COMMENDATIONS. Commends Clay A. Carter upon the occasion of his retirement from the state land office.

1 A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

2 To commend Clay A. Carter on the occasion of his retirement from the state land office,

3 Division of Administration.

4 WHEREAS, Clay A. Carter was born December 18, 1953, in Baton Rouge to

5 Robert T. Carter Jr., and Ellen A. Carter; and

6 WHEREAS, while he was a child, he learned about land, forests and wildlife from

7 his father, who also taught him how to work, how to manage forests, and how to conduct

8 timber surveys; and

9 WHEREAS, from both parents, he learned impeccable manners and respect for

10 others; and

11 WHEREAS, all of those lessons have helped him throughout his years working for

12 the state and with the legislature; and

13 WHEREAS, Clay graduated from Bogalusa High School in 1971, and earned his

14 Bachelor of Science in Forestry from Louisiana State University and Agricultural and

15 Mechanical College in 1976; and

16 WHEREAS, after graduation, Clay worked as a private forester until becoming the

17 forester for the state land office in 1991; and

18 WHEREAS, for a brief time he served as the interim public lands administrator for

1 the state land office in 1996; and

2 WHEREAS, Clay eventually became the public lands utilization manager, and
3 became an expert in state and federal land patents and title records maintained by the state
4 land office; and

5 WHEREAS, Clay effectively managed and defended the public lands and water
6 bottoms of the state of Louisiana for over eighteen years, including the public rights to use
7 state lands and waters for boating, hunting and fishing, and state regulation of oil, gas,
8 pipeline and electrical transmission line activities across public lands and waters; and

9 WHEREAS, Clay supported and advised numerous state agencies on matters
10 affecting their interests in timber, oil and gas, property ownership, boundary disputes, and
11 public rights of use and navigation, including the division of administration, the Department
12 of Wildlife and Fisheries, the Department of Natural Resources, the office of conservation,
13 the State Mineral and Energy Board, and the Department of Justice; and

14 WHEREAS, Clay's commitment to serving the public and his loyalty to the state is
15 unmatched, his determination to do right is unwavering, and his willingness to work is
16 immeasurable; and

17 WHEREAS, Clay met and married his beloved wife, Barbara, a mere thirty-one years
18 ago in June of 1983; and

19 WHEREAS, Clay and Barbara have two sons, Lee, who is a veteran of the United
20 States Army and is a lead inspector in the Gulf of Mexico for the Bureau of Safety and
21 Environmental Enforcement, and Thomas, who is a marketing major at Louisiana State
22 University and Agricultural and Mechanical College; and

23 WHEREAS, like their father, Lee and Thomas have a deep love and affection for the
24 forests, rivers and the natural environment of the state of Louisiana; and

25 WHEREAS, Clay and Barbara are extremely proud and love their sons and are
26 excited that Clay's retirement will allow both of them to spend more time with their sons;
27 and

28 WHEREAS, his personal and professional drive, abilities, and skills have resulted
29 in many accomplishments and advancements in the management of the state's public lands
30 to the betterment of the state; and

1 WHEREAS, Clay made many personal sacrifices throughout his twenty-two year
2 career in public service to the state and its citizens; and

3 WHEREAS, Clay frequently appeared before the Senate Committee on Natural
4 Resources and the House Committee on Natural Resources and Environment testifying about
5 various state land issues; and

6 WHEREAS, his input and information was always of great importance to both
7 committees and he repeatedly demonstrated himself to be a valuable and knowledgeable
8 asset to the committees; and

9 WHEREAS, upon his retirement, Clay plans to enjoy life by taking long walks,
10 planting and tending to his garden, and spending more time with his wife and sons; and

11 WHEREAS, Clay A. Carter merits the highest commendation and sincere
12 congratulations for his exemplary service and for his outstanding contributions to the state
13 of Louisiana and its citizens.

14 THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislature of Louisiana does hereby
15 commend Clay A. Carter for his service with the state land office, division of administration
16 and for his exceptional career and service to the state and its citizens, and does hereby
17 recognize and record for posterity his vital contributions and tireless and self-sacrificing
18 dedication to the state of Louisiana, and does also hereby extend to him best wishes for
19 continued success and happiness in all of his future endeavors.
