

HOUSE BILL No. 1389

DIGEST OF INTRODUCED BILL

Citations Affected: IC 11-12-3.7; IC 33-37-8; IC 33-39-1-8; IC 34-30-2-148.6; IC 35-31.5-2-68.5; IC 35-36-12.

Synopsis: Crimes and persons with intellectual disabilities. Defines "intellectual disability" and permits a person with an intellectual disability to participate in a forensic diversion program. Authorizes a prosecuting attorney to require a person participating in a prosecutorial diversion program to receive mental health treatment to reduce recidivism, and permits diversion and deferral fees to be used to fund mental health treatment programs to reduce recidivism. Permits a criminal court to appoint a court appointed special advocate to assist a person with an intellectual disability who is charged with a criminal offense.

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning criminal law and procedure.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

1 SECTION 1. IC 11-12-3.7-4, AS AMENDED BY P.L.192-2007,
2 SECTION 4, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
3 JULY 1, 2015]: Sec. 4. As used in this chapter, "forensic diversion
4 program" means a program designed to provide an adult:
5 (1) who has **an intellectual disability**, a mental illness, an
6 addictive disorder, or ~~both a mental illness and an addictive~~
7 ~~disorder; a combination of those conditions;~~ and
8 (2) who has been charged with a crime that is not a violent
9 offense;
10 an opportunity to receive community treatment and other services
11 addressing mental health and addiction instead of or in addition to
12 incarceration.
13 SECTION 2. IC 11-12-3.7-4.5 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA
14 CODE AS A **NEW** SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS
15 [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2015]: **Sec. 4.5. As used in this chapter,**



1 **"intellectual disability" means a disability characterized by**
 2 **significant limitations in:**

3 **(1) intellectual functioning; and**

4 **(2) adaptive behavior;**

5 **that originated before the person became eighteen (18) years of**
 6 **age.**

7 SECTION 3. IC 11-12-3.7-7, AS AMENDED BY P.L.2-2014,
 8 SECTION 55, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
 9 JULY 1, 2015]: Sec. 7. (a) An advisory board shall develop a forensic
 10 diversion plan to provide an adult who:

11 (1) has **an intellectual disability**, a mental illness, an addictive
 12 disorder, or ~~both a mental illness and an addictive disorder~~; **a**
 13 **combination of those conditions**; and

14 (2) has been charged with a crime that is not a violent crime;
 15 an opportunity, pre-conviction or post-conviction, to receive
 16 community treatment and other services addressing **intellectual**
 17 **disabilities**, mental health, and addictions instead of or in addition to
 18 incarceration.

19 (b) The forensic diversion plan may include any combination of the
 20 following program components:

21 (1) Pre-conviction diversion for adults with mental illness.

22 (2) Pre-conviction diversion for adults with addictive disorders.

23 **(3) Pre-conviction diversion for adults with intellectual**
 24 **disabilities.**

25 ~~(3)~~ **(4)** Post-conviction diversion for adults with mental illness.

26 ~~(4)~~ **(5)** Post-conviction diversion for adults with addictive
 27 disorders.

28 **(6) Post-conviction diversion for adults with intellectual**
 29 **disabilities.**

30 (c) In developing a plan, the advisory board must consider the
 31 ability of existing programs and resources within the community,
 32 including:

33 (1) a problem solving court established under IC 33-23-16;

34 (2) a court alcohol and drug program certified under
 35 IC 12-23-14-13;

36 (3) treatment providers certified by the division of mental health
 37 and addiction under IC 12-23-1-6 or IC 12-21-2-3(5); and

38 (4) other public and private agencies.

39 (d) Development of a forensic diversion program plan under this
 40 chapter or IC 11-12-2-3 does not require implementation of a forensic
 41 diversion program.

42 (e) The advisory board may:



- 1 (1) operate the program;
 2 (2) contract with existing public or private agencies to operate one
 3 (1) or more components of the program; or
 4 (3) take any combination of actions under subdivisions (1) or (2).
 5 (f) Any treatment services provided under the forensic diversion
 6 program:
 7 (1) for addictions must be provided by an entity that is certified by
 8 the division of mental health and addiction under IC 12-23-1-6;
 9 or
 10 (2) for mental health must be provided by an entity that is:
 11 (A) certified by the division of mental health and addiction
 12 under IC 12-21-2-3(5);
 13 (B) accredited by an accrediting body approved by the division
 14 of mental health and addiction; or
 15 (C) licensed to provide mental health services under IC 25.
 16 SECTION 4. IC 11-12-3.7-11, AS AMENDED BY P.L.168-2014,
 17 SECTION 25, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
 18 JULY 1, 2015]: Sec. 11. (a) A person is eligible to participate in a
 19 pre-conviction forensic diversion program only if the person meets the
 20 following criteria:
 21 (1) The person has **an intellectual disability**, a mental illness, a
 22 addictive disorder, or ~~both a mental illness and an addictive~~
 23 ~~disorder: a combination of those conditions.~~
 24 (2) The person has been charged with an offense that is:
 25 (A) not a violent offense; and
 26 (B) a Class A, B, or C misdemeanor, or a Level 6 felony that
 27 may be reduced to a Class A misdemeanor in accordance with
 28 IC 35-50-2-7.
 29 (3) The person does not have a conviction for a violent offense in
 30 the previous ten (10) years.
 31 (4) The court has determined that the person is an appropriate
 32 candidate to participate in a pre-conviction forensic diversion
 33 program.
 34 (5) The person has been accepted into a pre-conviction forensic
 35 diversion program.
 36 (b) Before an eligible person is permitted to participate in a
 37 pre-conviction forensic diversion program, the court shall advise the
 38 person of the following:
 39 (1) Before the individual is permitted to participate in the
 40 program, the individual will be required to enter a guilty plea to
 41 the offense with which the individual has been charged.
 42 (2) The court will stay entry of the judgment of conviction during



1 the time in which the individual is successfully participating in
 2 the program. If the individual stops successfully participating in
 3 the program, or does not successfully complete the program, the
 4 court will lift its stay, enter a judgment of conviction, and
 5 sentence the individual accordingly.

6 (3) If the individual participates in the program, the individual
 7 may be required to remain in the program for a period not to
 8 exceed three (3) years.

9 (4) During treatment the individual may be confined in an
 10 institution, be released for treatment in the community, receive
 11 supervised aftercare in the community, or may be required to
 12 receive a combination of these alternatives.

13 (5) If the individual successfully completes the forensic diversion
 14 program, the court will waive entry of the judgment of conviction
 15 and dismiss the charges.

16 (6) The court shall determine, after considering a report from the
 17 forensic diversion program, whether the individual is successfully
 18 participating in or has successfully completed the program.

19 (c) Before an eligible person may participate in a pre-conviction
 20 forensic diversion program, the person must plead guilty to the offense
 21 with which the person is charged.

22 (d) Before an eligible person may be admitted to a facility under the
 23 control of the division of mental health and addiction, the individual
 24 must be committed to the facility under IC 12-26.

25 (e) After the person has pleaded guilty, the court shall stay entry of
 26 judgment of conviction and place the person in the pre-conviction
 27 forensic diversion program for not more than:

28 (1) two (2) years, if the person has been charged with a
 29 misdemeanor; or

30 (2) three (3) years, if the person has been charged with a felony.

31 (f) If, after considering the report of the forensic diversion program,
 32 the court determines that the person has:

33 (1) failed to successfully participate in the forensic diversion
 34 program, or failed to successfully complete the program, the court
 35 shall lift its stay, enter judgment of conviction, and sentence the
 36 person accordingly; or

37 (2) successfully completed the forensic diversion program, the
 38 court shall waive entry of the judgment of conviction and dismiss
 39 the charges.

40 SECTION 5. IC 11-12-3.7-12, AS AMENDED BY P.L.192-2007,
 41 SECTION 7, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
 42 JULY 1, 2015]: Sec. 12. (a) A person is eligible to participate in a



1 post-conviction forensic diversion program only if the person meets the
2 following criteria:

3 (1) The person has **an intellectual disability**, a mental illness, an
4 addictive disorder, or ~~both a mental illness and an addictive~~
5 ~~disorder: a combination of those conditions.~~

6 (2) The person has been convicted of an offense that is:

7 (A) not a violent offense; and

8 (B) not a drug dealing offense.

9 (3) The person does not have a conviction for a violent offense in
10 the previous ten (10) years.

11 (4) The court has determined that the person is an appropriate
12 candidate to participate in a post-conviction forensic diversion
13 program.

14 (5) The person has been accepted into a post-conviction forensic
15 diversion program.

16 (b) If the person meets the eligibility criteria described in subsection
17 (a) and has been convicted of an offense that may be suspended, the
18 court may:

19 (1) suspend all or a portion of the person's sentence;

20 (2) place the person on probation for the suspended portion of the
21 person's sentence; and

22 (3) require as a condition of probation that the person successfully
23 participate in and successfully complete the post-conviction
24 forensic diversion program.

25 (c) If the person meets the eligibility criteria described in subsection
26 (a) and has been convicted of an offense that is nonsuspendible, the
27 court may:

28 (1) order the execution of the nonsuspendible sentence; and

29 (2) stay execution of all or part of the nonsuspendible portion of
30 the sentence pending the person's successful participation in and
31 successful completion of the post-conviction forensic diversion
32 program.

33 The court shall treat the suspendible portion of a nonsuspendible
34 sentence in accordance with subsection (b).

35 (d) The person may be required to participate in the post-conviction
36 forensic diversion program for no more than:

37 (1) two (2) years, if the person has been charged with a
38 misdemeanor; or

39 (2) three (3) years, if the person has been charged with a felony.

40 The time periods described in this section only limit the amount of time
41 a person may spend in the forensic diversion program and do not limit
42 the amount of time a person may be placed on probation.



1 (e) If, after considering the report of the forensic diversion program,
 2 the court determines that a person convicted of an offense that may be
 3 suspended has failed to successfully participate in the forensic
 4 diversion program, or has failed to successfully complete the program,
 5 the court may do any of the following:

- 6 (1) Revoke the person's probation.
 7 (2) Order all or a portion of the person's suspended sentence to be
 8 executed.
 9 (3) Modify the person's sentence.
 10 (4) Order the person to serve all or a portion of the person's
 11 suspended sentence in:

12 (A) a work release program established by the department
 13 under IC 11-10-8 or IC 11-10-10; or

14 (B) a county work release program under IC 11-12-5.

15 (f) If, after considering the report of the forensic diversion program,
 16 the court determines that a person convicted of a nonsuspendible
 17 offense failed to successfully participate in the forensic diversion, or
 18 failed to successfully complete the program, the court may do any of
 19 the following:

20 (1) Lift its stay of execution of the nonsuspendible portion of the
 21 sentence and remand the person to the department.

22 (2) Order the person to serve all or a portion of the
 23 nonsuspendible portion of the sentence that is stayed in:

24 (A) a work release program established by the department
 25 under IC 11-10-8 or IC 11-10-10; or

26 (B) a county work release program under IC 11-12-5.

27 (3) Modify the person's sentence.

28 However, if the person failed to successfully participate in the forensic
 29 diversion program, or failed to successfully complete the program
 30 while serving the suspendible portion of a nonsuspendible sentence, the
 31 court may treat the suspendible portion of the sentence in accordance
 32 with subsection (e).

33 (g) If, after considering the report of the forensic diversion program,
 34 the court determines that a person convicted of a nonsuspendible
 35 offense has successfully completed the program, the court shall waive
 36 execution of the nonsuspendible portion of the person's sentence.

 38 SECTION 263, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS
 39 [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2015]: Sec. 4. (a) Except as provided in
 40 subsection (b), upon receipt of monthly claims submitted on oath to the
 41 fiscal body by a program listed in section 3(b) of this chapter, the fiscal
 42 body of the city or town shall appropriate from the city or town fund to



1 the program the amount collected for the program fee under
2 IC 33-37-5.

3 (b) Funds derived from a deferral program or a pretrial diversion
4 program may be disbursed only by the adoption of an ordinance
5 appropriating the funds for one (1) or more of the following purposes:

- 6 (1) Personnel expenses related to the operation of the program.

33 **treatment services.**

34 ~~(9)~~ **(10)** Any other purpose that benefits the office of the
35 prosecuting attorney or law enforcement and that is agreed upon
36 by the county fiscal body and the prosecuting attorney.

37 (c) Funds described in subsection (b) may be used only in
38 accordance with guidelines adopted by the prosecuting attorneys
39 council under IC 33-39-8-5.

41 SECTION 264, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS
42 [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2015]: Sec. 6. (a) Except as provided in



1 subsection (b), upon receipt of monthly claims submitted on oath to the
 2 fiscal body by a program listed in section 5(b) of this chapter, the
 3 county fiscal body shall appropriate from the county fund to the
 4 program or fund the amount collected for the program under
 5 IC 33-37-5.

 4 apply to a person who:

- 5 (1) holds a commercial driver's license; and
 6 (2) has been charged with an offense involving the operation of
 7 a motor vehicle in accordance with the federal Motor Carrier
 8 Safety Improvement Act of 1999 (MCSIA) (Public Law

9 **advocate" means a community volunteer who:**

10 (1) has completed a training program approved by the court
11 that includes training in:

12 (A) the development of a person with an intellectual
13 disability (as defined in IC 11-12-3.7-4.5); and

14 (B) evidence based treatment and counseling programs for
15 a person with an intellectual disability;

16 (2) has been appointed by a court to assist a person with an
17 intellectual disability who has been charged with a criminal
18 offense; and

19 (3) may research, examine, advocate, facilitate, and monitor
20 the situation of a person with an intellectual disability who
21 has been charged with a criminal offense.

25 **Chapter 12. Court Appointed Special Advocate for Persons**
26 **With Intellectual Disabilities**

27 **Sec. 1. A court may appoint a court appointed special advocate**
28 **at any time to assist a person with an intellectual disability who has**
29 **been charged with a criminal offense.**

30 **Sec. 2. A court appointed special advocate shall assist the person**
31 **with an intellectual disability to whom the advocate has been**
32 **appointed.**

33 **Sec. 3. A court appointed special advocate may recommend to**
34 **the court treatment programs and other services that may reduce**
35 **recidivism and are available to the person with an intellectual**
36 **disability.**

37 **Sec. 4. A court appointed special advocate serves until the court**
38 **enters an order for removal.**

39 **Sec. 5. The court appointed special advocate is considered an**
40 **officer of the court for the purpose of assisting the person with an**
41 **intellectual disability.**

42 **Sec. 6. A court appointed special advocate appointed by a court**



1 under this chapter may continue to assist the person with an
 2 intellectual disability while the person is undergoing treatment or
 3 serving the person's sentence, if applicable.

4 **Sec. 7. Except for gross misconduct:**

- 5 (1) a court appointed special advocate;
 6 (2) an employee of a county court appointed special advocate
 7 program; and
 8 (3) a volunteer for a court appointed special advocate
 9 program;

10 who performs in good faith duties relating to assistance of a person
 11 with an intellectual disability is immune from any civil liability that
 12 may occur as a result of that person's performance.

13 **Sec. 8. The court may order the person assisted by the court**
 14 **appointed special advocate to pay a user fee to the:**

- 15 (1) court appointed special advocate program; or
 16 (2) individual who served as a court appointed special
 17 advocate;

19 **Sec. 9. The court shall establish one (1) of the following**
