In the Year Two Thousand Eleven

An Act relative to high speed chases.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 SECTION 1. Chapter 90 of the General Laws, as appearing in the 2004 Official Edition, is
- 2 hereby amended by inserting after section 25 the following section:—
- 3 Section 25A. Whoever willfully ignores the signal of a police officer to stop a motor vehicle and
- 4 then operates the motor vehicle at a rate of speed in excess of 20 miles per hour over the speed
- 5 limit established under sections 17, 17A, and 18 for a distance of a mile shall be punished by a
- 6 fine of not more than \$1,000 dollars and by imprisonment in a jail or house of correction for not
- 7 more than 2 and ½ years, or by imprisonment in the state prison for not more than 5 years.
