In the One Hundred and Ninetieth General Court (2017-2018)

An Act regarding residential habilitation.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Chapter 118 E is hereby amended by adding after section 10F, the

2 following new section:--

Section 10H. The division shall provide coverage for residential habilitation services for
individuals age sixty or older, if such individual has been determined by the division to be
clinically eligible for long term care services, and requires said residential habilitation services in
order to remain living in the least restrictive setting appropriate to meet his needs in accordance
with section 6 of this chapter.
The term 'residential habilitation' shall mean ongoing services and supports provided to

9 beneficiaries in a residential setting that are designed to assist beneficiaries in acquiring,

maintaining, or improving the skills necessary to live in a community setting. Residential
habilitation provides beneficiaries with daily staff intervention including care, supervision, and
assistance in activities of daily living, instrumental activities of daily living, and community
integration in a residential setting qualified by the division with 24-hour staffing. Residential
habilitation may include the provision of medical and health-care services that are integral to
meeting the daily needs of beneficiaries.
