### **SENATE BILL No. 182**

DIGEST OF SB 182 (Updated January 25, 2022 12:54 pm - DI 106)

Citations Affected: IC 35-38.

**Synopsis:** Court procedures. Specifies that an arrest, criminal charge, or juvenile delinquency allegation that results in an adjudication for an infraction does not result in a conviction for purposes of expungement. Authorizes a person participating in a pretrial diversion program to file a petition for expungement with the authorization of the prosecuting attorney. Requires a court to automatically issue an expungement order, subject to certain exceptions, if: (1) all pending charges or allegations against a person are dismissed; (2) the person is acquitted or the conviction or true finding is vacated; (3) one year has passed since allegations were filed against a juvenile and the state is not pursuing the case; or (4) the person is arrested for a crime and no charges have been filed within 180 days. Makes conforming amendments.

Effective: July 1, 2022.

## **SENATE BILL No. 182**

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning criminal law and procedure.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

1 2	SECTION 1. IC 35-38-9-1, AS AMENDED BY P.L.219-2019, SECTION 7, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
3	JULY 1, 2022]: Sec. 1. (a) This section applies only to a person who
4	has been arrested, charged with an offense, or alleged to be a
5	delinquent child, if:
6	(1) the arrest, criminal charge, or juvenile delinquency allegation:
7	(A) did not result in a conviction or juvenile adjudication,
8	even if the arrest, criminal charge, or juvenile delinquency
9	allegation resulted in an adjudication for an infraction; or
10	(B) resulted in a conviction or juvenile adjudication and the
11	conviction or adjudication was expunged under sections 2
12	through 5 of this chapter, or was later vacated; and
13	(2) the person is not currently participating in a pretrial diversion
14	program, unless the prosecuting attorney authorizes the person
15	to petition for an expungement under this section.
16	(b) This subsection applies to a person charged with an offense
17	or alleged to be a delinquent child after June 30, 2022. If:



1	(1) a court dismisses all:
2	(A) criminal charges; or
3	(B) juvenile delinquency allegations;
4	filed and pending against a person;
5	(2) one (1) year has passed since juvenile delinquency
6	allegations were filed against a child, and:
7	(A) there is no disposition; and
8	(B) the state is not actively prosecuting the allegations; or
9	(3) in a:
10	(A) criminal trial a defendant is acquitted of all charges, or
11	the defendant's conviction is later vacated; or
12	(B) juvenile proceeding the court finds all allegations not
13	true, or the juvenile's true finding is later vacated;
14	the court shall immediately order all records related to the
15	criminal charges or juvenile delinquency allegations expunged. An
16	expungement order that is issued based on nonprosecution under
17	subdivision (2) goes into effect immediately. An expungement order
18	issued under subdivision (1) or (3) may not go into effect earlier
19	than sixty (60) days from the date of the dismissal, acquittal, or no
20	true finding. However, upon motion by the prosecuting attorney,
21	if the court finds that specific facts exist in the particular case
22	which justify a delay, the court may delay implementation of an
23	expungement order under subdivision (1) or (3) for up to one (1)
24	year from the date of the dismissal, acquittal, or no true finding.
25	(c) This subsection applies to a person arrested after June 30,
26	2022. If:
27	(1) a person is arrested;
28	(2) one hundred eighty (180) days have elapsed since the date
29	of the arrest; and
30	(3) no charges are pending against the person;
31	the prosecuting attorney shall notify a judge exercising criminal
32	jurisdiction in the county (or a designated judge, if applicable) of
33	these facts. Upon receipt of the notification, the judge shall
34	immediately order the expungement of all records related to the
35	arrest.
36	(b) (d) Not earlier than one (1) year after the date of arrest, criminal
37	charge, or juvenile delinquency allegation (whichever is later), if the
38	person was not convicted or adjudicated a delinquent child, or the
39	opinion vacating the conviction or adjudication becomes final, the
40	person may petition the court for expungement of the records related
41	to the arrest, criminal charge, or juvenile delinquency allegation.
42	However, a person may petition the court for expungement at an earlier



1	time if the prosecuting attorney agrees in writing to an earlier time.
2	(c) (c) A petition for expungement of records must be verified and
$\frac{2}{3}$	filed in a circuit or superior court in the county where the criminal
4	charges or juvenile delinquency allegation was filed, or if no criminal

36	(B) criminal charges are pending against the person.
37	(f) (h) Whenever the petition of a person under this section is
38	granted, or if an expungement order is issued without a petition

42	juvenile delinquency adjudication (including information from a



1	collateral action that identifies the petitioner), may be placed or

6	(2) the clerk of the supreme court shall seal or redact any records

12	(B) a court that conducted a collateral action;

16	concerning the person shall be redacted or permanently sealed;

18	(4) with respect to the records of a person who is named as an
19	appellant or an appellee in an opinion or memorandum decision
20	by the supreme court or the court of appeals, or who is identified
21	in a collateral action, the court shall:
22	(A) redact the opinion or memorandum decision as it appears
23	on the computer gateway administered by the office of
24	technology so that it does not include the petitioner's name (in
25	the same manner that opinions involving juveniles are
26	redacted); and
27	(B) provide a redacted copy of the opinion to any publisher or
28	organization to whom the opinion or memorandum decision is
29	provided after the date of the order of expungement.
30	The supreme court and the court of appeals are not required to
31	redact, destroy, or otherwise dispose of any existing copy of an
32	opinion or memorandum decision that includes the petitioner's
33	name.
34	(g) (i) If the court issues an order granting a petition for
35	expungement under this section, or issues an order for expungement
36	without a petition under subsection (b) or (c), the order must include
37	the information described in <del>subsection (c).</del> subsection (e).
38	(h) (j) If a person whose records are expunged brings an action that
39	might be defended with the contents of the expunged records, the
40	defendant is presumed to have a complete defense to the action. In
41	order for the plaintiff to recover, the plaintiff must show that the
42	contents of the expunged records would not exonerate the defendant.



1 The plaintiff may be required to state under oath whether the plaintiff 2 had records in the criminal or juvenile justice system and whether 3 those records were expunged. If the plaintiff denies the existence of the 4 records, the defendant may prove their existence in any manner 5 compatible with the law of evidence. 6 SECTION 2. IC 35-38-9-6, AS AMENDED BY P.L.219-2019, 7 SECTION 12, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE 8 JULY 1, 2022]: Sec. 6. (a) If the court orders conviction records, 9 including any records relating to the conviction and any records concerning a collateral action, expunged under sections 2 through 3 of 10 this chapter, the court shall do the following with respect to the specific 11 12 records expunged by the court: (1) Order: 13 14 (A) the department of correction; (B) the bureau of motor vehicles; and 15 16 (C) each: 17 (i) law enforcement agency; and 18 (ii) other person; 19 who incarcerated, prosecuted, provided treatment for, or 20 provided other services for the person under an order of the 21 court; 22 to prohibit the release of the person's records or information in the 23 person's records to anyone without a court order, other than a law 24 enforcement officer acting in the course of the officer's official 25 duty. 26 (2) Order the central repository for criminal history information 27 maintained by the state police department to seal the person's 28 expunged conviction records, including information related to: 29 (A) an arrest or offense: 30 (i) in which no conviction was entered; and 31 (ii) that was committed as part of the same episode of 32 criminal conduct as the case ordered expunged; and 33 (B) any other references to any matters related to the case ordered expunged, including in a collateral action. 34 This subdivision does not require the state police department to 35 36 seal any record the state police department does not have legal 37 authority to seal. 38 (3) Records sealed under subdivision (2) may be disclosed only 39 to: 40(A) a prosecuting attorney, if: 41 (i) authorized by a court order; and 42 (ii) needed to carry out the official duties of the prosecuting

32	(4) Notify the clerk of the supreme court to seal any records in the

35	A probation department may provide an unredacted version of a

However, a petition 6 for expungement granted under sections 2 through 3 of this chapter 7 does not affect an existing or pending driver's license suspension. 8 (c) If a petition to expunge conviction records, including any records 9 relating to the conviction and any records concerning a collateral 10 action, is granted under sections 2 through 3 of this chapter with respect to the records of a person who is named as an appellant or an 11 12 appellee in an opinion or memorandum decision by the supreme court 13 or the court of appeals, or who is identified in a collateral action, the 14 court shall: 15 (1) redact the opinion or memorandum decision as it appears on the computer gateway administered by the office of technology so 16 17 that it does not include the petitioner's name (in the same manner that opinions involving juveniles are redacted); and 18 19 (2) provide a redacted copy of the opinion to any publisher or 20 organization to whom the opinion or memorandum decision is provided after the date of the order of expungement. 21 22 The supreme court and court of appeals are not required to destroy or 23 otherwise dispose of any existing copy of an opinion or memorandum 24 decision that includes the petitioner's name. 25 (d) Notwithstanding subsection (b), a prosecuting attorney may submit a written application to a court that granted an expungement 26 27 petition under this chapter to gain access to any records that were 28 permanently sealed under subsection (b), if the records are relevant in 29 a new prosecution of the person. If a prosecuting attorney who submits 30 a written application under this subsection shows that the records are 31 relevant for a new prosecution of the person, the court that granted the 32 expungement petition shall: 33 (1) order the records to be unsealed; and 34 (2) allow the prosecuting attorney who submitted the written 35 application to have access to the records. 36 If a court orders records to be unsealed under this subsection, the court 37 shall order the records to be permanently resealed at the earliest 38 possible time after the reasons for unsealing the records cease to exist. 39 However, if the records are admitted as evidence against the person in 40 a new prosecution that results in the person's conviction, or are used to 41 enhance a sentence imposed on the person in a new prosecution, the 42 court is not required to reseal the records.



(e) If a person whose conviction records, including any records relating to the conviction and any records concerning a collateral action, are expunged under sections 2 through 5 of this chapter is required to register as a sex offender based on the commission of a felony which has been expunged:

(1) the expungement does not affect the operation of the sex offender registry web site, any person's ability to access the person's records, records required to be maintained concerning sex or violent offenders, or any registration requirement imposed on the person; and

(2) the expunged conviction records must be clearly marked as expunged on the sex offender registry web site.

(f) Expungement of a crime of domestic violence under section 2 of
this chapter does not restore a person's right to possess a firearm. The
right of a person convicted of a crime of domestic violence to possess
a firearm may be restored only in accordance with IC 35-47-4-7.

(g) If a court issues an order granting a petition for expungement
under sections 2 through 3 of this chapter, the court shall also order any
related records described in section 1(f) 1(h) of this chapter sealed or
redacted in the manner described in section 1 of this chapter, unless the
records described in section 1(f) 1(h) of this chapter, unless the
sealed and redacted under this section.
(h) If the court issues an order granting a petition for expungement

(h) If the court issues an order granting a petition for expungement under sections 2 through 3 of this chapter, the court shall include in its order the information described in section 8(b) of this chapter.

SECTION 3. IC 35-38-9-7, AS AMENDED BY P.L.219-2019, SECTION 13, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2022]: Sec. 7. (a) This section applies only to a person who has filed a petition for expungement under section 4 or 5 of this chapter and whose records have been ordered marked as expunged.

(b) The court records and other public records relating to the arrest, conviction, or sentence of a person whose conviction records, including any records relating to the conviction and any records concerning a collateral action, have been marked as expunged remain public records. However, the court shall order that the records be clearly and visibly marked or identified as being expunged. A petition for expungement granted under sections 4 through 5 of this chapter does not affect an existing or pending driver's license suspension.

(c) The state police department, the bureau of motor vehicles, and
any other law enforcement agency in possession of records that relate
to the conviction, including any records concerning a collateral action,
ordered to be marked as expunged shall add an entry to the person's

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record of arrest, conviction, or sentence in the criminal history data base stating that the record is marked as expunged. Nothing in this chapter prevents the bureau of motor vehicles from reporting information about a conviction for a violation of a traffic control law to the Commercial Drivers License Information System (CDLIS), in accordance with federal law, even if the conviction has been expunged under section 4 or 5 of this chapter.

8 (d) If the court issues an order granting a petition for expungement under section 4 or 5 of this chapter, the court shall include in its order 10 the information described in section 8(b) of this chapter.

(e) If a court issues an order granting a petition for expungement 11 under sections 4 through 5 of this chapter, the court shall also order any 12 13 related records described in section 1(f) 1(h) of this chapter marked as expunged, unless the records described in section 1(f) 1(h) of this 14 15 chapter have been ordered marked as expunged under this section.

SECTION 4. IC 35-38-9-10, AS AMENDED BY P.L.55-2020. 16 17 SECTION 11, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE 18 JULY 1, 2022]: Sec. 10. (a) This section does not apply to a person to 19 whom sealed records may be disclosed under section 6(a)(3) of this 20 chapter. With respect to a person seeking employment with a law 21 enforcement agency or a probation or community corrections 22 department, including volunteer employment, subsections (b), (d), (e), 23 and (f) do not apply to the law enforcement agency or the probation or 24 community corrections department.

(b) It is unlawful discrimination for any person to:

- (1) suspend;
- 27 (2) expel;

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28 (3) refuse to employ;

29 (4) refuse to admit;

30 (5) refuse to grant or renew a license, permit, or certificate 31 necessary to engage in any activity, occupation, or profession; or 32 (6) otherwise discriminate against;

any person because of a conviction or arrest record expunged or sealed under this chapter.

(c) Except as provided in section 6(f) of this chapter, the civil rights of a person whose conviction has been expunged shall be fully restored, including the right to vote, to hold public office, to be a proper person under IC 35-47-1-7(2), and to serve as a juror.

39 (d) In any application for employment, a license, or other right or 40 privilege, a person may be questioned about a previous criminal record 41 only in terms that exclude expunged convictions or arrests, such as: 42 "Have you ever been arrested for or convicted of a crime that has not



1 been expunged by a court?".

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2 (e) A person whose record is expunged shall be treated as if the 3 person had never been convicted of the offense. However, upon a 4 subsequent arrest or conviction for an unrelated offense, the prior expunged conviction:

6 (1) may be considered by the court in determining the sentence 7 imposed for the new offense; 8

(2) is a prior unrelated conviction for purposes of:

(A) a habitual offender enhancement; and

10 (B) enhancing the new offense based on a prior conviction; 11 and

(3) may be admitted as evidence in the proceeding for a new offense as if the conviction had not been expunged.

14 (f) Any person that discriminates against a person as described in 15 subsection (b) commits a Class C infraction and may be held in contempt by the court issuing the order of expungement or by any other 16 17 court of general jurisdiction. Any person may file a written motion of 18 contempt to bring an alleged violation of this section to the attention of 19 a court. In addition, the person is entitled to injunctive relief.

20 (g) In any judicial or administrative proceeding alleging negligence 21 or other fault, an order of expungement may be introduced as evidence 22 of the person's exercise of due care in hiring, retaining, licensing, 23 certifying, admitting to a school or program, or otherwise transacting 24 business or engaging in activity with the person to whom the order of 25 expungement was issued.

26 (h) A conviction, including any records relating to the conviction 27 and any records concerning a collateral action, that has been expunged 28 under this chapter is not admissible as evidence in an action for 29 negligent hiring, admission, or licensure against a person or entity who 30 relied on the order.

31 (i) An expungement case, and all documents filed in the case, 32 becomes confidential when the court issues the an expungement order. 33 granting the petition. However, until the court issues the an 34 expungement order, granting the petition, documents filed in the case 35 are not confidential, and any hearing held in the case shall be open.

Page 2, between lines 39 and 40, begin a new line block indented and insert:

"(2) one (1) year has passed since juvenile delinquency allegations were filed against a child, and:

(A) there is no disposition; and

**(B)** the state is not actively prosecuting the allegations; or". Page 2, line 40, delete "(2)" and insert "(3)".

Page 2, line 41, delete "charges;" and insert "charges, or the defendant's conviction is later vacated;".

Page 3, line 1, delete "true;" and insert "true, or the juvenile's true finding is later vacated;".

Page 3, line 3, after "expunged." insert "An expungement order that is issued based on nonprosecution under subdivision (2) goes into effect immediately.".

Page 3, line 4, delete "this subsection" and insert "**subdivision (1)** or (3)".

Page 3, line 9, delete "the" and insert "an".

Page 3, line 9, after "order" insert "under subdivision (1) or (3)".

Page 3, line 14, delete "sixty (60)" and insert "**one hundred eighty** (180)".

Renumber all SECTIONS consecutively.
