SENATE BILL No. 213

DIGEST OF SB 213 (Updated January 30, 2018 10:58 am - DI 84)

Citations Affected: IC 6-1.1; noncode.

Synopsis: Property tax exemption for affordable rental housing. Provides a property tax exemption for affordable rental housing property when the property does not otherwise qualify for a property tax exemption. Provides that, in order to qualify for the exemption, the owner must meet the criteria applied by the Internal Revenue Service in determining if an organization that provides low income housing is considered charitable because it relieves the poor and distressed.

Effective: January 1, 2019.

SENATE BILL No. 213

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning taxation.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

1	SECTION 1. IC 6-1.1-10-16, AS AMENDED BY P.L.181-2016,
2	SECTION 2, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
3	JANUARY 1, 2019]: Sec. 16. (a) All or part of a building is exempt
4	from property taxation if it is owned, occupied, and used by a person
5	for educational, literary, scientific, religious, or charitable purposes.
6	(b) A building is exempt from property taxation if it is owned,
7	occupied, and used by a town, city, township, or county for educational,
8	literary, scientific, fraternal, or charitable purposes.
9	(c) A tract of land, including the campus and athletic grounds of an
10	educational institution, is exempt from property taxation if:
11	(1) a building that is exempt under subsection (a) or (b) is situated
12	on it;
13	(2) a parking lot or structure that serves a building referred to in
14	subdivision (1) is situated on it; or
15	(3) the tract:
16	(A) is owned by a nonprofit entity established for the purpose
17	of retaining and preserving land and water for their natural

	(B) does not exceed five hundred (500) acres; and
2 3	(C) is not used by the nonprofit entity to make a profit.
4	(d) A tract of land is exempt from property taxation if:
5	(1) it is purchased for the purpose of erecting a building that is to
6	be owned, occupied, and used in such a manner that the building
7	will be exempt under subsection (a) or (b); and
8	(2) not more than four (4) years after the property is purchased,
9	and for each year after the four (4) year period, the owner
10	demonstrates substantial progress and active pursuit towards the
11	erection of the intended building and use of the tract for the
12	exempt purpose. To establish substantial progress and active
12	pursuit under this subdivision, the owner must prove the existence
14	of factors such as the following:
15	(A) Organization of and activity by a building committee or
16	other oversight group.
17	(B) Completion and filing of building plans with the
18	appropriate local government authority.
19	(C) Cash reserves dedicated to the project of a sufficient
20	amount to lead a reasonable individual to believe the actual
20	construction can and will begin within four (4) years.
22	(D) The breaking of ground and the beginning of actual
22	(D) The breaking of ground and the beginning of actual construction.
23	(E) Any other factor that would lead a reasonable individual to
25	believe that construction of the building is an active plan and
26	that the building is capable of being completed within eight (8)
20	years considering the circumstances of the owner.
28	If the owner of the property sells, leases, or otherwise transfers a tract
28 29	of land that is exempt under this subsection, the owner is liable for the
30	property taxes that were not imposed upon the tract of land during the
31	period beginning January 1 of the fourth year following the purchase
32	of the property and ending on December 31 of the year of the sale,
33	lease, or transfer. The county auditor of the county in which the tract
33 34	of land is located may establish an installment plan for the repayment
35	of taxes due under this subsection. The plan established by the county
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30 37	auditor may allow the repayment of the taxes over a period of years
38	equal to the number of years for which property taxes must be repaid
	under this subsection.
39 40	(e) Personal property is exempt from property taxation if it is owned
40	and used in such a manner that it would be exempt under subsection (a)
41	or (b) if it were a building.
42	(f) A hospital's property that is exempt from property taxation under



subsection (a), (b), or (e) shall remain exempt from property taxation even if the property is used in part to furnish goods or services to another hospital whose property qualifies for exemption under this section.

(g) Property owned by a shared hospital services organization that is exempt from federal income taxation under Section 501(c)(3) or 501(e) of the Internal Revenue Code is exempt from property taxation if it is owned, occupied, and used exclusively to furnish goods or services to a hospital whose property is exempt from property taxation under subsection (a), (b), or (e).

(h) This section does not exempt from property tax an office or a
practice of a physician or group of physicians that is owned by a
hospital licensed under IC 16-21-2 or other property that is not
substantially related to or supportive of the inpatient facility of the
hospital unless the office, practice, or other property:

16 (1) provides or supports the provision of charity care (as defined
17 in IC 16-18-2-52.5), including providing funds or other financial
18 support for health care services for individuals who are indigent
19 (as defined in IC 16-18-2-52.5(b) and IC 16-18-2-52.5(c)); or

20 (2) provides or supports the provision of community benefits (as
21 defined in IC 16-21-9-1), including research, education, or
22 government sponsored indigent health care (as defined in
23 IC 16-21-9-2).

However, participation in the Medicaid or Medicare program alone
does not entitle an office, practice, or other property described in this
subsection to an exemption under this section.

(i) The exemption provided in this subsection applies only for an
assessment date occurring before January 2, 2017. A tract of land or a
tract of land plus all or part of a structure on the land is exempt from
property taxation if:

(1) the tract is acquired for the purpose of erecting, renovating, or improving a single family residential structure that is to be given away or sold:

(A) in a charitable manner;

(B) by a nonprofit organization; and

(C) to low income individuals who will:

(i) use the land as a family residence; and

(ii) not have an exemption for the land under this section;

(2) the tract does not exceed three (3) acres; and

40 (3) the tract of land or the tract of land plus all or part of a
41 structure on the land is not used for profit while exempt under this
42 section.

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1 This subsection expires January 1, 2028. 2 (j) An exemption under subsection (i) terminates: 3 (1) when the property is conveyed by the nonprofit organization 4 to another owner; or 5 (2) January 2, 2017; 6 whichever occurs first. This subsection expires January 1, 2028. 7 (k) When property that is exempt in any year under subsection (i) is 8 conveyed to another owner, the nonprofit organization receiving the 9 exemption must file a certified statement with the auditor of the county, 10 notifying the auditor of the change not later than sixty (60) days after the date of the conveyance. The county auditor shall immediately 11 12 forward a copy of the certified statement to the county assessor. A 13 nonprofit organization that fails to file the statement required by this 14 subsection is liable for the amount of property taxes due on the 15 property conveyed if it were not for the exemption allowed under this 16 chapter. 17 (1) If property is granted an exemption in any year under subsection 18 (i) and the owner: 19 (1) fails to transfer the tangible property within eight (8) years 20 after the assessment date for which the exemption is initially 21 granted; or 22 (2) transfers the tangible property to a person who: 23 (A) is not a low income individual; or 24 (B) does not use the transferred property as a residence for at 25 least one (1) year after the property is transferred; the person receiving the exemption shall notify the county recorder and 26 27 the county auditor of the county in which the property is located not 28 later than sixty (60) days after the event described in subdivision (1) or 29 (2) occurs. The county auditor shall immediately inform the county 30 assessor of a notification received under this subsection. This 31 subsection expires January 1, 2028. 32 (m) If subsection (1)(1) or (1)(2) applies, the owner shall pay, not 33 later than the date that the next installment of property taxes is due, an 34 amount equal to the sum of the following: 35 (1) The total property taxes that, if it were not for the exemption under subsection (i), would have been levied on the property in 36 37 each year in which an exemption was allowed. 38 (2) Interest on the property taxes at the rate of ten percent (10%)39 per year. 40 This subsection expires January 1, 2028. 41 (n) The liability imposed by subsection (m) is a lien upon the 42 property receiving the exemption under subsection (i). An amount



1 collected under subsection (m) shall be collected as an excess levy. If 2 the amount is not paid, it shall be collected in the same manner that 3 delinquent taxes on real property are collected. This subsection expires 4 January 1, 2028. 5 (o) Property referred to in this section shall be assessed to the extent 6 required under IC 6-1.1-11-9. 7 (p) A for-profit provider of early childhood education services to 8 children who are at least four (4) but less than six (6) years of age on 9 the annual assessment date may receive the exemption provided by this 10 section for property used for educational purposes only if all the

11 requirements of section 46 of this chapter are satisfied. A for-profit 12 provider of early childhood education services that provides the 13 services only to children younger than four (4) years of age may not 14 receive the exemption provided by this section for property used for 15 educational purposes.

16 (q) Property that meets the requirements for an exemption
17 under section 48 of this chapter is exempt from property taxation
18 under this section.

19SECTION 2. IC 6-1.1-10-48 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE20AS A NEW SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE21JANUARY 1, 2019]: Sec. 48. (a) Tangible property owned,22occupied, and used to provide affordable rental housing that is not23otherwise exempt under section 16(a) through 16(p) of this chapter24is exempt under section 16(q) of this chapter if all the following25requirements are satisfied:

- (1) The owner is:
 - (A) an organization exempt from taxation under Section (501(a)/2) of the Intermed Decomposition of the organization of the section (501(a)/2) of the Intermed Decomposition of the section of the se
 - 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code; or
- (B) a single member limited liability company:
- 30(i) that is a disregarded entity under the Internal31Revenue Code of an organization described in clause32(A); and33(ii) for which an organization described in clause (A) is
 - (ii) for which an organization described in clause (A) is the only member.

35(2) The owner meets either of the following criteria for36organizations that provide low income housing to be37considered charitable as described in Section 501(c)(3) of the38Internal Revenue Code because they relieve the poor and39distressed:

40(A) The safe harbor provision contained in Internal41Revenue Service revenue procedure 96-32 (as in effect42January 1, 2019).

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1	(B) The facts and circumstances test that is applied in
2	Internal Revenue Service revenue procedure 96-32 (as in
2 3	effect January 1, 2019) if the organization falls outside the
4	safe harbor provision described in clause (A).
5	(3) The owner provides the township or county assessor with
6	documentation to illustrate compliance with the criteria in
7	Internal Revenue Service revenue procedure 96-32 (as in
8	effect January 1, 2019). The documentation provided under
9	this subdivision may include any of the following:
10	(A) The organization's ruling or determination letter from
11	the Internal Revenue Service for tax exempt status.
12	(B) The organization's Internal Revenue Service Form 990
13	(Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax), filed
14	by the organization for a taxable year.
15	(C) The organization's rent roll demonstrating that the
16	income levels of the residents of the tangible property for
17	which the owner is seeking an exemption under this section
18	meet the criteria described in subdivision (2).
19	The department of local government finance may adopt rules
20	under IC 4-22-2 to specify the documentation that an owner
21	may be required to provide to a township or county assessor
22	in order to illustrate compliance with the criteria in Internal
23	Revenue Service revenue procedure 96-32 (as in effect
24	January 1, 2019).
25	(b) An organization seeking an exemption under this section
26	must provide a copy of the organization's rental policy to the
27	township or county assessor.
28	(c) An owner of property receiving an exemption under this
29	section shall not be considered noncompliant with the requirements
30	of subsection (a) due to an increase in any tenant's income during
31	the period of such tenant's occupancy.
32	(d) An owner of property seeking an exemption under section 16
33	of this chapter based on this section must apply for the exemption
34	as required by IC 6-1.1-11.
35	(e) This section does not apply to property that is exempt under
36	section 16.7 of this chapter.
37	SECTION 3. [EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 2019] (a) IC 6-1.1-10-48,
38	as added by this act, applies to assessment dates after December 31,
39	2018.
40	(b) This SECTION expires January 1, 2022.
