*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:* 

1 SECTION 1. Section 16A of Chapter 118E of the General Laws is hereby amended b

3 Section 16A. The division shall establish a program of medical care and assistance for

4 certain disabled children, 18 year olds, and young adults ages 19 and 20 of the commonwealth,

5 including children who are blind, without regard to immigration status.
