The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year Two Thousand Eleven

An Act protecting the religious freedom of students.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Chapter 71 is hereby amended by inserting after Section 1B the following section:-

Section 1C. Notwithstanding any special or general law to the contrary, school districts 2 beginning with the 2011-2012 school year, shall adopt and implement a local policy that allows 3 for a limited public forum and voluntary student expression of religious viewpoints at school 4 events and graduation ceremonies, in class assignments, and in non-curricular school groups and 5 6 activities. Districts shall treat such expression on an otherwise permissible subject in the same manner as the expression of a secular or other viewpoint and prohibits the district from 7 discriminating against a student based on his or her expressed religious viewpoint. The policy 8 9 must require the district to ensure that a student speaker does not engage in obscene or indecent speech and to provide a disclaimer that a student's speech is not endorsed or sponsored by the 10 district. 11
