DIGEST OF INTRODUCED BILL

Citations Affected: IC 20-20-8-8; IC 20-34-6.

Synopsis: Bullying. Provides that a school corporation is not required to report the number of incidents of bullying in the school corporation's annual school performance report. Provides that information reported by a school corporation relating to the number of incidents of bullying that occur may not be used in calculation of a school's annual school improvement grade. Provides that the department of education (department) must annually send a letter to each school corporation explaining: (1) the school corporation's obligation to submit a report to the department containing the number of bullying incidents involving a student; and (2) that the department may conduct an audit of the school corporation to ensure that bullying incidents are accurately reported. Provides that the department may conduct an audit of a school corporation to ensure that bullying incidents are accurately reported. Provides that the department must report discrepancies of an audit on the department's Internet web site. Requires the department to conduct a statewide survey concerning the improvement of school corporation reporting of incidents of bullying involving a student to the department. Requires, not later than November 1, 2018, the department to submit a report to the general assembly.

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning education.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

26	(b) Section 3(a) of this chapter does not apply to the publication of
27	information required under this subsection. This subsection applies to

16	(B) the training the officers must complete.
17	(6) If the school corporation employs private security guards to
18	enforce rules or laws on school property, a detailed explanation
19	of the use of private security guards by the school corporation.
20	(7) If the school corporation has an agreement with a local law
20	enforcement agency regarding procedures to arrest students on
21	school property, a detailed explanation of the use of the local law
23	enforcement agency by the school corporation.
23	(8) The number of reported bullying incidents involving a student

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SECTION 3. IC 20-34-6-2 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE 1 2 AS A NEW SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE 3 UPON PASSAGE]: Sec. 2. (a) Not later than June 1, 2018, and each 4 June 1 thereafter, the department shall send a letter to each school 5 corporation explaining: 6 (1) the school corporation's obligation to report bullying 7 incidents under section 1(8) of this chapter; and 8 (2) that the department may conduct an audit of a school 9 corporation under subsection (b) to ensure the school 10 corporation's compliance with the requirements of section 11 1(8) of this chapter. 12 (b) The department may conduct an audit of a school 13 corporation to ensure that the school corporation is accurately 14 reporting bullying incidents under section 1(8) of this chapter. If 15 the department finds discrepancies in the school corporation's 16 reporting of bullying incidents under section 1(8) of this chapter, 17 the department shall post a copy of the department's findings on 18 the department's Internet web site. 19 SECTION 4. [EFFECTIVE UPON PASSAGE] (a) The definitions 20 in IC 20 apply throughout this SECTION. 21 (b) The department shall conduct a statewide survey concerning 22 a school corporation's obligation to report incidents of bullying 23 under IC 20-34-6-1(8). The survey shall request the following 24 information from school corporations: 25 (1) Situations that may prevent a school corporation from 26 accurately reporting bullying incidents to the department. 27 (2) Recommendations to improve accuracy or efficiency of a 28 school corporation's reporting of bullying incidents. 29 (3) Resources that would assist the school corporation to 30 accurately report bullying incidents to the department. 31 (4) Resources that would assist the school corporation to 32 efficiently report bullying incidents to the department. 33 (5) Any information requested by the department to improve 34 the accuracy of bullying incident reporting. 35 (c) The survey described in subsection (b) may be in an 36 electronic format. 37 (d) The department shall compile the results of the survey under 38 subsection (b) and prepare a report of the results of the survey and 39 may include recommendations by the department of suggested 40 legislative changes that may assist in improving the accuracy of 41 reporting of incidents of bullying involving a student reported by

42 a school corporation under IC 20-34-6-1(8).



(e) Before November 1, 2018, the department shall report the
 department's findings to the general assembly in an electronic
 format under IC 5-14-6. The department shall post the report on
 its Internet web site.
 (f) This SECTION expires January 1, 2019.
