the donor's body or
13 part under section 5 of this chapter is not a refusal and does not bar the
14 person specified in section 3 or 8 of this chapter from making an
15 anatomical gift of the donor's body or part under section 4 or 9 of this
16 chapter.

17 (c) If a person other than the donor makes an unrevoked anatomical
18 gift of the donor's body or part under section 4 of this chapter or an
19 amendment to an anatomical gift of the donor's body or part under
20 section 5 of this chapter, another person may not make, amend, or
21 revoke the gift of the donor's body or part under section 9 of this
22 chapter.

23 (d) A revocation of an anatomical gift of a donor's body or part
24 under section 5 of this chapter by a person other than the donor does
25 not bar another person from making an anatomical gift of the body or
26 part under section 4 or 9 of this chapter.

27 (e) In the absence of an express, contrary indication by the donor or
28 other person authorized to make an anatomical gift under section 3 of
29 this chapter, an anatomical gift of a part is neither a refusal to give
30 another part nor a limitation on the making of an anatomical gift of
31 another part at a later time by the donor or another person.

32 (f) In the absence of an express, contrary indication by the donor or
33 other person authorized to make an anatomical gift under section 3 of
34 this chapter, an anatomical gift of a part for one (1) or more of the
35 purposes set forth in section 3 of this chapter is not a limitation on the
36 making of an anatomical gift of the part for any of the other purposes
37 of the donor or any other person under section 4 or 9 of this chapter.

38 (g) If a donor who is an unemancipated minor dies, a parent of the
39 donor **as set forth in section 8(a)(4) of this chapter** who is reasonably
40 available may revoke or amend an anatomical gift of the donor's body
41 or part.

42 (h) If an unemancipated minor who signed a refusal dies, a parent



1 of the minor **as set forth in section 8(a)(4) of this chapter**, who is
 2 reasonably available may revoke the minor's refusal.

 32 subsection (a)(1), (a)(3), (a)(4), (a)(5), (a)(6), (a)(7), or (a)(9) entitled
 33 to make an anatomical gift, an anatomical gift may be made by a
 34 member of the class unless that member or a person to whom the gift
 35 may pass under section 10 of this chapter knows of an objection by
 36 another member of the class. If an objection is known, the gift may be
 37 made only by a majority of the members of the class who are
 38 reasonably available.

39 (c) A person may not make an anatomical gift if, at the time of the

 24 person in the county:

25 (1) has died from violence;

 33 connection with the death of the decedent.
