Synopsis: Home owner associations and solar power. Prohibits a homeowners association from adopting or enforcing certain rules after June 30, 2017, concerning solar energy systems.

SENATE BILL No. 500

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning property.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. IC 32-25.5-3.5 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE

2	AS A NEW CHAPTER TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
3	JULY 1, 2017]:
4	Chapter 3.5. Use of Solar Energy Systems Subject to
5	Homeowners Association Rules
6	Sec. 1. This chapter applies only to rules adopted by a
7	homeowners association after June 30, 2017.
8	Sec. 2. "Dwelling unit" has the meaning set forth in
9	IC 32-31-5-3.
10	Sec. 3. "Solar energy system" has the meaning set forth in
11	IC 36-7-2-8.
12	Sec. 4. IC 36-7-2-8 applies to this chapter.
13	Sec. 5. Except as provided in IC 36-7-2-8 and section 6 of this
14	chapter, a homeowners association may not prohibit the owner of
15	a dwelling unit from installing a solar energy system. However, a
16	homeowners association may require preapproval of the location
17	and manner in which a solar energy system is installed.

1	Sec. 6. A homeowners association may prohibit a solar energy
2	system if any of the following apply:
3	(1) A court has found that the solar energy system threatens
4	public health or safety.
5	(2) A court has found that the solar energy system violates a
6	law.
7	(3) The solar energy system is located on property owned or
8	maintained by the homeowners association.
9	(4) The solar energy system is located on property owned in
10	common by the members of the homeowners association.
11	(5) The solar energy system is located in an area other than on
12	the roof of the dwelling unit or of another structure.
13	(6) The solar energy system is located in an area other than in
14	a fenced yard or patio owned and maintained by the owner of
15	the dwelling unit.
16	(7) The solar energy system is mounted on the roof of the
17	dwelling unit and:
18	(A) extends above or beyond the roof of the dwelling unit;
19	(B) is located in an area other than an area designated by
20	the homeowners association, unless installing the solar
21	energy system in the area designated by the homeowners
22	association:
23	(i) would significantly increase the cost of the system;
24	(ii) would significantly decrease the efficiency of the
25	system; or
26	(iii) would not allow for an alternative system of
27	comparable cost and efficiency;
28	(C) does not conform to the slope of the roof and has a top
29	edge that is not parallel to the roof line; or
30	(D) has a frame, support bracket, or visible piping or
31	wiring that is not in a silver, bronze, or black tone
32	commonly available in the marketplace.
33	(8) The solar energy system is:
34	(A) located in a fenced yard or patio; and
35	(B) is taller than the fence line.
36	(9) The solar energy system is installed in a manner that voids
37	material warranties.
38	(10) Installation of the solar energy system device will
39	substantially interfere with use and enjoyment of land by
40	causing unreasonable discomfort or annoyance to a
41	reasonable person.
