An Act to encourage, and improve, the level of availability of physicians.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1           SECTION 1. The Massachusetts General Laws are hereby amended by inserting the  
2 following new chapter:

3           PURPOSE – A variety of circumstances, having developed in recent years, have led to  
4 the erosion of staffing levels, among physicians, and other senior level health care workers.  
5 These circumstances have included the migration of some such workers, into other fields; the  
6 retirement of many, and other factors including work loads, and compensation levels.

7           Recent events, particularly the COVID-19 Pandemic, and other factors, have led to the  
8 death of many physicians, and other senior health care workers, further adding to the significant  
9 shortage of such staff.

10 In addition, profound changes in medical treatment modalities, significant lengthening of  
11 life spans, of many; and newer recognized diseases, and conditions, have meant that there are  
12 some increases in the need for physicians, and other senior level related health care workers.

13 Significantly, Massachusetts has become a world leader in medicine, and health care, and  
14 attracts substantial numbers of patients, from across The United States and the World.

15 Thus, it has become clear that a shortage of physicians, and other senior level related  
16 health care workers, is worsening, and is likely to worsen further; adding to crisis type risks, and  
17 actual crisis circumstances, in the health care system of our Commonwealth; over a span of some  
18 years, going forward. This statute has as its purpose, to address, and help to remedy, these  
19 shortages; and provide additional mechanisms, by which individuals, and institutions, can  
20 recruit, train, employ, and otherwise stabilize, and seek to improve the physicians, and senior  
21 level health care work force.

22 SECTION 2 – This legislation authorizes the Executive Office of Health and Human  
23 Services, and under it, the Department of Public Health, to create a Physicians Scholarship  
24 Program.

25 2a.) This Physicians Scholarship Program (PSP), shall provide a mechanism for all  
26 qualified students, who wish to enroll in an accredited Medical Physician Education Program,  
27 operated within The Commonwealth of Massachusetts, to receive specific assistance in obtaining  
28 grant, and/or scholarship aid, to compensate their educational, and related costs, as long as they  
29 meet certain specified standards.

30           2b.) Those students receiving assistance through the Physicians Scholarship Program  
31 (PSP), shall attend at least half-time, and preferably full-time, during their academic, and clinical  
32 training.

33           2c.) Such eligible students, shall, upon graduation, commit to no less than four (4) years  
34 of full-time service, in a qualified medical institution, and/or health care facility, within the  
35 boundaries of Massachusetts, as may be further defined.

36           SECTION 3 – All such eligible Physicians Scholarship Program (PSP) students, shall  
37 receive up to ten (10) years of complete tuition compensation, during their studies in an  
38 accredited Physician Medical School Degree Program.

39           3a.) The Department of Public Health, is authorized to develop such program, and may,  
40 as needed, intersect with other agencies of the Commonwealth, to develop additional related  
41 standards.

42           3b.) Detailed records, for students in the program, shall be kept, processed, analyzed, and  
43 further reported, together with useful recommendations, for the refinement of the program. This  
44 public report, shall be done on a yearly basis.
