An Act to ceate an annual City Year Day.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

- 1 Section 15 of Chapter 6 of the General Laws, as so appearing in the 2006 Official edition, is
- 2 hereby amended by adding the following at the end thereof:
- 3 The governor shall annually issue a proclamation setting apart the fourth Friday in September as
- 4 City Year Day in commemoration of the young men and women of City Year, an organization
- 5 dedicated to service, idealism and the belief that young people can change the world, and
- 6 recommending that said day be observed by the people in an appropriate manner in recognition
- 7 of today’s volunteers, from whom will come the leaders of tomorrow.
