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By Mr. Sannicandro of Ashland, petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 1066) of Tom Sannicandro and others for an investigation by a special commission (including members of the General Court) relative to the impact of proprietary schools receiving certain public investments. Education.

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## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

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**In the Year Two Thousand Eleven**  
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An Act to form a commission on for-profit schools.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 SECTION 1: There is hereby established a special commission created for the purpose of  
2 studying and making recommendations concerning the impact of proprietary schools receiving  
3 public investments in the form of federal and state financial aid on residents of the  
4 Commonwealth who are or have been enrolled in these institutions. The commission shall  
5 consist of 16 members 1 of whom shall be the Undersecretary of Consumer Affairs and Business  
6 Regulations or his/her designee, who shall serve as chair; 1 of whom call be the Commissioner  
7 of Higher Education or his/her designee; 1 of whom shall be the Commissioner of the Board of  
8 Elementary and Secondary Education or his/her designee; 1 of whom shall be the Attorney  
9 General or his/her designee; 2 of whom shall be the chairs of the joint committee on consumer  
10 protection and professional licensure; 1 of whom shall be appointed by the speaker of the house;  
11 1 of whom hall be appointed by the senate president; 1 of whom shall be appointed by the

12 minority leader of the house; 1 of whom shall be appointed by the minority leader of the senate; ;  
13 1 of whom shall be a representative of the Crittenton Women’s Union; 1 of whom shall be a  
14 representative of The Midas Collaborative and 4 members appointed by the Undersecretary of  
15 Consumer Affairs and Business Regulations; 1 of whom shall be a representative of the general  
16 public who was enrolled or is currently enrolled in a for-profit college or proprietary institution  
17 in Massachusetts, 2 of whom shall represent proprietary schools including one accredited school  
18 that is eligible to receive state and federal aid and one that is non-accredited and ineligible to  
19 receive state and federal aid and 1 of whom shall represent a consumer advocacy group such as  
20 MassPIRG.

21 This commission shall include, but not be limited to, review of the organization of proprietary  
22 school oversight in Massachusetts; studying and making of recommendations for possible  
23 consolidation of oversight authority into a single entity, or other efforts to provide increased  
24 oversight; examination of the need for improved financial auditing procedures and improved  
25 enforcement of relevant Massachusetts Consumer Protection laws, including, but not limited to,  
26 the areas of advertising, recruitment, retention, financial aid practices, credit transfer practices,  
27 and fees or penalties; an assessment of the adequacy of free or low-cost loan counseling and  
28 legal support for Massachusetts residents in default on student loans; research into the need for  
29 increased consumer education about proprietary schools and the financial responsibilities  
30 associated with student loans; drafting recommendations to provide consumers with greater  
31 transparency regarding schools’ compliance with state and federal laws, loan default rate, or  
32 schools which have been sanctioned in Massachusetts or in other states; making  
33 recommendations with regard to requiring counseling of students considering financing their  
34 proprietary school education in part with loans.

35 The commission shall be empowered to hold regular public meetings, fact-finding hearings, and  
36 other public forums, as it considers necessary.

37 The commission shall file its recommendations, together with recommendations for legislation,  
38 if any, with the House and Senate clerks who shall forward the same to the General Court no  
39 later than 2 year after the passage of this act. The commission shall file a progress report, along  
40 with any recommendations for legislation prepared by that time, no later than 1 year after  
41 passage of this act.
