3 WHEREAS, as an advocate for change in the early days of the Civil Rights
4 Movement, Joe Wills would not be deterred by threats of bodily harm as he went
5 door-to-door encouraging others to exercise their constitutional right to register and vote;
6 and

7 WHEREAS, Joe R. Wills brought about change in local government in its voter
8 redistricting measures, neighborhood improvements, and by supporting public recognition
9 of well-respected educators and community leaders; and

10 WHEREAS, he was born of humble beginnings and reared in the community of
11 Stoner Hill where he was affectionately known as "the mayor"; and

12 WHEREAS, he graduated from Booker T. Washington High School in 1963 at the
13 beginnings of the Civil Rights Movement and remained involved in political activism; and

14 WHEREAS, as a employee of AT&T and Avaya Technologies, Joe Wills retired
15 after thirty-two years of service, and, during his employment participated in the negotiations
16 of the Communications Workers of America union and served on its executive board; and

17 WHEREAS, after retirement Joe kept busy within his neighborhood, helping out at
18 church, offering sage advice, and showing concern for his fellow man; and

19 WHEREAS, Joe R. Wills was married for fifty-two years to his wife Shirley, and
20 together they made a Christian home built on God's love, and their union was blessed with
21 precious children, grandchildren, extended family and faithful friends; and

22 WHEREAS, Joe R. Wills shall long be remembered for his legacy of activism in
23 defiance of long-standing customs that suppressed minorities in either the availability of or
24 access to opportunities and services, and for his tireless advocacy to defeat racial
25 discrimination; and

26 WHEREAS, Joe R. Wills was a pillar of the community, an eloquent, charming man
27 filled with great kindness; and

28 WHEREAS, Joe Robert Wills remains an inspirational figure; his support of "making
29 a difference" resonates within the hearts and minds of all who seek a positive change for the
30 disenfranchised; and

1 WHEREAS, on March 11, 2016, Joe R. Wills found his place in the firmament with
2 his Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, and transitioned to his heavenly home to be with all the
3 great civil rights activists who have gone before him, both well-known and unknown.

4 THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislature of Louisiana does hereby
5 express heartfelt condolences to the family and friends of Joe Robert Wills, an extraordinary
6 community leader.

7 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature of Louisiana does hereby
8 recognize the lifetime of devotion to racial equality that Joe R. Wills wrought; for he made
9 the world a more humane and compassionate place in which to live and his devotion to the
10 rights of all men reminds us of how far we all have come.

11 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this Resolution be transmitted to his
12 widow, Mrs. Shirley Wills.
