Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- SECTION 1. Section 1(w) of chapter 151A of the General Laws, as appearing in the
- 2 2014 Official Edition, is hereby amended by inserting, in line 344, after the word "quarter", the

- 5 deeming renders the individual ineligible for unemployment benefits, the amount shall be equal
- 6 to one twenty-sixth of the total wages.
