DIGEST OF INTRODUCED BILL

Citations Affected: IC 4-6-3-2; IC 5-11-21; IC 31-37-19-5; IC 33-39-2-8; IC 35-50-5-3.

Synopsis: Annual review of unpaid restitution orders. Requires a governmental entity that is the beneficiary of a criminal or juvenile restitution order issued by a state or federal court to file annually with the court and with the state board of accounts a payment status report. Provides that the payment status report must include information on the status of the restitution order, including, if applicable, information concerning any arrearage. Requires the state board of accounts to review the status of a restitution order if it conducts an audit of a governmental entity that is the beneficiary of the restitution order. Grants the issuing court authority to facilitate enforcement of the restitution order. Allows the: (1) attorney general (in the case of a restitution order issued on behalf of the state); or (2) prosecuting attorney (in the case of a restitution order issued on behalf of a political subdivision); to bring an action to collect the amount owed under a restitution order that is more than one year in arrears. Allows the attorney general or prosecuting attorney to retain not more than 20% of the unpaid restitution order as reimbursement for the costs of bringing the action.

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning criminal law and procedure.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

1	SECTION 1. IC 4-6-3-2, AS AMENDED BY P.L.136-2012
2	SECTION 2, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
3	JULY 1, 2016]: Sec. 2. (a) The attorney general shall have charge of
4	and direct the prosecution of all civil actions that are brought in the
5	name of the state of Indiana or any state agency.
6	(b) In no instance under this section shall the state or a state agency
7	be required to file a bond.
8	(c) This section does not affect the authority of prosecuting
9	attorneys to prosecute civil actions.
0	(d) This section does not affect the authority of the inspector general
1	to prosecute a civil action under IC 4-2-7-6 for the recovery of any or
2	the following:
3	(1) Funds misappropriated, diverted, missing, or unlawfully
4	gained.
5	(2) A civil penalty imposed by the state ethics commission under
6	IC 4-2-6-12.
7	(e) The attorney general may bring an action to collect unpaid



1	registration fees owed by a commercial dog broker or a commercial
2	dog breeder under IC 15-21.
3	(f) The attorney general may bring an action to collect the
4	amount owed under a restitution order issued in favor of the state
5	if the restitution order is more than one (1) year in arrears. If the

7	subsection, the attorney general may retain not more than twenty
8	percent (20%) of the amount recovered as reimbursement for the
9	reasonable expenses of bringing the action.

13	(b) The juvenile court may, in addition to an order under section 6

17	a condition of probation under this subdivision. The juvenile court

39	(c) If the juvenile court orders supervision of the child by the
40	probation department under subsection (b)(1), the child or the child's
41	parent, guardian, or custodian is responsible for any costs resulting

from the participation in a rehabilitative service or educational class



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provided by the probation department. Any costs collected for services
or classes provided by the probation department shall be deposited in
the county supplemental juvenile probation services fund.

- (d) If a payment status report received by a juvenile court under IC 5-11-21-2 from a governmental entity that is the beneficiary of a restitution order issued by the court shows that the child ordered to make restitution has failed to comply with the court's restitution order, the court, on its own motion or upon motion of the governmental entity, may take one (1) or more of the following actions:
 - (1) Issue an order to show cause.
 - (2) Following a hearing, find the child to be in contempt of court if the child has knowingly or intentionally failed to comply with the restitution order.
 - (3) Take any other judicial action to facilitate compliance with the restitution order.

SECTION 4. IC 33-39-2-8 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE AS A NEW SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2016]: Sec. 8. (a) The prosecuting attorney may bring an action to collect the amount owed under a restitution order issued in favor of a political subdivision (as defined in IC 36-1-2-13) if the restitution order is more than one (1) year in arrears.

- (b) If the prosecuting attorney prevails in an action brought under this section, the prosecuting attorney may retain not more than twenty percent (20%) of the amount recovered as reimbursement for the reasonable expenses of bringing the action.
- SECTION 5. IC 35-50-5-3, AS AMENDED BY P.L.180-2014, SECTION 6, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2016]: Sec. 3. (a) Except as provided in subsection (i), (j), (l), or (m), in addition to any sentence imposed under this article for a felony or misdemeanor, the court may, as a condition of probation or without placing the person on probation, order the person to make restitution to the victim of the crime, the victim's estate, or the family of a victim who is deceased. The court shall base its restitution order upon a consideration of:
 - (1) property damages of the victim incurred as a result of the crime, based on the actual cost of repair (or replacement if repair is inappropriate);
 - (2) medical and hospital costs incurred by the victim (before the date of sentencing) as a result of the crime;
 - (3) the cost of medical laboratory tests to determine if the crime has caused the victim to contract a disease or other medical



1	condition;
2	(4) earnings lost by the victim (before the date of sentencing) as
3	a result of the crime including earnings lost while the victim was
4	hospitalized or participating in the investigation or trial of the
5	crime; and
6	(5) funeral, burial, or cremation costs incurred by the family or
7	estate of a homicide victim as a result of the crime.
8	(b) A restitution order under subsection (a), (i), (j), (l), or (m), is a
9	judgment lien that:
10	(1) attaches to the property of the person subject to the order;
11	(2) may be perfected;
12	(3) may be enforced to satisfy any payment that is delinquent
13	under the restitution order by the person in whose favor the order
14	is issued or the person's assignee; and
15	(4) expires;
16	in the same manner as a judgment lien created in a civil proceeding.
17	(c) When a restitution order is issued under subsection (a), the
18	issuing court may order the person to pay the restitution, or part of the
19	restitution, directly to:
20	(1) the victim services division of the Indiana criminal justice
21	institute in an amount not exceeding:
22	(A) the amount of the award, if any, paid to the victim under
23	IC 5-2-6.1; and
24	(B) the cost of the reimbursements, if any, for emergency
25	services provided to the victim under IC 16-10-1.5 (before its
26	repeal) or IC 16-21-8; or
27	(2) a probation department that shall forward restitution or part of
28	restitution to:
29	(A) a victim of a crime;
30	(B) a victim's estate; or
31	(C) the family of a victim who is deceased.
32	The victim services division of the Indiana criminal justice institute
33	shall deposit the restitution it receives under this subsection in the
34	violent crime victims compensation fund established by IC 5-2-6.1-40.
35	(d) When a restitution order is issued under subsection (a), (i), (j),
36	(l), or (m), the issuing court shall send a certified copy of the order to
37	the clerk of the circuit court in the county where the felony or
38	misdemeanor charge was filed. The restitution order must include the
39	following information:
40	(1) The name and address of the person that is to receive the
41	restitution.

(2) The amount of restitution the person is to receive.



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- Upon receiving the order, the clerk shall enter and index the order in the circuit court judgment docket in the manner prescribed by IC 33-32-3-2. The clerk shall also notify the department of insurance of an order of restitution under subsection (i).
- (e) An order of restitution under subsection (a), (i), (j), (l), or (m), does not bar a civil action for:
 - (1) damages that the court did not require the person to pay to the victim under the restitution order but arise from an injury or property damage that is the basis of restitution ordered by the court; and
 - (2) other damages suffered by the victim.
- (f) Regardless of whether restitution is required under subsection (a) as a condition of probation or other sentence, the restitution order is not discharged by the completion of any probationary period or other sentence imposed for a felony or misdemeanor.
- (g) A restitution order under subsection (a), (i), (j), (l), or (m), is not discharged by the liquidation of a person's estate by a receiver under IC 32-30-5 (or IC 34-48-1, IC 34-48-4, IC 34-48-5, IC 34-48-6, IC 34-1-12, or IC 34-2-7 before their repeal).
- (h) The attorney general may pursue restitution ordered by the court under subsections (a) and (c) on behalf of the victim services division of the Indiana criminal justice institute established under IC 5-2-6-8.
- (i) The court may order the person convicted of an offense under IC 35-43-9 to make restitution to the victim of the crime. The court shall base its restitution order upon a consideration of the amount of money that the convicted person converted, misappropriated, or received, or for which the convicted person conspired. The restitution order issued for a violation of IC 35-43-9 must comply with subsections (b), (d), (e), and (g), and is not discharged by the completion of any probationary period or other sentence imposed for a violation of IC 35-43-9.
- (j) The court may order the person convicted of an offense under IC 35-43-5-3.5 to make restitution to the victim of the crime, the victim's estate, or the family of a victim who is deceased. The court shall base its restitution order upon a consideration of the amount of fraud or harm caused by the convicted person and any reasonable expenses (including lost wages) incurred by the victim in correcting the victim's credit report and addressing any other issues caused by the commission of the offense under IC 35-43-5-3.5. If, after a person is sentenced for an offense under IC 35-43-5-3.5, a victim, a victim's estate, or the family of a victim discovers or incurs additional expenses that result from the convicted person's commission of the offense under



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1	IC 35-43-5-3.5, the court may issue one (1) or more restitution orders
2	to require the convicted person to make restitution, even if the court
3	issued a restitution order at the time of sentencing. For purposes of
4	entering a restitution order after sentencing, a court has continuing
5	jurisdiction over a person convicted of an offense under IC 35-43-5-3.5
6	for five (5) years after the date of sentencing. Each restitution order
7	issued for a violation of IC 35-43-5-3.5 must comply with subsections
8	(b), (d), (e), and (g), and is not discharged by the completion of any
9	probationary period or other sentence imposed for an offense under
10	IC 35-43-5-3.5.
11	(k) The court shall order a person convicted of an offense under
12	IC 35-42-3.5 to make restitution to the victim of the crime in an amount
13	equal to the greater of the following:
14	(1) The gross income or value to the person of the victim's labor
15	or services.
16	(2) The value of the victim's labor as guaranteed under the

- (2) The value of the victim's labor as guaranteed under the minimum wage and overtime provisions of:
 - (A) the federal Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938, as amended (29 U.S.C. 201-209); or
- (B) IC 22-2-2 (Minimum Wage); whichever is greater.
- (1) The court shall order a person who:
 - (1) is convicted of dealing in methamphetamine under IC 35-48-4-1.1; and
 - (2) manufactured the methamphetamine on property owned by another person, without the consent of the property owner;

to pay liquidated damages to the property owner in the amount of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) or to pay actual damages to the property owner, including lost rent and the costs of decontamination by an inspector approved under IC 13-14-1-15.

- (m) The court shall order a person who:
 - (1) is convicted of dealing in marijuana under IC 35-48-4-10(a)(1)(A); and
 - (2) manufactured the marijuana on property owned by another person, without the consent of the property owner;

to pay liquidated damages to the property owner in the amount of two thousand dollars (\$2,000).

(n) If a payment status report received by the court under IC 5-11-21-2 from a governmental entity that is the beneficiary of a restitution order issued by the court shows that the person ordered to make restitution has failed to comply with the court's restitution order, the court, on its own motion or upon motion of
