2	Be it	t enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:
3		→ SECTION 1. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 160 IS CREATED TO
4	REA	AD AS FOLLOWS:
5	<u>(1)</u>	As used in this section, "innovation academy" means a school that has developed
6		a plan of innovation in compliance with this section and has been approved by
7		the Kentucky Board of Education to be exempted from certain administrative
8		regulations and statutory provisions to improve the educational performance of
9		students within the district.
10	<u>(2)</u>	The Kentucky Board of Education is hereby authorized to approve innovation
11		academies for the purpose of improving students' educational performance,
12		especially the performance of traditionally underperforming groups of students.
13		Innovation academies shall be exempt from all state statutes and administrative
14		regulations applicable to a local school board, school district, or school, except
15		that innovation academies shall adhere to the same health, safety, civil rights,
16		and disability rights requirements as are applicable to all public schools. The
17		initial approval of an innovation academy shall be for a five (5) year period. Each
18		renewal of an innovation academy shall not exceed five (5) years and shall
19		comply with administrative regulations promulgated by the board pursuant to
20		subsection (4) of this section.
21	<u>(3)</u>	The Kentucky Board of Education shall promulgate administrative regulations to
22		prescribe the conditions and procedures to be used by a school to be approved as
23		an innovation academy.
24	<u>(4)</u>	Administrative regulations promulgated by the board under subsection (3) of this
25		section shall specify:
26		(a) The application, plan review, approval, and amendment process for a
27		school;

1		(b)	<u>limelines for initial approval as an innovation academy, the renewal</u>
2		L	process, and ongoing evaluative procedures required of the district;
3		(c)	Acceptable documentation of parental and business support and capacity to
4		<u> </u>	effect a change;
5		(d)	The approvals required of the plan by certain employees of a school;
6		(e)	The process of revocation of the designation of an innovation academy;
7		<u>(f)</u>	Reporting and oversight responsibilities of the school and the Kentucky
8		1	Department of Education;
9		(g)	The financial detail relating to budgets of schools and evidence of sound
10		1	fiscal management practices;
11		(h)	Acceptable areas of emphasis for innovation;
12		(i) A	A streamlined process through which a public school that is part of a
13		1	District of Innovation may apply to become an innovation academy; and
14		<u>(j)</u>	Other components deemed necessary to implement this section.
15	<u>(5)</u>	A scho	ool which is an applicant to be designated as an innovation academy shall:
16		(a)	Establish performance targets for the innovation academy proposal, which
17		<u>s</u>	chall include one (1) or more of the following:
18		<u> </u>	1. Significantly reducing achievement gaps among groups of public
19			school students by expanding learning experiences for students;
20		<u> </u>	2. Increasing student learning for all students as evidenced by
21			performance on state assessments or college entrance examinations;
22		<u> </u>	3. Significantly increasing the number and percentage of students
23			scoring at a proficient level for reading on the third grade state
24			student assessment;
25		4	Increasing the school's overall performance rating by two (2) or more
26			levels in the state's assessment and accountability system;
27			5. Significantly increasing the number and percentage of students

1		graduating from high school with industry-recognized credentials,
2		advanced placement credit, articulated credit, or dual credit;
3	<u>6.</u>	Significantly increasing the number and percentage of students per
4		year who earn dual credit or earn a passing score on Advanced
5		Placement, International Baccalaureate, or Cambridge International
6		exams;
7	<u>7.</u>	Significantly increasing the number and percentage of high school
8		graduates who, upon graduation, enroll in a postsecondary education
9		institution or training program in the next occurring:
10		a. Summer or fall academic term for students who graduate in the
11		spring; or
12		b. Spring academic term for students who graduate in the fall; or
13	<u>8.</u>	Significantly increasing the number and percentage of high school
14		graduates that successfully complete thirty (30) or more postsecondary
15		credit hours within one (1) year after graduation from high school;
16	(b) Hav	e an innovation academy plan that describes and provides rationale for
17	the	innovative practices to be employed;
18	(c) Pro	vide documentation of parental and local board support of the proposed
19	inne	ovations; and
20	(d) Doc	ument the fiscal and human resources the board will provide
21	<u>thro</u>	ughout the term of the implementation of the innovations within its
22	<u>plan</u>	<u>!.</u>
23	(6) The inno	vation academy shall:
24	(a) Ens	ure the same health, safety, civil rights, and disability rights
25	<u>requ</u>	uirements as are applied to all public schools;
26	(b) Ens	ure students meet compulsory attendance requirements under KRS
27	<u>158.</u>	<u>030;</u>

1	<u>(c)</u>	Ensure that high school course offerings meet or exceed the minimum
2		required under KRS 156.160 for high school graduation or meet early
3		graduation requirements that may be enacted by the General Assembly;
4	<u>(d)</u>	Ensure the student performance standards meet or exceed those adopted by
5		the Kentucky Board of Education, including compliance with the statewide
6		assessment system specified in KRS 158.6453;
7	<u>(e)</u>	Adhere to the same financial audits, audit procedures, and audit
8		requirements as are applied under KRS 156.265;
9	<u>(f)</u>	Adhere to the same teacher certification requirements as public charter
10		schools;
11	<u>(g)</u>	Require state and criminal background checks for staff and volunteers as
12		required of all public school employees and volunteers within the public
13		schools and specified in KRS 160.380 and 161.148;
14	<u>(h)</u>	Comply with open records and open meeting requirements under KRS
15		Chapter 61;
16	<u>(i)</u>	Comply with purchasing requirements and limitations under KRS Chapter
17		45A and KRS 156.074 and 156.480;
18	<u>(j)</u>	Provide overall instructional time that is equivalent to or greater than that
19		required under KRS 158.070, but which may include on-site instruction,
20		distance or virtual learning, and work-based learning on nontraditional
21		school days or hours; and
22	<u>(k)</u>	Provide data to the Kentucky Department of Education as deemed necessary
23		to generate school and district reports.
