By Ms. Peake of Provincetown and Senator Jehlen, a joint petition (accompanied by resolve, House, No. 2047) of Sarah K. Peake and others providing for an investigation and study by a special commission (including members of the General Court) relative to lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender aging . Public Health.

### The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year Two Thousand Thirteen

Resolve establishing a special commission on LGBT aging.

1 Resolved,

2 SECTION 1. There shall be a special commission to investigate, analyze and study the

3 health, housing, financial, psycho-social and long-term care needs of older lesbian, gay, bisexual

and transgender (LGBT) adults and their caregivers and to make recommendations to improve

access to benefits and services where appropriate and necessary. The special commission shall

6 consist of twenty members including the House and Senate chairs of the Joint Committee on

7 Elder Affairs, or their designees, who shall serve as co-chairs; the secretary of elder affairs, or a

8 designee; the secretary of housing and community development, or a designee; the commissioner

9 of public health, or a designee; the director of the LGBT Aging Project, or a designee; the

10 director of Fenway Health, or a designee; the executive director of GLAD, or a designee; a

11 representative of the National Association of HIV Over Fifty; the executive director of

12 MassEquality or a designee; the executive director of the Massachusetts Home Care Association,

13 or a designee; the director of AARP Massachusetts, or a designee; the executive director of the

14 Massachusetts Association of Councils on Aging Inc., or a designee; the director of the

15 Massachusetts Nursing Home Federation, or a designee; the director of the Massachusetts

16 Council of Home Care Aides, or a designee; and five members appointed by the governor, one

17 of whom shall be a member of the Massachusetts bar who practices elder law; one of whom shall

18 be an expert in LGBT public policy or research; and three LGBT elders, at least one of whom

19 shall be transgender. The Governor's appointees shall insure at least one representative is from

20 Cape Cod, as well as the western and central portions of the state.

The commission shall also examine the impact of state policies and regulations on LGBT

22 older adults and make recommendations to ensure equality of access, treatment, care and

23 benefits. The commission shall examine strategies to increase provider awareness of the needs

24 of LGBT older adults and their caregivers and to improve the competence of and access to

25 treatment, services and on-going care, including preventive care. The commission shall assess

26 the funding and programming needed to enhance services to the growing population of LGBT

27 older adults and to examine best practices for increasing access, reducing isolation, preventing

28 abuse and exploitation, promoting independence and self-determination, strengthening

29 caregiving, eliminating disparities, and improving quality of life.

30 In particular, the commission shall examine the extent to which policies and practices, or the absence thereof, promote the premature admission of LGBT older adults to institutional care 31 32 and to recommend, as appropriate and necessary, lower-cost and culturally appropriate home and community-based alternatives. The commission shall also examine the feasibility of developing 34 statewide training curricula to improve provider competency in the delivery of health, housing and long-term support services to older LGBTs and their caregivers, as well as outreach protocols to reduce apprehension among LGBT elders and caregivers of mainstream providers. The commission, in formulating its recommendations, shall take into account the best policies 38 and practices in other states and jurisdictions. The commission shall be empowered to hold regular public meetings, fact-finding hearings and other public forums as it considers necessary. 40 The commission shall file its recommendations, together with recommendations for legislation, if any, with the clerks of the House of Representatives and Senate within 12 months of the first 42 convening of the commission.
